were frequently changed, something like a dome players figuring at three-quarter. The Club stained a serious loss by the migration of W. Jackson to Halifax. Jackson was, perhaps, the finest all round centre Gloucester ever possessed, and his abilities were at once recognised in Yorkshire where he was chosen for the county, and also appeared for England against Scotland, being the first Gloucester-born player to gain his International cap.

TWO WONDERFUL EXHIBITIONS.

Bagwell, Stephens, J. Watts and F. Abbey appeared at half back this season and recruit forwards were C. Hall (who later won International distinction), C. Rose, A. H. Click, W. Leighton, and the Brothers A. and W. Pitt. G. J. Wilcomb was tempted out again, but soon retired, and the forwards mainly engaged were Cromwell, C. and J. Williams, Price, A. and W. Collins, and Wellings, For playing W. Shewell (Stroud) against Newport without a transfer—the transfer laws were very stringent in those days—the Gloucester Club were suspended for a month and the Captain for the remainder of the season. To help recover the financial loss another match was arranged with a Yorkshire Scratch, who were opposed to a Gloucestershire and South Wales Fifteen. played for the Yorkshire team, but his side were outplayed, and defeated by 2 goals 3 tries to nil. An extra fixture was also arranged with Castleford (Yorkshire), Gloucester having the assistance of Norman Biggs and J. Elliott (Cardiff), and Jackson. Taylor was the other three-quarter, Hughes at full back and Bagwell and Stephens at half. The City forwards were outplayed by the powerful Castleford pack in the first half, but after the change of ends the home backs were given a show, and one of the most dazzling displays of passing seen at Kingsholm took place. Gloucester won in the end by 2 goals 2 tries to nil, Biggs and Taylor scoring two tries each.

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AN UNEVENTFUL SEASON.

Walter George had removed to Devonport before the next season came round, and Hughes also dropped out of the side, though he played a little the following year. The back division was very unsettled and the season was uneventful as regards notable achievements. Frank Watts had a successful period at full back, but a broken collar bone put an end to his football career. W. H. Devonshire (formerly of Blackheath) assisted at three-quarter, and this season saw the introduction to first-class football of J. Stephens, who subsequently rendered splendid service to the Club.

THE BROTHERS STOUT.

1895-6 saw Gloucester down again, but there were many difficulties to contend with. It was under C. Williams' captaincy, however, that the Brothers Percy and Frank Stout made their debut for the City team. Former Association players, they quickly took to the handling game and greatly distinguished themselves. Frank gained his International cap when under 20 years of age, and his elder brother was similarly honoured a season later. W. Spiers also came out this season and showed brilliant form. He subsequently went to Devonport Albion, and proved for several years one of the eleverest forwards in England, but he failed to get "capped."

Bagwell practically finished with the game this year, later to take up the duties of "baggage"

THE RECORD SMASHERS.

Walter Taylor succeeded as "skipper" in 1896-7, a position he held for four successive seasons. Under his leadership the Club regained to reputation, and achieved some wonderful triumphs. In the four years, of 132 matches played 12 were won as against 26 defeats and 14 drawn names—and this against the strongest opposition in England and Wales! The great performance in Taylor's first year of office was the defeat of Limelly, who lost a much-cherished record at

C. Cummings, G. Hail, and R. Goddard (half backs), and a host of good forwards, amongst whom were C. Williams, F. Stout, F. Goulding, C. Hall, C. Rose, W. Spiers, A. H. Click, T. Hatherall, F. Oswell, B. L. Watkins, G. H. Smith, J. Lewis, A. Hawker, H. Manley, and C. E. Miller.

PHENOMENAL SCORING.

George Romans took over the captaincy in 1900-1, and held it till half way through 1904-5. The team worthily upheld the Club's reputation

the first two years, only twelve defeats being sustained in 68 engagements. In 1900–1 some noteworthy victories were recorded—Blackheath (10 points to nil), Leicester (twice), Llanelly (5 tries to nil), Cardiff (11 points to 3), and Swansea (6 points to 3), all being beaten; whilst a pointless draw was played with Newport. This season was remarkable for the phenomenal scoring against Clifton—66 points to nil in the first match, and 72 points to 3 in the return game. In the latter fixture Romans converted eleven out of fifteen tries, six of which were credited to G. Clutterbuck.

