We've worked hard in training and we've slowly but surely welcomed back a few of the boys who have been unavailable in recent weeks, the likes of Peter Buxton, Olly Morgan and Lesley Vainikolo, which is a boost.

### GARETH BUTLER GLOUCESTER VS NORTH

D ISCIPLINE has become a bit of a buzz word around Kingsholm after the opening two rounds of the Guinness Premiership.

Gloucester have managed to ship an impressive five yellow cards, four in one game last week and three inside the last quarter, which must be some kind of record.

There can be few arguments about any of them. Andy Hazell's stamp was as clear as day to get things off and running against Bath a couple of weeks back.


Then Charlie Sharples joined the club with his early tackle towards the end of the first half last week. If the winger hadn't hauled back Elvis Seveali'i he was in for a clear try so you can have some sympathy with his actions. I fully expected referee Dean Richards to go under the sticks afterwards and award a penalty try so Gloucester probably got off lightly.

Then came the 10 minutes of craziness at the end of the game. Gloucester were actually leading the second half 7-3 when Akapusi Qera broke from a scrum too quickly having already been warned. It was probably slightly harsh for a relatively minor infringement.

Minutes later, and with the forwards under immense pressure a man down, Pierre Capdevielle dragged a maul down right on the Gloucester line. Another situation where Richards could have gone under the sticks, which he did shortly afterwards with Capdevielle off the field and Gloucester down to 13.

Gareth Delve's yellow card was the







most clear cut of the whole lot. The whole stadium saw what he did so the referee couldn't ignore it. Whatever his motives were you can't lash out like that in the modern game and expect to get away with it, especially with the spotlight currently on the world of rugby.

There has been a massive onus on pride and passion from Bryan Redpath since he took over from Dean Ryan. It seems the players have taken up that mantle and are really on the mental edge when they are out on the field this season.

Hazell in particular pushed the boundaries to their very limit against Bath throughout his time on the field.

The problem is when you go out so aggressively you find yourself constantly on the edge of the law.

That aggression can sometimes blind players and impair their ability to control what they are doing – which was certainly evident in the case of Hazell against Bath.

But then when he reined it in a bit against London Irish he was less effective, Steffon Armitage getting the better of him on the day.

While the aggression and commitment certainly needed cranking after the disappointing end to last season, that has to come within, or at least on the edge of, the laws.

Premiership games cannot be won with four players spending time off the field. Hazell admitted himself that his moment of madness only served to jeopardise the result of the West Country derby.

The skill in playing aggressively is to know where the line is. Certain players have the knack of pushing the laws and getting away with it – and they are consistently the ones regarded as the best.

The England World Cup winning XV was full of them – Back, Hill, Dallaglio and Johnson.

In the current game Richie McCaw, George Smith and Schalk Burger are masters of the art, although the latter showed against the Lions that even the best lose it on the odd occasion.

A return of the passion to Kingsholm is something not one fan doesn't want to see.

There may have been a time when the Kingsholm pack was feared because the players got away with foul play and as a result the opponents were intimidated. An aggressive forward effort is crucial to Gloucester's success this season, to make up for what they lack in size up front.

But it is also crucial that players are savvy as to when they bend the laws and which referees will allow them to get away with bits and pieces others will not.

When it came down to it last week, Gloucester were soundly beaten by a better London Irish pack. Their frustration with that boiled over and the yellow cards were the result.

### BRYAN REDPATH HEAD COACH

Q. THE LAST TWO WEEKS HAVE BEEN A VIVID EXAMPLE OF THE HIGHS AND LOWS OF LIFE IN THE GUINNESS PREMIERSHIP?

"Absolutely. Nobody ever said that this was going to be easy. The Guinness Premiership is an incredibly competitive league. I know it's a cliché and, you hear it time and again, but any team can beat any other on any given day."

"You only have to be a fraction below your best and other sides have the ability to take full advantage. Bath didn't play to their potential at Kingsholm a fortnight ago and we didn't at the Madejski last weekend."

