in mid October in Biarritz, the conditions were glorious but it's a game that still rankles with me.



KEN NOTTAGE CLARIFIES CITIZEN COMMENTS

Gloucester Rugby MD Ken Nottage recently responded to supporter comments following an article printed in the Gloucester Citizen on Wednesday December 30th.

With 2009 rapidly drawing to a close, the Citizen asked Nottage to participate in an article to review events at Gloucester Rugby over the past decade. Ken joined Gloucester Rugby in June 2009 so his time at the club almost exactly spans the timescale in question.

Detailed answers were provided to 14 questions posed by the Citizen and were published in full in the December 30th edition.

However, also in the same edition, one quote was pulled out and used as the basis for an additional news item which provoked comments from supporters as it could be read that it implied criticism of the club's supporters, something Nottage strenuously denied today.

"We enjoy a good relationship with the Citizen and, when I was approached to contribute to the article, I did so in good faith as I thought it would make interesting editorial and provide some insight into the challenges of running of the club over the past 10 years and into the future."

"The overall article ran to almost 3,000 words but one quote has been used to create a second article. Unfortunately, the headline

used to head up the second article is slightly misleading."

"At no point did I say that future success was down to the fans nor did I issue any sort of challenge to them."


"When I was asked about the off field challenges facing the club, my comment about attendances figures being down this season and Gloucester Rugby needing ongoing support was simply a statement of fact and not any criticism of the club's supporters or their commitment."

"Gloucester Rugby is in the same situation as many other Guinness Premiership clubs. Attendances are down this season, for a number of reasons, and that affects us financially."

"I would not dream of criticising our supporters who stick with us through thick and thin. We fully appreciate that a lot of people have less disposable income during the current difficult financial times we face and have to be more discerning about how they spend it."

"I acknowledged this elsewhere in the original article and also stressed that the opinions of our supporters really do matter to us. They are our lifeblood."

"I honestly believe that Gloucester Rugby has the most faithful and passionate supporters in English rugby. My words were in no way

ON behalf of everyone at Gloucester Rugby, I'd like to wish the players, staff and supporters of Biarritz Olympique a very warm welcome to Kingsholm this afternoon.


They'll all have travelled a long way for this afternoon's game and I gather it's a wee bit colder here in Gloucester than it has been in the South of France recently! The other Scots in our set up will back me up when I say that this is a mild winter by Scottish standards!

Where we do need to turn up the heat is on the pitch. Biarritz, of course, top Pool 2 of the Heineken Cup having won all four of their matches so far and are going pretty well in the Top 14 table in France in sixth place.

We currently occupy second place in Pool 2 and, given, we're ten points behind Biarritz, it's unlikely that we'll catch them to head the group.

However, there is still plenty to play for. The two best second placed teams will still qualify for the quarter finals of the Heineken Cup and the third, fourth and fifth ranked Heineken Cup Pool runners-up will qualify for the knockout stages of the European Challenge Cup.

Above all, though, we want to win every game we play. Winning the next two games will be tough, make no mistake, but would give us real



self belief and confidence as we look forward.

It's our first game for a couple of weeks with last weekend's game at Newcastle having been postponed. Whilst it's always frustrating to lose a game, I think that in this case, the administrators made absolutely the right call. Health and safety, both on and off the pitch, has to be paramount and it would have been tough to call

off the game if our supporters had already made their way to Newcastle.

What it has done is give us another week to let a few bumps and bruises heal and ensure that we've been able to focus on preparing for Biarritz this afternoon and Newport Gwent Dragons next weekend.

We need to build on what we did well against Worcester. I was pleased that we were creating chances in that game. Our work rate was exceptional, we broke tackles and made line breaks. The Worcester defence was very good but we didn't finish off the openings that we worked so hard to achieve. That meant that the game stayed close when a second score would have given us a bit of breathing space and made the rest of the game a completely different affair.

Again, it came down to detail and not quite executing properly. We turned over a lot of ball in attacking positions including a number of offloads out of the tackle which went to the opposition.

Ultimately to draw was frustrating as we dominated so many aspects of the game but only came away with two points.

We played a lot of good rugby though and that's encouraging. And to do so in front of a full house at Kingsholm was great. Our supporters were magnificent on the day and they should pat themselves on the back for playing their part in getting behind us when we were trying to get back into the game.

Our endeavour to come back after half time couldn't be faulted. The players

demonstrated exactly how much they want to play for Gloucester. With a little bit of confidence, I think we did enough to show that we are capable of being a very good side.

