But, we're not done just yet! We've still got two very tough fixtures to round off the Guinness Premiership starting today with our visitors, London Irish.

Recent seasons have seen some feisty old encounters between the two sides and I'm sure that no one will be taking a backward step this afternoon!

The Exiles will have been disappointed to slip to a home defeat to Leeds last weekend and I don't mean to do the Headingley outfit any disservice when I say that

but a huge factor is the support we receive here. Times have been tough over the past couple of seasons for a lot of people but we continue to receive excellent, vocal support here at home and it's always appreciated by myself and the players.

I suppose it sums up our overall season. We've enjoyed some excellent wins but we've lost some matches we certainly should have won and we're The result means that Irish have slipped out of the top four places and they'll be pulling out all the stops to make amends this afternoon.

We're aware of that but we'll be in no mood to make life easy for them. One characteristic of our season is that our home form has been much more impressive than our form away from Kingsholm.

UST last season Gloucester centre Jonny May was plying his trade for Hartpury College in South West Two.

He did it quite successfully – scoring a hat-trick at Twickenham in the EDF Senior Vase final – but few could have predicted his rise to prominence since then which he celebrated by signing a new contract this week.

In the last two weeks he has come into the Gloucester first team and more than held his own against the likes of Wasps and Northampton.

The 20-year-old could have scored a few tries in the process but for the bounce of the egg-shaped ball on the hard ground, scuppering opportunities in both games.

"That's just how it goes," he said.
"With the hard ground the ball is going to bounce everywhere, but hopefully it will come.

"It was a big test and a big shock

to be called into it at such late notice but I feel I've come out of it the other end really quite well.

"It's promising for me because I've still got things to work on but it shows I've got potential and can push on to be around the first team more this season and from the start of next."

May is well aware of the strides he has taken in the last 12 months, probably aided by the cut backs on the playing front at Gloucester.

He has been playing at Moseley most of the season and knows the levels are hardly worth comparing.

"That was a good day at Twickenham in the sunshine last year," he said. "The difference between the two is with Hartpury I won't really be challenged defensively.

"Those teams are quite old men. They keep it tight, they scrummage and they drive.

"It has been a big shock this year

stepping up to the Championship with Moseley with teams throwing it about a bit. It has really tested me.

"But also the fact that I've got quite a lot of pace and will glide through quite easily in the lower leagues.


"I still challenge people on the outside to an extent at this level but I've got to be a bit more aware of giving people like Sinbad and Vainikolo their one on ones instead of going myself."

And on signing a new one-year deal? "It gives me some security," he said "I want to stay at Gloucester, I'm really happy here.


"I've got an opportunity to work on the things I need to and hopefully get in the first team a bit more and keep doing what I'm doing."

Something May finds easy under head coach Bryan Redpath.

"He's really honest with me and easy to approach," he said. "He tells me what I need to work on

and what I'm doing well. I've got plenty to work on still and lots to gain. It's promising."

Just this week May also received the news he would be flying to Argentina this summer to take part in the Under-20s World Championships.

He will be joined by Freddie Burns and Shaun Knight in South America, with Pasqualin and Danny Wright missing out from those who took part in this season's Under-20s Six Nations.

May revealed he did not expect to be included after a disappointing end to his previous outing for his country against Ireland at Kingsholm.

He said: "I was feeling pretty sorry for myself after the Ireland game and I wasn't involved in the last two games of the Six Nations.

"But I was involved in a Moseley

win against Bristol and I had a couple of good A League games.

"Then I was called into the first team and, coming out of that okay, I feel I deserve my place on the plane and am ready for the challenge."

For May his England Under-20s caps were his first in any kind of representative rugby.

He feels moving to Hartpury was a huge step in his rugby development.

"I played my junior rugby at Wootton Bassett but didn't get into the county under-16s or under-18s," he said.

"Then all of a sudden I'm in the England Under-20s and I'm playing first team rugby from just playing South West Two with Hartpury last year.