But C. Smith beat this individual record the following season against the same club, crossing the line no fewer than eight times. The full score was 10 goals 7 tries. In this season another drawn game was played with Newport after a desperate struggle, and Richmond (for whom Frank Stout played), Cambridge University and Bristol, were defeated amongst other important clubs. Cardiff were successful in the two engagements-5-0 and 3-0 respectively. Leicester also won at Kingsholm by a penalty goal to nil, this being Gloucester's first home defeat from an English Club since 1898! On March 26, 1902, the City sustained a serious loss in the death of Mr. H. J. Boughton, who had been so closely identified with the Football Club and all branches of sport for over 30 years.

GENT-STEPHENS PARTNERSHIP.

The two succeeding years found many changes in the personnel, and Gloucester fared only moderately. The defeats jumped to double figures (15 and 14 respectively). There were few outstanding performances to the credit of the Club, whilst in 1903-4 both Clifton and Cheltenham had the distinction of beating Gloucester at Kingsholm, the former for the first time for 22 years. It was during Romans' captaincy that D. R. Gent, then at Cheltenham Training College, joined Gloucester, and his subsequent association at half back with I. Stephens, extending over several years, was brilliantly successful. Gent was honoured with International distinction, but Stephens got no further than on the reserve. They were a fine combination with a perfect understanding, and worthy successors of another clever pair in G. Hall and R. Goddard, who with J. Cook and J. Lewis all joined the Northern Union.

G. ROMANS' HARD LUCK.

Although 1904–5 furnished some capital performances the City for the first time had to acknowledge defeat from the principal clubs in the county—Bristol, Cheltenham, Lydney (at Kingsholm by 8–6), and Cinderford. Gloucester, however, had their revenge over Bristol by winning the

County Cup by 12 points to nil. At Swansea the City lost by a dropped goal to nil—the best fight put up at St. Helen's for ten years. Big scores were run up against the Old Edwardians (3 goals 10 tries), and United Services (6 goals 3 tries), A. Hudson scoring six tries in the latter match. In his day Romans had few superiors at full back in the country, but he was unfortunate that a super-custodian in H. T. Gamlin was playing at the same time. On seven or eight occasions the Gloucester Captain was chosen as reserve, but was never called upon to represent England. During the eight seasons he represented Gloucester, Romans met with remarkable success in goalkicking, converting 344 tries out of 716 attempts, in addition to kicking 29 other goals—a grand record of 373.

A RECORD IN POINTS.

W. Johns, who had succeeded Romans on the latter's resignation in 1904-5, was re-elected captain in 1905-6-a season in which several records were set up. In 37 games (26 of which were won and only eight lost) the team aggregated 86 goals 82 tries (661 points)—easily the Club's best—and A. Hudson by scoring 41 tries also established an individual record which still stands. Amongst the biggest wins were: Bream 10 goals 6 tries; Clifton 1 goal 8 tries; Bedford 8 goals 4 tries; O. M. T.'s 6 goals 2 tries; Leicester 1 goal 5 tries; and Plymouth 10 goals 7 tries (L. Vears six tries). Newport were beaten 5-0, and a draw was played with Cardiff (3-3). Swansea won at St. Helen's (3-0) and at Gloucester (5-0), whilst Bristol proved victorious in a County Cup match by 8-3. The famous "All Blacks" appeared at Kingsholm this season (October 19, 1905) and won decisively by 44 points to nil, but Gloucester were severely handicapped in having two players (Hudson and Wood) injured.

One of the cleverest back divisions seen out for Gloucester appeared under Johns' leadership, viz, G. Romans or A. Wood (full back); C. Smith, E. Hall, J. Harrison and A. Hudson (three-quarters) and D. R. Gent and J. Stephens (half backs). The

forwards, selected from W. Johns, Gordon Vears, Bert Parham, G. Matthews, F. Pegler, H. Collins, J. Jewell, J. Holder, H. Quixley and J. Merchant also did fine work. The gymnasium was opened at the start of the season by Mr. Russell Rea, M.P.

CHELTENHAM'S FIRST WIN AT KINGSHOLM.

D. R. Gent and Gordon Vears were captains respectively in 1906-7 and 1907-8, but the performances call for no special remark. A. Wood took up the full back position, later to go North after gaining his England Cap, and other players who figured in the side besides those already mentioned, were G. Cook, H. Smith, and F. Smith (threequarters), A. Hall and W. Dix (half backs). Hollands (who later removed to Devonport Albion where he secured International honours), J. Wyburn, G. Holford, G. Griffiths and A. Putton (forwards). In 1906-7 Cheltenham won their first match at Kingsholm by a try to nil—a performance the Town Club have failed to repeat. Hudson was again the City's most prolific try-getter, scoring on 25 occasions.

