

HREE games in a week is one thing, but three games in a week with Newcastle away in the middle is an entirely tougher prospect.

But in laying on a plane to whizz Gloucester up to Newcastle and back on Wednesday, Tom Walkinshaw turned a five hour journey into an hour and probably did more to improve preparations for today's clash with Saracens than he did for the game at Kingston Park.

This was written before the trip to Newcastle so hopefully Gloucester went north and won, but regardless of than a home win at Kingsholm over Saracens is crucial with Guinness Premiership points at stake in the race for sixth place.

Lock Dave Attwood, who was due to make his return in Newcastle,

revealed train and bus were considered until the plane became available, and he knew how important it would be in terms of recovery.

"It will make quite a big difference," he said. "No-one likes a long journey so to be able to get into your home environment soon after the game and chill down and relax and start flushing your body and you mind will make quite a big difference for Saracens.

"It's a really good idea, especially at this stage of the season when there's an awful lot to play for – it could be things like that which make the difference.

"There was talk for a while when we knew the game was going to be rearranged about how we would get up there, whether it would be flying the day before or a coach journey and things like that. Even the train was mentioned.

"But I think the plane was the best possible solution and now we need to take advantage of it."

Attwood last played before Newcastle in the defeat at Leicester on February 20, quite a spell out for what was originally a turned ankle in training.

Afetr being forced to sit in the stands for more than a month he was raring to go at Kingston Park after feeling the pang of wanting to be out there during the run to the LV= Cup final.

"I'm desperate to get back into things," he said.

"Watching the final it was gutting

to not out there on the field with the boys.

"You feel a bit detached from it so I'm a bit gutted that we lost and aching to get back out there, the same for last weekend (against Leeds).

"It was a nice sunny day and I had a pang to get out there.

"As a club we were massively disappointed with the result over at Worcester in the LV= Cup.

"But there's still plenty to play for for us this season.

"We've got our eyes on Heineken Cup qualification for next year so it's really important we get straight back on the wagon.

"The home game against Leeds was

a good start."

Inside of looking over his shoulder Attwood is looking up the table, knowing only wins will do and that Gloucester cannot worry about what other teams might do, Harlequins in particular.

"It's impossible for us to control what Quins do," he said. "We've got the remaining fixtures for us and we've targeted what points we're going to get and where we're going to get them from.

"We've got to go about that with workmanlike performances."

Meanwhile, head coach Bryan Redpath had a warning for Attwood, who has earned several plaudits during the start of his Gloucester career. Now that the season is reaching its climax, Redpath said it was the performances now that counted and not those before Christmas.

Should Attwood not rediscover his pre-Christmas form, when he was a shining light in an under-performing XV, it could still go down as a disappointing season for the former Bristol lock.

Redpath said: "Attwood has had a good season so far but memories die pretty quickly so he's got to keep proving himself and improving as a player.

"It's not about the last six months, it's what he does in the next month.

"He'll be remembered far more for that than he will be for the first half of the season."

It's been a hectic few days since I wrote my last column and we've had to manage the squad carefully over the past week.


With the Newcastle game being rearranged for midweek, we've obviously not been able to do the usual weekly programme with a weekend match in mind and have had to adapt accordingly.

Monday was a recovery day which was essential given the hard, physical game that we had against Leeds Carnegie last Saturday and we had a light training day on Tuesday without working the boys too hard.

Wednesday morning saw us fly to Newcastle where we based ourselves at a local hotel for the day before playing the Falcons on the Wednesday evening and flying back to Staverton in the early hours.

Thursday was set aside for injury assessment and recovery with a light team run scheduled for Friday before game day again today.

We're not complaining about it. It's a situation we've been in before and we'll probably face again in the future. The fact is, that any postponed match has



to be rearranged and the busy fixture calendar means that will probably mean a midweek game.

You just have to get your head around it and get on with it. And that means making full use of your squad and acknowledging the fact that you're not going to be able to play the same 23 across all three games.

Hopefully, today we'll be able to welcome back from injury a couple more of the boys who have been missing recently to boost our resources and the casualty list from Leeds and Newcastle won't be too bad.

As I mentioned above, Leeds were a very tough opponent and, to be honest, we expected nothing else.

Like most of the sides that get promoted from the Championship, they took a little while to adjust to the pace of the Guinness Premiership but Neil Back and Andy Key have moulded them into a very effective outfit.

If you look at their recent results, their form is not that of a bottom of the table side. They came into the game against us on the back of two weeks off and they certainly looked up for the game.

They kept it fairly simple and, what they did, they did well. They also defended superbly and made life difficult for us.

I was pleased with our patience and our discipline on the day. We kept to the game plan and eventually wore them down and, just as importantly, we denied them any real scoring opportunities.

That's really important to us. If we can deny the cheap three pointers, then it makes life so much easier for us.

It's something that we have to carry into this afternoon's game against Saracens and that's particularly evident when you look back to the game that we played at their place back in September.

We got off to a pretty good start at Vicarage Road with an early try from Rory Lawson and led for most of the game. However, we couldn't quite shake them off that day because we kept giving Glen Jackson opportunities to kick for goal to keep Saracens in the game and a kicker like that doesn't turn those chances down.

Ultimately, we paid the price because they scored a late try to snatch the game and we left with only a losing bonus point to show for our efforts.

It's an area that we've improved on as the season has gone by. Here at Kingsholm, we only conceded six points against Harlequins, three against Sale and we managed to nil Leeds. We'll have to be similarly disciplined this afternoon.

And that message is even more relevant given the way we slipped to defeat up at Kingston Park on Wednesday evening.

Only days after restricting Leeds' Ceiron Thomas to just one shot at goal, on Wednesday we went to the opposite extreme and gifted Jimmy Gopperth several kickable penalty opportunities and he's way too good a player to pass up such an opportunity.

Gopperth finished with 20 points on the night and you're never going to win in the Premiership if the opposition kicker finishes with that sort of points tally.

At the time of writing these notes, on the way back from Newcastle, it's difficult to put your finger on exactly what went wrong on Wednesday evening.

But we'll do our analysis as best we can given the limited time that we have before today's game and see what we find


QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

BEST TRY YOU'VE EVER SCORED?


I've scored a few so that's a tough one! I think probably the one when I broke the record in Super League when I scored 37 tries. That was for Bradford against St Helens.

The Volcano which came over from rugby league. There are a few others but I can't reveal them!


WHO IS YOUR BEST FRIEND IN RUGBY?

HAS SPORT EVER BROUGHT TEARS TO YOUR EYES?


Not really tears but if someone scores a great try or pulls off a huge







To misquote Lady Bracknell, 'to lose one captain may be unfortunate, to lose both seems like carelessness'.


HAIL AND FAREWELL



Should play have been stopped in the build up to the second Northampton try with Alex Brown seemingly having suffered a serious head injury? Probably.


In the same move, was there a knock on by a Saints player? Probably.


It was a rather more pragmatic performance than the two previous league encounters at Kingsholm which had seen a combined total of 93 points scored.


The Headingley based side battled and scrapped for every single piece of possession with the outstanding Hendre Fourie leading the way.