"Hartpury was great for me.
I didn't realise coming into
Gloucester how big a rugby culture
there is. It is really driven, there is

a lot of talent and the quality of player you're around pushes you to improve.

"I want to keep stepping up the levels and I've met them so far there's no reason why I can't."

But May still has to pinch himself after making his Gloucester debut in a pre-season game alongside Carlos Spencer, and forming a centre partnership with Mike Tindall for the last two weeks.

"People like Mike and Sinbad I was watching on TV when I was 13," he said

"Tins is probably one of the wisest men ever so you can't really go wrong playing outside him.

"Earlier on my first pre-season game was playing with Carlos Spencer in the centre as well. It's been a dream this year playing with those guys.

"At the moment I'm like a sponge absorbing everything and learning so much."


Talking to the folks that work in the offices at the stadium this week, it sounds as though both ticket sales and corporate sales have gone well for this game so it looks as though our last home game of the Guinness Premiership season will be quite some occasion.

Since I last wrote my programme notes, we've had some highs and we've had some lows which has pretty much been the story of our season so far I guess.

Our last home game, against Saracens, showed that we can mix it with the very best in the Guinness Premiership although it was a pretty close run thing at 29-28!

Brendan Venter's men have started to play some decent rugby in recent weeks after relying heavily on the boot in the opening few months of the season and it made for a good game.

I was delighted with the attitude and effort put in by the players considering it was our third game in a week and came almost immediately following the long trip north to Newcastle although there were some aspects of our defensive work which could have been better.



And that's something that has continued in our next two games which were both away from Kingsholm at London Wasps in the Amlin Challenge Cup quarter final and at Northampton Saints in the Guinness Premiership.

In both those games, we played a lot of good rugby and scored probably enough points to have won the games if we'd been solid defensively.

Some of our defensive issues have been because we've had to use a lot of different combinations of players due to injuries in recent times and some of it is simply down to individual errors. However, it does need to be addressed and we've been working on it this week.

London Irish this afternoon will be a tough challenge.
Under the past couple of seasons under Toby Booth they've been one of the top sides in the country and came within a whisker of winning the whole thing last season.

They lost at home to Leeds last weekend but still have top four aspirations so they'll be coming here today with an awful lot to play for as they'll be desperate to get back into the semi final qualifying places.

But we've got plenty of motivation ourselves. Despite the defeat at Northampton last weekend, we're still in with a shout of clinching seventh place in the Guinness Premiership although we'll need things to go our way elsewhere.

That won't stop us giving it everything and, of course, we're always lifted when we play at home in front of our own supporters.

There's a lot written about home advantage but I think the proof is in the pudding when you consider that our last home defeat in the Premiership was against London Wasps back in October.

I know I'm speaking on behalf of the whole squad when I say that it's important for us to sign off in style here today.

I guess now it's appropriate for me to finish off with a few words about this season and look ahead to 2010-11.

As I said earlier, we've experienced some highs and lows this season.

We kicked off with a good win over Bath, entertained Australia

on a memorable November evening, overturned the odds to defeat Leicester and ran in a hatful of tries against the likes of Harlequins and Sale.

We also kept our European hopes alive with a fine victory in Newport and came so close to lifting the LV= Cup at Worcester a few weeks ago.

There have been some tough moments, however, I think that we're in good shape to move forward next season.

We had massive player turnover last summer and that's why we've worked so hard to try and keep the nucleus of the squad together for next season. There will be some new faces to integrate but the squad won't have undergone major surgery.

We've had more than our fair share of injuries this season which has meant that we've missed some key players at times but that has allowed some of young players to come in and flourish.

Consider the back line that started at Northampton last weekend, for example, which featured Freddie Burns (19), Jonny May (20) and Charlie Sharples (20).

They're just some of the reasons that I think that we're looking at a bright future.

Finally, a thank you from myself.

Thank you for the support that you've given us throughout the season and for continuing to get behind us however things are going on the pitch.

WOULD YOU BUY?


I would buy a fantastic house somewhere in South Devon probably.