A. HUDSON'S REGIME.

From 1908–9 to 1912–13 the captaincy devolved on Arthur Hudson, and under the popular International the Club performed consistently and well. Players who figured prominently during Hudson's regime were: F. Welshman and C. Cook (full back); F. Smith, A. Lewis, W. Washbourne, W. J. Vance, Stanley Cook (three-quarters); Gent and Stephens and Dix and W. Hall (half backs); and W. Johns, H. Berry, J. Wyburn, G. Holford, G. Vears, N. Hayes, S. Millard, C. A. Carleton, S. Smart, A. Ledge, A. Cook, F. Pegler, P. Symonds, J. Harris, J. Meadows, H. Quixley, A. Saunders, D. Hollands, G. Griffiths, and W. J. Pearce (forwards). Hudson, Gent, Berry, and Johns were all capped for England in 1909–10—a great honour for a provincial club.

The following is a brief summary of noteworthy

performances during the five seasons:

1908-9: Beat Plymouth in opening match away 21-9. Northampton (with a weak side) 11-3,

Leicester 13-3, and Bristol (twice); draw with Swansea (0-0), and lost to Newport, at Kingsholm, 3-8, and at Newport 0-5. Hudson was absent from the team up to October owing to illness, and the leading try getter was Frank Smith with 18 tries.

1909-10: Beat Swansea 8-5, Pontypool 19-0, Leicester 14-0; won County Cup; drew with Newport, at Newport, with seven reserves, and again at Kingsholm with eight reserves.

1910–11: Beat Llanelly 19–6, Cardiff 15–0, Bristol 23–6, and Swansea 13–6. The team visited France and beat the Stade Toulousains by 18–13.

1911-12: Beat Cardiff 11-0, Swansea 8-3, Llanelly 8-3, Stade Francais, Paris, 15-3, and drew with Watsonians (a rousing game) 11-11, and Newport 6-6.

1912-13: Beat Llanelly 8-0, Neath 7-3, and Leicester (twice); drew with Watsonians 9-9, Cardiff, and the Harlequins (first match with the famous London Club).

W. Johns retired in 1912, though he turned out for a few games later. Altogether in ten seasons the International forward made 238 appearances for Gloucester, 22 for the County, and seven for England—a meritorious record.

A CAPABLE SIDE.

In 1913–14 Gloucester had a very capable side with G. Holford as captain, and splendid victories were obtained over the Harlequins at Twickenham (8–0), Swansea (6–0), Cardiff (6–4), Oxford University, at Oxford (9–6), Pontypool (8–0), and Llanelly (11–0); while Cardiff were run to a try at Cardiff. Dix dropped out of the team this season, but A. Hall and J. Baker did splendid work at half back, and the three quarter line—Washbourne, L. Hamblin, A. Lewis and F. Webb—enjoyed a good deal of success. F. Ayliffe, J. F. Lawson and W. Parham, were new forwards who came into the team this season, and S. Smart gained International honours.



THE GREAT WAR.

The war broke out before another season came round, and it was not until 1919–20 that Rugby football was resumed seriously. The Gloucester players at the outset volunteered practically to a man for service, and bore their part nobly in the great struggle. The war memorial erected in the gymnasium to the gallant lads who lost their lives in France and on other battle fronts, bears silent tribute to their memories.

INTERNATIONAL DISTINCTIONS.


Holford was severely wounded in the early stages of the war, but fortunately recovered, and was able to take over the captaincy again in 1919-20. The Club enjoyed a fair season, Cardiff being defeated 10-3, Oxford University 9-5, Pontypool 12-3, and Swansea 3-0. W. Dix (who was a prisoner of war for several months) resumed his place in the team at half back, and among the old players who again did duty were: A. Hudson, F. Webb, L. Hamblin, W. Washbourne, A. Lewis, F. Ayliffe, A. Hall, J. F. Lawson, J. Harris, N. Hayes, and Several of the players, like Holford, had been wounded, but happily they were not permanently disabled. A. Cook was more unfortunate, as he had to sacrifice one of his legs, and his brother (C. Cook) lost the sight of one eye. latter did play again, but with the handicap he naturally failed to reproduce his old form.

SMART—HOLFORD—VOYCE.

Recruits who later came to the front were T. Millington, S. A. Brown, N. Daniell, A. T. Voyce and F. Warde. Voyce, who was an old schoolboy International, made remarkable progress, and in his first season gained his City, County and International Caps. Once picked for England, Voyce never lost his place, and established a record for a Gloucestershire player by appearing in 13 consecutive matches for his Country, beating Frank Stout by four. Voyce was further honoured by being chosen one of the British team to tour South Africa this year. S. Smart and G. Holford also

played for England (the former appeared in all on 12 occasions) in 1919–20, and W. Dix was reserve half back.