Q. WHAT HAVE YOU LEARNED FROM THE TWO GAMES SO FAR AND WHAT WILL YOU BE FOCUSSING ON FROM HERE ON IN?

"I thought that we did a very professional job against Bath. With it being the first game of the season, in front of the Sky cameras, it was a big occasion and emotions were running high."

"Now, the old heads like
Tins have seen these sorts of
occasion many times before.
However, we had a number of
new players who were pulling
on the Gloucester shirt for the
first time and it would have
been very easy for those players
to be distracted."

"In fact, the new players fitted



in very well. Nicky Robinson gave us the control we needed at fly half. He took the right options and kept us in the right places on the field."

"Meanwhile, Eliota Fuimaono-Sapolu put in an excellent performance considering his late arrival at the club following World Cup duty with Samoa in the summer. The Shed seem to have taken him to their heart already and the feeling seems to be mutual."

"And we've all had a good chuckle about Dave Attwood, the newly anointed 'Enforcer' of Gloucester Rugby according to a certain internet messageboard! Seriously, Dave did a very solid job and we were very happy with him."


"Overall, we did what we had to against Bath but there was still a lot of room for improvement. The game was still very much in the balance midway through the second half when the two interceptions clinched it for us."

"We need to be more clinical when we get ourselves into those situations and close out those types of games."

"Last weekend against London Irish, we simply didn't execute well enough. We started well and the first quarter of the match was pretty even."

"But then they started to apply pressure to our lineout and we didn't help our cause by committing a few turnovers in our own half which gave them all the possession and territory they needed."

"We were over worked in defence as a result, the yellow cards followed and the rest is history."



"It's important to keep it in perspective though. London Irish are an excellent side. They finished runners up in the Guinness Premiership final and came within a point of winning the whole shooting match. They were good, we weren't and the better team won. End of story."

"So, we've done our analysis this week but it's important not to over analyse these things. We've identified what we have to do this weekend and have worked hard on it this week."

Q. NORTHAMPTON HAVE WON ONE FROM TWO, THE SAME AS GLOUCESTER. THEY'LL PRESENT A TOUGH CHALLENGE?

"They could well have won two from two. They came within inches of beating Saracens at Wembley last weekend. And, knowing Jim Mallinder as I do, that will irk him and he'll have been working Saints hard this week."

"They've done incredibly well since their return to the Premiership. The teams coming back up to the top flight from the Championship have traditionally taken a little while to find their feet."

"However, Northampton bucked the trend last season. They were competitive in the Guinness Premiership, made the semi finals of the EDF Energy Cup and won the European Challenge Cup of course. To compete on three fronts like that takes some doing."

"So, we will have to up our game against them this afternoon. I haven't been able to fault our commitment and endeavour in the past two matches but we do need to look after our own ball and execute our game plan."

Q. GIVEN ALL OF THE ABOVE, IT MUST BE SOME COMFORT TO BE BACK AT KINGSHOLM THIS AFTERNOON?

"Without a doubt. I've said in recent weeks that if the players showed that they were giving everything for the Gloucester cause that the supporters would respond accordingly and I think we saw that against Bath when the backing was magnificent."

### HOW WOULD YOU IMPROVE THE END OF




### **SEASON PLAY OFFS?**


They are hotly tipped by many pundits for a top four berth by the end of this season, given their recruitment over the summer and the fact that they have Jim Mallinder – one of the brightest


The annual salary budgets per season for French clubs are in advance of the Guinness Premiership. The following apply, Stade Francais £8.88m, Clermont Avergne £8.34m, Toulouse £8.34m, Toulon £6.90m, Biarritz £6.41m, Brive £6.41m, Perpignan 6.17m, Bayonne £5.67, Montpellier £ 5.67m, Castres £5.42m, Bourgoin £4.78m, Montauban £4.68m, Dax £3.85m, Stade Montois £2.46m. In the Guinness Premiership each club has a salary cap of £4m.

