

## GARETH BUTLER VIEW FROM THE CITIZEN

Since returning from a foot injury which plagued the start of his season, Gloucester prop Nick Wood has been in pretty impressive form.

He was the man to break the dam where contracts were concerned – the first of 12 to sign new deals when he put pen to paper on another three years in January.

After coming through surrounded by big named props of the like of Phil Vickery and Trevor Woodman, Wood is now starting to impart his knowledge of the game on to some of the new young props at Kingsholm, including the likes of Yann Thomas, who made his first start recently, and Shaun Knight, who was in action for England Under-20s last night.

Wood knows playing in the front row is all about performing as a unit that includes the whole front five.

"I've got the kind of game where if it's going well in the tight the rest comes off the back of it," he said. "It all comes from when my basics are going well, my scrum and lineout. It builds from there.

"For me to play well I need the guy next to me and the guy the other side of him doing their job well. Plus the two guys behind. It's massive.

"The front five is massive. It's never a single man battle, it's always together."

Wood felt a bit sorry for the guys who produce the heroics against Harlequins in the LV= Cup recently at the Stoop.



Despite coming back from 20-0 down, most of them found themselves on the bench or out of the squad altogether the following week.

"It was tough for the guys who played at Harlequins in the LV= Cup," he said. "They went out and did a job against all the odds.

"They were up against it 20-0 down with a lot of new faces out there, including Yann Thomas and Rupert Harden from a front row perspective, which was good to see."

Wood is careful about the advice he offers to the young props coming through. He feels it is important to respect that they are different players so only offers help when he thinks it is needed, or when it is invited.

He said: "I try to offer my bit here and there but at the same time I try and respect that they are different players to me.

"I'll offer them advice on bits of

the game I can help them with and after that it's down to them to develop and put the work in where they need to. So I offer technical

advice if I think it's needed."

That he is now offering advice comes from the fact that his own game has developed well, although he still feels he has a way to go as his 'man-strength' develops.

"Skills wise I don't struggle," he said. "But I've been through a stage where I poured all my energy into scrum, into line-out and into defence and occasionally other parts of the game were sacrificed.

"The scrum doesn't get easier but as you get your man strength at round about my age it gets easier in a sense that you're not pouring all your energy into one thing so you can start contributing more elsewhere in a game."

Wood has hit some good form with the rest of the team of late, although he will admit the scrum

came under pressure against Leicester last week.

He also recently played for the England Saxons against Ireland, where he packed down alongside club colleague Paul Doran-Jones, something he saw as an important freshening up period.

"It was good to get involved in something different which gives you a fresh perspective," he said. "It meant I could come back to Gloucester with a real hunger for it again.

"It was a freshening-up period. Two weeks away, something different and you end up looking forward to coming back to what you know and who you know and playing the way you like."

And after signing a new contract back in January he sees no reason why he cannot finish his career at Kingsholm.

"I was fortunate that Gloucester gave me a good offer which allowed me to commit to the only club I've been at," he said. "It's a tough time of year for everyone. This is a tight-knit group and the reality is people do have to end up moving on due to financial constraints or if a big offer comes in.

"But I'm happy to commit my next three years here along with the majority of the squad.

"That will take me to 10 years in the first team, which is good. I don't see any reason why I can't start and finish my career at Gloucester. Things may change in the next few years but the way I feel is there's nothing wrong with that."

IT'S obviously good to be back at Kingsholm after the trip to Welford Road last weekend when we suffered our first defeat of 2010.

One of the journalists at the post match press conference asked Denis Betts if he considered the defeat at Leicester not to be as big a setback as if we'd lost at Worcester for example!


Putting aside the fact that the question was slightly disrespectful to Worcester and that we don't actually have a great record at Sixways, we were disappointed because you go into every game wanting to win.

We'd travelled to Leicester full of hope and ambition. We'd taken a lot of confidence from our recent performances and knew that the game against the Tigers would tell us exactly where we are with our game.

The obvious answer is that we're not currently at the same level as Leicester. Don't get me wrong, we competed well and I felt that we genuinely caused them problems at times.

However, we were guilty of not capitalising on the half chances that we created and, some key errors when we found ourselves in good positions in their 22, prevented us from building the sort of pressure that the Tigers applied to us.