A BRILLIANT CAREER.

In the County Championship Final against Yorkshire, at Bradford in 1920—a match won in brilliant fashion by Gloucestershire—Arthur Hudson sustained a serious injury to his shoulder and, though as keen and enthusiastic as ever, he deemed it advisable to retire from the game. Hudson had a brilliant career, and his record stands out as the most distinguished of any player who ever represented the City Club. Starting in 1902-3 he appeared in 260 matches for Glouces'er alone, and scored 236 tries, as against the 141 of C. Smith, the previous In addition Hudson played in eight International matches, scoring ten tries, and for the County he obtained 14 tries in 28 games. During the war the popular Gloucestrian served in the Royal Navy, and was a prolific scorer for the Naval Depot team at Devonport. In first class football Hudson must have scored well over 300 tries —a remarkable record, and one exceeded by very few Rugby Union players. Following his retirement Mr. Hudson was elected Secretary of the Club, and he has proved equally successful in business management as on the playing field.

UNBEATEN AT HOME.

The remaining seasons—1920 to 1923-4—are too recent for a lengthy review, and a brief summary In 1920-1 (F. Webb, Captain) the will suffice. team was unbeaten at home, the record being: Played 20—won 19, drawn 1; with a score of 289 points for, as against 88 by opponents. The Club repeated the performance of defeating the four principal Welsh Clubs—Cardiff, Newport, Swansea and Llanelly—and in addition triumphed over the Harlequins, Bristol, Guy's Hospital, United Services, and Leicester. The great feature was the smashing of Newport's wonderful record by 12 points to 9. This was a memorable victory, and the gate receipts for the match totalled £768 —easily a record for the City Club. Sid Brown headed the list of try-getters with 20.

RECENT YEARS.

S. Smart was honoured with the captaincy in the following season, and though the defeats sustained numbered 14 as against 10, victories were secured over the Harlequins, Guy's Hospital, Devonport Services, Cardiff, United Services and Llanelly, and a draw made with Newport. Millington had the distinction of scoring more points for the Club in one season than any other player, his score being 154, as against 152 obtained In 1922–3 the record by G. Romans in 1905–6. showed 27 wins, 13 defeats and 3 drawn games, with 516 points for and 273 against. Frank Ayliffe led the side this season, and the victories included the Harlequins, Guy's Hospital, United Services, Llanelly and Neath. Last season (1923-4) T. Millington had charge of the team, when of 39 matches played, 24 were won, 14 lost and one drawn; points for 426, against 310. were again beaten at Kingsholm and Llanelly, Plymouth and Bristol (twice each), Guy's, and the Harlequins were also defeated.

During the last four seasons the chief players were J. C. Collett, A. J. Kerwood, and R. James (full back); Webb, Brown, Daniell, A. Robbins, S. R. Crowther, S. Stone, A. M. David and F. Meadows (three-quarters); Dix and Millington and E. H. Hughes and W. Collins (half backs); Holford, Smart, Voyce, Ayliffe, Lawson, Warde, A. Hall, C. Mumford, J. H. Webb, Major Roderick, S. Bayliss, M. Evans, H. W. Collier, T. Coulson and J. Merry (forwards). Dix finished in 1922, and Holford and Smart followed him into retirement last season. All three players rendered signal service to the Club. Holford and Smart attained all the honours open to a footballer, and Dix, but for the fact that he was contemporary with Lieut. Kershaw, would assuredly have gained his English.

From the outset the Gloucester F.C. have been particularly well served in this respect, and to-day the Club is most fortunate in having a hard-working and enthusiastic body of officials with Mr. J. T. Brookes (Chairman of Committee) and Mr. A. Hudson (Secretary) at the head of affairs. Mr. Arthur Fielding held office as Chairman for a number of years, and he did admirable work, expecially in 1919–20 when the game was resumed after the long break. For many years Sir James Bruton held the Presidency of the Club, and took a keen interest in the doings

of the team. His resignation this year was received with regret, but in Dr. Arnold Alcock (an old International) a worthy successor was installed as President. In recognition of his years of office, Sir James Bruton presented the Club with a clock to be erected on the gymnasium—a gift very highly appreciated by the members.

In reviewing the history of the Club over such a long period the writer is mindful of the fact that with space limited, many interesting incidents
