THE FINISHING STRAIGHT


Classic semi-finals rarely come in pairs.
One last year, maybe, another in a couple of seasons' time but the 2010 vintage, gorged on a week ago at Cardiff and Northampton, was Grand Cru. Events there nurtured great expectations for today's LV= Cup climax that bridges a seven-year gap since the pair last met for silverware in a final.

Take last weekend's man of the match winners, Soane Tonga'uiha, the Northampton loose-head prop in the 31-20 win over Saracens and flanker, Akapusi Qera, who galvanised Gloucester in the 29-18 victory over Cardiff Blues. They typified everything that produced stand-out games in a crowded season.



The pair made huge hits, penetrated the gain line and showed off-loading skills with the rider that submission was not in their psyche even when their sides trailed. No surprise that Brendan Venter, the Saracens' director of rugby, said that the game's upside for them was the performance of Tonga'uiha, who is heading Sarries' way next season.

Phil Dowson, the most capped England Saxon and Saints' acting captain, who plays



with gritted teeth behind a smile, had won man of the match plaudits in five of Northampton's previous ten games. Not this time but still a definitive figure once again with a try to his name.

Merge into the equation scrum half Lee Dickson, the ferret at the base of the scrum, the unsung Paul Diggin, the quietly effective Roger Wilson and playmaker Shane Geraghty,







who permanently has try vulture, Chris Ashton, lurking on his shoulder. Ashton has averaged one a match in 71 career appearances for Saints, including 19 in 25 games this season. Bolt on Bruce Reihana running like a stag from the back and there is a potent mixture. These are core Northampton men with LV= Cup, Guinness Premiership and Heineken Cup titles all in their sights this season.

What of Gloucester, who were led by Jake Boer when they beat Northampton 40-22 in Freddie Burns celebrates with James Simpson-Daniel



the Powergen Cup final at Twickenham in 2003? Wing, James Simpson-Daniel, scored a rare hat trick in the competition in the Cardiff semi-final, benefiting from his link with Mike Tindall and later from a perfect rolling kick ahead by Freddie Burns, the England U20 fly half.

Burns, backing himself and his precise hands, had poached the interception try just before half time that enabled Nicky Robinson to level the scores at 10-10 and launch the second half springboard to victory. It made Burns the second highest try-scorer with four in this season's competition, behind Simpson-Daniel with five.

Add the influences of Lesley Vainikolo, with a slick step for a big man, the equally formidable Eliota Fuimaono-Sapolu and of Robinson, a former Blues' fly half, pinning his old teammates back and Gloucester went on their merry way to avenging a 50-12 defeat by Cardiff in last year's final.

Yellow cards also had a strong influence, emphasising the primary need for discipline today. Saracens not only had three players sinbinned to Northampton's two but their depletion came at crucial times as did the ten minutes' absence of Cardiff's Ben White during




which his team went behind to Gloucester for the second and final time.

Northampton alone had won all their four pool matches with Stephen Myler contributing 43 points to their triumphs over the Ospreys, Saracens, Sale Sharks and Leicester Tigers.

Gloucester had lost 26-25 at Kingsholm to Cardiff, for whom Ceri Sweeney landed the match winning penalty goal in the penultimate minute. A second successive defeat by 21-14 to London Wasps made Gloucester's presence anywhere beyond the pool matches look improbable but victories over Worcester Warriors and Harlequins saw them through to their tantalising return match – and victory – at Cardiff.

The Cherry & Whites need to surmount the psychological hurdle of their struggle in major games over recent years but, for today's winners, automatic entry to next season's Heineken Cup beckons. What an incentive that provides.
