same page this time around. The guys who have come in have fitted in really well. There's experience and class in the shape of the likes of Eliota Fuimanono-Sapolu, Nicky Robinson and Tom Voyce. Just as encouraging is the way

Just as encouraging is the way the lads who have come through the Academy ranks have fitted in. They're young, they're talented and they're hungry. They've been other's company away from the training ground. We're a squad who want to do

We're a squad who want to do well for each other, for the shirt, the club and the supporters. And I think that's been evident in the preseason games we've played where we've actually gone a couple of scores down in two of the games but dug deep and fought our way back into those matches.

That's the way it should be and that's exactly what you're going to see from us – total commitment. And I hope you'll acknowledge that, as you always do, by backing us all the way and hopefully roaring us onto victory.

some changes, notably with Bryan Redpath taking over as Head Coach.

Brush has been excellent from day one. He hasn't looked to change everything overnight. But he's introduced a few things and tweaked a few others and it's really freshened things up. schooled in the Gloucester way of doing things. They're local lads and are desperate to play for Gloucester.

I think that's really key to our prospects this season. We've a smaller squad than last season but we're a tightly knit group. We've been working hard together over the summer but also enjoying each

N any other close season the events at Gloucester would have been the focal point of English club rugby, with the change at the top and the squad trimming that has taken place.

But Bath and Harlequins have seen to it that the heat has been off new head coach Bryan Redpath because the national press have had bigger fish to fry.

Redpath has had his fair share to deal with, however. He starts the season today with a much-changed squad, even from the one he had when he took over from Dean Ryan back in June.

Matthew Watkins and Andy Titterrell have both since departed, and the Seru Rabeni deal unfortunately fell through due to a failed medical.

Only Nottingham centre Tim Molenaar has arrived, with Eliota Fuamaono-Sapolu's delayed work permit meaning he only started in earnest against the Ospreys last week.

On paper, the position the Cherry and Whites find themselves in is weaker than where they were at the end of the last campaign, which finished with four straight Guinness Premiership defeats with the EDF Energy Cup final mauling added in for good measure. The less said about that, the better.

But a squad weaker in numbers is not necessarily poorer off with all things considered.

There was a period at the peak of former head coach Ryan's powers when Gloucester seemed to be signing players more to stop them

Chris Paterson, Gareth Cooper and Watkins are a trio who spring to mind, all three making little impact.

Watkins featured far more than he should have done because of some chronic injury issues in the backs, which if Gloucester suffer the same this season they will be right up the proverbial creek without a paddle in sight come the end of it.

But what is left is a squad of players who actually want to play for Gloucester. Many of those who left clearly did not. Olly Barkley, lain Balshaw and Anthony Allen, all good



players, but had lost, or never had, the passion for the club which Redpath will tell you is a vital pre-requisite.

Carlos Nieto was offered a contract elsewhere and he took it – that's his prerogative.

Others, including Mark Foster, Willie Walker, Jack Forster and Jack Adams, were deemed surplus to requirements, although, more in the case of the two former than the two latter, failed to take the opportunities which came their way (apart from when they were playing for Worcester).

For the record, I would have kept Adams, but none of the rest.

Creating his own special case was Ryan Lamb. But for the player, the club and probably for London Irish, it was best that Lamb moved on. The probability is he'll be back a few years down the line, or if he finds his niche elsewhere good luck to him.

The guys who have come in from lower down the leagues want to play for the club, are cheaper than those who have left, and come with a thirst to prove themselves. Akapusi Qera came from National One and he was a revelation, so there's no reason why we will not be talking about one of Paul Doran-Jones, Darren Dawidiuk, Tim Molenaar or Rupert Harden as a first team regular come Christmas.

Elsewhere, Pierre Capdevielle, Dave Attwood, Tom Voyce, Fuimaono-Sapolu and Nicky Robinson all look sound acquisitions.