WE have had only one of the twelve Zimbabwe born players to have played in the Premiership. That was prop forward Paul Johnstone who came to Kingsholm from Bristol in 1999. Other players to feature from that country have been Garth Chamberlain (Wasps 2004-), Dean Dewdney (Bristol 1999-2001), Peter Dixon (Bath 2005-), Scott Gray (Northampton 2008-), Steve Hartley (Bath, Sale 1999-2001), Kai Horstmann (Worcester 2005-), Nils Mordt (Northampton, London Irish 2004-2008), Conan Sharman (London Scottish 1998-1999), Doug Trivella (Rotherham 1998-2001), Kennedy Tsimba (Bath 1997-1998).





### REVIEWING the red and yellow cards received in the 2008-2009 season, these were the total administered in the Guinness Premiership, Sale and Worcester 13 each, Gloucester 12, London Irish 11, Bristol, Harlequins and Newcastle 10 each, Saracens and Leicester 9 each, Northampton 8, Bath and Wasps 7 each.

**LUKE NARRAWAY**, our England back row forward, had been helping out the Malvern players in their pre-season training at their Spring Lane ground. The Worcester based player had been included in Martin Johnson's pre-season England Saxons squad along with team mate Nick Wood. Luke now faces a 3 month break due to a back operation.



**NORTHAMPTON SAINTS** are seeking planning permission to build a £6 million 3,000 seater stand at the Sturtridge end of the ground which along with 10 new corporate boxes and a function suite will see the capacity at Franklin's Gardens rise from 13,500 to £17,000 for the 2010-2011 season.



OUR former player, Chris Paterson was voted the 2008-2009 'Player of the Season' by the Scotland Ruby Supporter's Club. Last season Chris recorded 196 points for Edinburgh – three tries, 32 conversions, 38 penalties and 1 dropped goal. The utility back now has 95 caps and a personal point's tally of 738 points. Chris now needs three tries to pass Tony Stanger and lan Smith's joint record of 24 tries.




NICKY ROBINSON, our close season signing from Cardiff Blues, made 109 appearances for the Blues, with 20 as a replacement. In a career which started in the 2003-2004 season, he recorded 22 tries, kicked 99 penalties and 115 conversions. He also recorded 15 drop goals. In total, Nicky totalled 682 points in all competitions for the Blues. In a career with Cardiff RFC and Cardiff Blues Nicky made 179 appearances

(149 +30), scored 33 tries, kicked 155 penalties and 191 conversions and recorded 18 dropped goals. This combined total took Nicky Robinson past the thousand point mark with 1065.

### STARTING THE WAY WE MEAN TO GO ON

IT'S always good to start the season with a win. When the game is here at Kingsholm a victory is imperative. When the opponents are Bath, any other result is simply unthinkable.

The problem this time round was that we just did not know what sort of a team we had. Everyone put a brave face on things, of course. We knew there was ample talent in the squad, and we were told that preseason training had gone well.

But Bath management was telling their supporters precisely the same things, and the coach, recognised as one of the shrewdest in the business, was telling their players that they had the best chance in yonks of putting one across Gloucester at Kingsholm.

We took that with a whole sack of Saxa salt, of course, but a nagging doubt still remained. Omens were good, but you can have fifteen of the best players in the world out there, and if for some indefinable reason things don't click, then you're up the proverbial creek with

a conspicuous shortage of paddles. Things can all go swimmingly on the training ground, but it's all very different when you get out there on match day with a whole horde of supporters, from both sides, yelling their heads off at you.

We did have one thing going for us, and that was the shirt. Old players, and some current ones will tell you what a privilege it is to wear the cherry-and-white hoops, and how they felt two inches taller when they pulled it on.

Not many clubs can claim quite that indefinable incentive. I'm sure that Leicester has it, and, no doubt, today's opponents can claim the same. But there aren't many others.