We will need more of that this afternoon as Biarritz aren't top of the pool for nothing. They showed down at the Parc des Sports Aguilera just how lethal they can be in attack if you give them a sniff of an opening.

We'll also have to keep an eye on our discipline in our own half which wasn't too bad against Worcester. Willie Walker was limited to kicking one penalty although arguably he missed an easy one towards the end.

We can't rely on Dmitri Yachvili being so generous though. He's top scorer in the tournament so far and that doesn't happen by accident. He's a quality kicker in addition to all the other aspects of his game and we need to deprive him of the opportunity to accumulate cheap points.

We have a big few months ahead of us and our destiny lies in our own hands. We can't hide behind injuries and suspensions as an excuse.

It's time to step it up a notch, starting this afternoon, and start delivering performances which realise our potential.

We know that we're a better side than we've shown so far this season and now's the time to start showing it.

With a year left on his contract, you wonder how hard Gloucester tried to keep him last season, and how much they wish they would have done given how this year has gone.

It is all water under the bridge now, and I'm sure Balshaw would love to cross for one this afternoon, and few in the Shed would begrudge him provided the end result is in their favour.

BEST TRY YOU'VE EVER SCORED?


I think it was playing club rugby for Wellington in New Zealand. The opposition had a couple of All Blacks in their line up so that's my claim to fame.




THE SAD passing of Bleddyn Williams last summer brought back memories of his unique distinction of captaining both his club Cardiff and his country Wales to victory against the touring New Zealand 'All Blacks' in 1953. It was the last time that Wales defeated the 'All Blacks'. Bleddyn was born in Taff Wells in 1923 and became one of eight brothers who played for Cardiff. As a centre three-quarter he recorded 41 tries in a season for Cardiff. In his career Bledwyn amassed 185 tries for Cardiff. He had the honour in 2005 of being awarded the M.B.E. in the New Year Honours list.



This request has come from



Two points to either side but the question on everyone's lips as the post match discussions started in earnest was how on earth did Gloucester fail to win by a country mile?



DAVE ATTWOOD SECOND TO NONE

second row Dave Attwood has been one of the big successes of what has otherwise been a mixed season for Gloucester. A summer arrival from relegated Bristol, his home city team, he has quickly made himself a firm favourite of the Cherry and White faithful with a string of sparkling performances that have seen him reduce some big-name opponents to relative anonymity.

A talented swimmer and athlete – he threw the discus

internationally at age group level - he doesn't fit the old stereotype of a lumbering lock, with a joint honours degree in Physics and Philosophy from Bristol University, achieved while on a part-time professional contract at Bristol Rugby.

"No, I guess it is a bit unusual but it fits in with the way that rugby is trying to develop younger players. I chose physics and philosophy because it was just about the broadest course there was, so it gives me options for later life. The game is so physical now that there's a likelihood that


a player's career can be cut short, so having a qualification outside of rugby is ever more important. If I'm honest, I was pretty much full-time at both rugby and at University, which was a bit of a blast!

"It's never an easy decision to leave your home club, but it was made easier by the fact that I didn't need to leave the city and I still have a lot of friends at Bristol Rugby. I had to step back from the emotion of the situation, and looking back I'm confident that I made the right decision."

style of rugby we're trying to play seems to suit my game."

If you watch Attwood in a game he doesn't hold back on expressing an opinion, irrespective of the seniority or reputation of the players around him.

"That's just me: I like to have a bit of a say in how things are going. I like to feel that I can make people accountable, and that in turn I can be held accountable for my actions – that was spotted and actively encouraged by the coaches. You can't have too many leaders in a side and that's an aspect of my game that I'm keen to develop.

"I'm lucky to have some really good people around me at Gloucester. I travel up from Bristol with Alex Brown and Will James, and as they're second rows too they have both been influences on me. Gareth Delve is our club captain, and I obviously try to observe the way that he behaves – how he reacts to the things around him and so on. Mike Tindall has been there and done it all at the highest level of the game – in a season that hasn't yet gone as well as we'd hoped, it's interesting to see how someone like him copes with things. As the heavier second row I pack down behind the tight head, and Greg Somerville, with his wealth of experience, knows most








play consistently well for your club side so that's what I'll try to do."

At only 22, Dave Attwood already cuts an impressive figure, and with England's second row problems, it would be surprising if he wasn't already somewhere on their radar. The impression he gives is of being level headed, but driven in terms of what he wants to achieve in the game, and his first try for Gloucester which snatched the draw against Worcester, has only served to make him even more of a favourite at Kingsholm.