So instead of getting depressed about less players, how about a bit of enthusiasm about a streamlined squad with a real motivator in charge, who win and lose together and actually care a jot for the hooped shirts they wear and the fans they play in front of.

The talk coming out of Kingsholm is of fresh starts, a new ethos and a new set of standards the squad lives by. Redpath and the players are no-doubt tired of being asked the same questions over and over since the changes were made at the start of the summer.

Today is their opportunity to put the words into practice and show the rest of the Guinness Premiership that Gloucester Rugby are here to compete this season.

HEAD COACH _

BRYAN REDPATH HEAD COACH

Q. THE GUINNESS PREMIERSHIP SEASON, YOUR FIRST AS HEAD COACH OF GLOUCESTER RUGBY, STARTS TODAY. YOU MUST BE INCREDIBLY EXCITED?

"Definitely. When I hung up my boots and moved into coaching, it was always my long term goal to be a Head Coach."

"It's happened a little sooner than I expected perhaps but I'm incredibly honoured to be leading Gloucester Rugby into this coming season."

"I've been here for four years now so I know the club, the players and staff. I'm familiar with the fans and the city. And I'm also aware of the importance of the relationship between the various parties."

"I've said in several interviews this summer that I feel that the relationship a player has with his club is all important. And I think we've got a squad of players here at Gloucester who buy into that."

"They'll be proud to wear the shirt and represent the club, its supporters and the city."

Q. PEOPLE WILL LOOK AT THE PLAYER TURNOVER FROM LAST SEASON. MANY OF THE DECISIONS WERE MADE BEFORE YOU TOOK OVER THE REINS, ARE YOU HAPPY WITH THE MAKE UP OF THE SQUAD?

"I'm very happy. What people may be unaware of is that our recruitment plans for this season



were very much a joint effort amongst the coaching staff so I certainly had a great deal of input into which new players we targeted."

"It's always a tricky time in the summer as a few of your players will arrive later than others as they'll be away on international tours etc so we've actually only had everyone here for the past few weeks."

"But everyone has settled in well, even Tim Molenaar who only trained with the squad for the first time on the Tuesday before the Ospreys game but came off the bench and showed some real promise."

"I'm also particularly happy that we've got a lot of lads who have come through the Academy system. They've been brought up in the 'Gloucester way' and there's some real talent there."

Q. HOW DO YOU FEEL PRESEASON HAS GONE? "IT'S ALL GONE REALLY WELL. THE FIRST GROUP OF PLAYERS REPORTED BACK PRETTY EARLY AND REPORTED BACK IN GREAT SHAPE."

"Mark Bitcon has done a great job with the squad from a strength and conditioning perspective. He's worked them hard but he's mixed things up and made it interesting as well."

"And that's also what we've tried to do as a coaching team. We haven't discarded everything that we did last season because a lot of

things worked well. But we have introduced a few new elements in an attempt to challenge the players and keep them fresh."

Q. WHAT HAVE YOU TAKEN FROM THE PRESEASON GAMES SO FAR?

"The three games have been interesting in different ways. We've taken the opportunity to give game time to as many different players as possible."

"For example, in Hazey's testimonial game, we had a look at some of the younger players like Freddie Burns and Jonny May in the backline and Paul Doran-Jones and Dave Attwood up front."

"More of the new faces have featured in the remaining games with Nicky Robinson getting a couple of matches and Eliota Fuimaono-Sapolu starting against the Ospreys."

"So, nearly everyone has had a run out and we've had the chance to look at a few different combinations."

"It's also been a valuable lesson in seeing how the different officials referee the game. We've had three different referees and all have had their own style. What we've picked up and what we must take into the new season is that we have to adapt very quickly otherwise we'll be refereed out of games."

"But we feel in good shape. We haven't picked up any serious injuries and we still have a few boys who are set to come back into the reckoning."