But, in the same way as we didn't get too carried away after the wins over Harlequins, we shouldn't view the Leicester



defeat as a setback.

We have to do our analysis, take heart from the positives and use the rest to help us establish exactly where we stand in relation to the likes of Leicester and how hard we have to work in order to be competitive over the remaining weeks of the season.

We have to work hard because we still have an awful lot to play for this season on three fronts. If we are to achieve any degree of success this season, it'll take application and a little bit of luck.

There are going to be no easy games. People may have looked at the 46 points that we scored against Harlequins here a fortnight ago and thought that we were going to be able to do that on a regular basis.

But, being brutally honest, we were gifted a few scores against Quins and that's why we weren't getting too excited after that game.

The Guinness Premiership this season is incredibly tight. We beat Quins and moved up to sixth from ninth. We lost at Leicester and dropped to ninth from sixth! That's how quickly things can change.

Sale will come here today in no mood to roll over and let us get back to winning ways. They'll be desperate for a win themselves. They've lost six (?) on the bounce and their home defeat to Leeds Carnegie last Friday will have sent a few alarm bells ringing in Stockport.

They're just above Worcester and Leeds in the league table and will come here scrapping for everything. Plus, when you have someone like Charlie Hodgson in the side, you'll always have someone capable of putting points on the board.

If we needed any reminder of that, we only had to look back on our trip to Edgeley Park back in October when we lost 28-23.

We lost Mike Tindall to injury after a quarter of an hour, had Charlie Sharples sent off before half time and outscored them by three tries to one. We still lost though and that was because Charlie booted seven penalties and a conversion.

I obviously finished my playing career at Sale, still have a number of close friends there and will always look back fondly on my time at the club.

Yet there'll be no room for sentiment on my part this afternoon. To keep challenging for the top half of the table, we need a win this afternoon and everyone at the club has been 100% focussed on that goal this week.

It's a massive few weeks for Gloucester Rugby. We've got ourselves into a position where every game matters.

Next week we travel to Wasps in the Premiership, the following week we've got Cardiff Blues in the semi final of the LV=Cup. If we win that, the final is the week afterwards!

If we don't make the final of the LV=Cup, we'll be straight back into the Premiership for a couple of weeks before the Amlin Challenge Cup quarter final.

That kind of schedule is exactly why I said earlier that we'll need to work hard and enjoy a bit of luck. But, we'd rather be competing in these competitions rather than be on the outside looking in!

I'd probably buy some land and build on it. Land in the countryside with some scenic views. Not for development reasons, just somewhere to build a personal home. Land's always a good investment as well.


### BEST TRY YOU'VE EVER SCORED?


Probably the one I scored last year

## IF YOU COULD BE IN A BAND, WHICH ONE WOULD YOU CHOOSE?


I'd go for the Jackson 5 because I like that kind of music and it would involve a lot of dancing which is always good fun.





This system of scouring the lower leagues does seem to have worked for us thus far, but it needs a shrewd eye for a player to pick the right aspirant.

Tim Taylor obviously has talent, as has several other new faces around the squad this season. Freddie Burns and Jonny May are just two examples. What makes Taylor stand out for me is his utter composure. He seems to be unfazed by anything, and appears to have plenty of time whatever he's doing.

Always a sign of class, that.

The try is duly scored.

Now tell me. If you had to pick any player in the world to come alongside in that situation, who would you pick other than James Simpson Daniel? I suspect, no one.

Anyone who was here for the Harlequins game will recognise that as a rather fanciful description of Gloucester's penultimate try, and skipper Gareth Delve's epic part in it. And it wasn't really necessary.

The game was already well and truly won, and dying with the ball would have been perfectly acceptable. For that matter, a Harlequins try wouldn't really have mattered all that much.

But Gareth Delve didn't see it that way, and you have to admire him for that. It was a measure of the man, both as player and captain.

At the Stoop six days earlier, Gloucester Rugby scored a late try against Harlequins to win the game.




It had all started well for Gloucester. A couple of early penalties from Nicky Robinson established a 6-0 lead and Gloucester's recent fine form seemed set to continue.

It all started up front. It had been a rare old ding dong in the scrums in the opening quarter but the home pack established a slight edge and kicked on from there.


The Tigers had gratefully welcomed back of host of stars from international duty for this game and one of them, Toby Flood, enjoyed one of those afternoons when everything went right.