Certainly not Bath. Some of us can remember the decades when they were distinctly inferior opposition against whom we would field a second-string side. They've come a long way since then, of course, but the name doesn't have the mythology behind it that Gloucester does.

This pride and passion stems from the days when virtually all the players were native Gloucester lads. If you were born in the city, it was simply there, part of everyday life, and you couldn't avoid I even if you wanted to, which you didn't

Nowadays, with players arriving from all over the world, that no longer applies, but the Kingsholm virus is highly contagious, and can infect players, wherever they come from. We never had a more loyal servant than Terry Fanolua, for example, and I'm sure that if you were to cut off one of Olivier Azam's legs, you would find 'GLAWSTER' written all the way through.

How long it will take someone like Mr. Molenaar, who comes from New Zealand, has a Dutch passport, and arrives from Nottingham, to succumb, I don't know, but it will be pretty quickly if Bryan Redpath has his way.

Bryan's huge efforts to instil traditional Kingsholm values and passions into his squad do seem to be bearing fruit. They were certainly evident at the Bath match, and long may they continue. We can put up with losing the occasional match, just so long as there's some fire in the performance. We'll do our best to supply some fuel from the touchline.

I refuse to get into the 'sprint v. marathon' analogy because it has been done to death, but the fact remains that if you're going to be on the wrong end of a beating like that, then it's as well to get it over with at the start of the season. Now we shall see if Bryan Redpath's 'pride and passion' offensive has borne fruit. If so, someone is going to have to suffer for last Sunday's humiliation.

Let's get one thing straight. There was just one reason why we lost last week. On the day, they were better than us. Nevertheless, there are one or two features which bear close examination.

Eight yellow cards mean that you have the equivalent of playing the whole game with 14 men, and you can't take on a team of the calibre of London Irish in those circumstances. Furthermore, I don't think you can blame a group of fit, aggressive young sportsmen for becoming niggly and frustrated when a continual stream of yellow cards are being awarded against you.

I wasn't there, I didn't see it, so I would be foolish for me to comment on the justice or otherwise of the sin-binnings, but the fact remains that the referee who awards so many in one direction is creating a pressure cooker. Eventually, the lid is going to blow.

Far be it from me to criticise any referee at any time, theirs is the most difficult job in the game and I'm not casting any stones on this occasion. However, I can't help noting that the official concerned

last Sunday was the same one who sent Harlequins' George Robson off after about a minute of the first game of the season.

Lightning appears to have struck twice for Mr. Richards, and I can't help feeling a bit sorry for him. It's an old saying that the best referees are the ones you don't notice, but I'm afraid that here's one official who is going to be well and truly under the microscope this season.

Years ago, we had a notoriously stern referee named Welsby. He became known as the 'Hanging Judge'. The point about him was that, as the players agreed, he was a damned good ref.

Perhaps Mr. Dean Richards will also become an outstanding official. I hope so, because the game is notoriously short of up-and-coming refs, with the courage of their convictions. Are we seeing the birth of another?



### GLOUCESTER SUFFER SECOND 'A LEAGUE' DEFEAT



A young Gloucester side took on a Wasps outfit containing considerable Guinness Premiership experience in the A League at Kingsholm on Monday night and gave a good account of themselves in a losing cause.

The Gloucester team featured many of this year's Academy. Behind the scrum, Jonny May, Reuben Haile, Mike Wilcox and Jordi Pasqualin started and, in the pack, the likes of Yann Thomas, Danny Wright, Richard Jenkins and Marcus Brown all got the nod.




"We've started with a new group and pledged that we'll work hard. We may not win every time but all I can ask is that they put everything on the line and not hide behind any excuses."

What Bryan Redpath had promised the Gloucester supporters was a side who would give everything for the cause. And the team duly delivered.




There was no lack of endeavour from Gloucester. Head Coach Bryan Redpath couldn't fault the team's commitment at the post match press conference.