Q. THE AUTHORITIES HAVE TINKERED WITH THE LAWS AGAIN. HOW DO YOU FEEL ABOUT THE CHANGES?

"We just get on with it really.



We don't make the decisions or change the laws, we just have to adapt."

"I can see the logic behind having an extra prop forward in the matchday squad as a lot of games have gone uncontested in recent seasons and the scrum is an integral part of the game."

"And I think making pulling down the maul illegal is a positive step as it's a legitimate attacking weapon when well executed and helps to open up space in the wider channels if forwards are committed to defending it."

Q. BATH HAVE BEEN UNDER THE MEDIA SPOTLIGHT THIS SUMMER BUT THIS WON'T AFFECT THEIR FOCUS AHEAD OF THIS AFTERNOON'S GAME WILL IT?

"Not at all. That all happened some time ago now and they've had plenty of time to regroup and integrate their new players. If anything, it might have served to make them a tighter knit group."

"No, make no mistake, whoever they field this afternoon, Bath will be a tough prospect to open up the Guinness Premiership season."

"It'll be a battle but it's a fight that we're up for." "I'VE BEEN HERE FOR FOUR YEARS NOW SO I KNOW THE CLUB, THE PLAYERS AND STAFF. I'M FAMILIAR WITH THE FANS AND THE CITY. AND I'M ALSO AWARE OF THE IMPORTANCE OF THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE VARIOUS PARTIES."

STEVE HANLEY became the first ever Sale Sharks player to be granted a testimonial. Steve played 191 matches for the Sharks scoring 104 tries, 75 of those were recorded in the Premiership. The elusive winger gained one cap for England in the 1999 Five Nations when England were defeated by Wales. He made his club debut for Sale at Heywood Road in 1998 versus Cardiff.





OUR lock forward, Will James has taken over as Head Coach at South West One club Yatton where he has replaced former Bath and Bristol lock Mark Gabey who left the North Somerset Club at the end of last season. Will combines training and playing in the Premiership with the Cherry & Whites with his duties at Yatton. Plymouth born, Will, has had spells with Plymouth Albion and Cornish Pirates. Although he will be unable to attend Saturday matches, the North Somerset Club will have their matches recorded, cut down and sent to Will via the internet. Will who has been capped on four occasions by Wales, has now completed his Level Three coaching award. He made his full international debut when he was called up by Gareth Jenkins for Wales versus England at Twickenham in August 2007.

GLOUCESTER TALK

<u>THIS IS WHERE</u> <u>THE STORY REALLY</u> <u>STARTS...</u>

OR does it? Usually, at this point in the season, I can wax lyrical about how nice it is to be home, and what a lot of laughter and tears we have to look forward to over the next nine months or so. But it's not like that, this time round, for the simple reason that, throughout 2009, rugby has not seemed to go away at all.

There was the Lions tour of course, where there was enough controversy to keep us all interested and even infuriated at times, but I wasn't really thinking about that so much as events on the home front.

The debacle at the end of last season has left some open wounds that won't be healed until they are treated out on the field and results throw a cloak over the events of last May. Perhaps we can then forget them, in much the same way that England's Ashes win has thrown a veil over the 5-0 thrashing the cricketers suffered in Australia

only two years ago.

Hindsight is a wonderful thing, and looking back, perhaps we should all have seen that there was something rotten in the state of Kingsholm rather earlier than most people did. We were losing highly promising young players to other clubs at a positively indecent rate. When we won matches, the manner of the victories didn't exactly fill one with enthusiasm.

Then, after the season had thankfully ground to a close, all the recriminations and wrangling started. To misquote the Duke of Wellington, I don't know what hey did to the players, but by God, they frightened me.

Tom Walkinshaw's 'root and branch' investigation seemed to take an age, but that was only right, because the last thing we can afford is some sort of half-cocked fudge.

Have the powers-that-be got it right? The next few months will tell, but my instincts are optimistic.



There are changes to the squad every year, of course, but I can't recall such a wholesale revolving door as we have observed this season. That's bound to cause some trepidation in the ranks, but we do have the reassurance that there is still a solid nucleus of experienced elver-eaters who know what it's like to be a Gloucester player, to keep things on course. Many of these guys come from the lower divisions, but we shouldn't read too much into that. We can all think of players who came here with huge reputations and impeccable qualifications who simply failed to cut the mustard. On the other hand we have blokes who arrived from lesser clubs, such as Qera and Will James, who have really made a name for themselves since becoming

Bryan Redpath, known as 'Brush' to the squad, I'm told.

As far as I know, his coaching experience was, shall we say, limited when Dean Ryan recruited him, and I'm sure it never occurred to him that he was bringing in his eventual successor. Now, Bryan has inherited a very hot seat indeed, and it seems from the side lines that he has set about the job with admirable enthusiasm and not a little imagination and energy.

He is having to make do with a smaller squad this season, and isn't the only coach around the Premiership to face the same restriction. But then, having a large squad is not a guarantee of either success or silverware, as no one knows better than Gloucester. Perhaps having a tight-knit group has strengths of its own, leaving less room for dressing-room cliques and factions to arise, and more opportunity for building an ethos where loyalty to the team and the club is a primary consideration. Prima donnas need not apply.

G loucester and Bath may not like to admit they have too much in common, but the theme of change has certainly been familiar to both clubs during an eventful summer.

It has been a case of out with the old, in with the new at both Kingsholm and the Recreation Ground.

No fewer than nine new faces have arrived at Gloucester, while 14 players have departed. There has also been the small matter of a new head honcho on the coaching side, with Bryan Redpath stepping up to replace Dean Ryan.

Down at Bath, meanwhile, 11 players have headed for the exit (although four of those departures, it is safe to suggest, were not planned) and eight new arrivals have linked up with the squad.

They, too, have also made changes on the coaching front, with Martin Haag coming in to replace Mark Bakewell as forwards chief.

As if today's Guinness Premiership derby opener was in need of any additional spice, there is the intrigue that surrounds how each team will deal with their summer of change.

Bath's ins and outs may have generated more headlines (and largely negative ones at that) but their pre-season form suggests Steve Meehan's men are moving quickly onto the next stage of their development.

If anything, their pack looks more mobile and dynamic than before thanks to the signings of David

Several minutes from time, Academy centre Jonny May pounced as the Connacht defence couldn't handle an up and under from Dave Lewis, scooped up the loose ball and ran in untouched to score his first senior try at Kingsholm. It's entirely possible that May was gently rebuked in the dressing room after the game for celebrating his score before touching the ball down but there was no denying his delight as he crossed the line.



Gloucester Rugby clinched their first victory of the 2009-10 preseason campaign with a 29-19 win over Connacht but were made to work very hard for it by a dogged and determined Irish side.



If anyone had turned up at Kingsholm expecting to see Connacht quickly capitulate and allow Gloucester to romp to a 40 or 50 point victory then they were to be sadly mistaken.

The visitors didn't come with a particularly ambitious game plan. But they did come prepared to compete and to make life hard for Gloucester. And they duly ticked both boxes.

In hindsight, Gloucester did make life difficult for themselves. From the off, they were on the front foot and dominating territory and possession.

However, on two separate occasions, they managed to turn over possession whilst deep in Connacht territory and pushing for a score and ended up under their own posts contemplating a long range score from the visitors.

Against such a polished outfit, even without their British Lions, it would have been easy for the game to slip away particularly in a friendly with little on the line.

But Gloucester hit back hard, forcing the Ospreys onto the back

Referee Nigel Owens took an age to award the score as he consulted his touch judge but award it he did.

There was initial disappointment as Gloucester's desperate late fightback was to no avail but, given time to reflect, the positives outweighed the negatives and Head Coach Bryan Redpath has some pleasant selection considerations ahead of the Bath game.