PLAYER PROFILE: WILL JAMES

Jonathan Davies I think. An incredibly skilful player although I'm not sure how he'd fit into the modern game. He'd probably do ok though!






get unexpected results. And there were plenty of others too. And did I mention Sir Ian being on board?





WORLD OF RUGBY



ENGLAND SAXONS will return to the United States this summer to face Russia and the U.S.A. Eagles in the Churchill Cup pool stages on 9th June, followed by a triple header finals day, where they will potentially come up against Canada, Uruguay or France 'A' on



WHEN we recorded 47 points in our victory over Sale Sharks on 27th February here at Kingsholm, it was the fourth occasion that we had surpassed 40 points against that opposition since the game went professional.

In the 2001-2 season we defeated the northern club 42-14, the following season of we recorded a 44-8 victory and in the 2006-7 season we were 44 points to 24 victors. Although we have recorded a 44-21 win at Hayward Road in the 2001-2 season, we have yet to win at Edgeley Park!




WE HAVE used 39 different players in our Guinness Premiershir matches this season and 44 in the EDF Energy Cup whilst in the Heineken Cup we used 32 players. We have no ever presents in league encounters or in the EDF Energy Cup while Nicky Robinson and Dave Attwood were the only two players to make maximum appearances in the Heineken Cup.

DURING the course of this 2009-10 season we have been able to field no fewer than twenty three international player Paul Doran-Jones and Mike Tindall were the only England players to earn a cap in the current campaign.



PRIOR to our match today versus London Irish we have recorded 685 points in all competitions and conceded 692 points.



AS THE season draws to a conclusion we bid farewell shortly to several players, notably Gareth Delve due to try his luck down under in Australia. Marco Bortolami returns to his native Italy. Adam Eustace is moving to Northampton, Apo Satala is moving north to join Kingsley Jones at Sale Sharks. Finally, good luck to Greg Somerville who is returning to the Southern Hemisphere.






THE ONLY home match where we have received an increase in attendance compared with the corresponding match of last season was when we entertained Worcester where there were 2,465 extra supporters. While in away league matches fixtures only Bath and Leicester showed an increase in our corresponding away fixtures in 2008-9.



OUR FORMER player James Forrester is the only other player to record more than one hat trick including one versus Caerphilly in the European Shield. James showed his prowess in abundance versus Bristol, scoring hat tricks in a League match and in the RFU's domestic cup competition.



James Simpson-Daniel will once again reach this season's conclusion still needing to record a try versus Leicester Tigers, the only league club he has failed to record a try against.

Simpson-Daniel also finishes this season with a club career record of 6 hat tricks, two in league encounters versus Bath and Harlequins, two in domestic cup competitions versus Harlequins (again!) and Cardiff and two in European competition versus Viadana and Bucceresti.

Unfortunately, the Tykes had other ideas, and fought tooth and nail to cement their place in the Premiership. The bottom of the table clash became a real dog fight, involving Leeds, Worcester and even Bath for a while. Thankfully, we just managed to stay aloof from such unseemly goings-on, but things were by no means rosy.

Then Santa Claus sprinkled some magic dust and everything

changed. Up to a point, anyway. We achieved some notable victories, and came within a harshly disallowed try of beating Northampton to win the LV= Cup.

No one can pretend that everything in the garden is lovely. We still have trouble winning away from home, and our defence has been called into question.

Nevertheless, some very encouraging signs have emerged. The arrival of Molenaar and Taylor from Nottingham has stiffened our backbone, and the development of Charlie Sharples and Freddie Burns from our own ranks has been intensely gratifying.


So we're not having a champagne season, but things could have been much, much worse.

nibbles floating around in my cranium.

Sure – next season's squad should be more resilient than it was. They've learned that the hard way. In fact, it should be stronger all round. The problem with that is that all the Premiership sides grow stronger year on year. Just look at the way Bath, Leicester and Northampton have been recruiting already.

Second, we've lost some valuable experience, mainly in the pack. Eustace, Bortolami, Delve, Somerville and Satala have all moved on and their departure leaves something of a hole in the front eight. The arrival of the junior Mr. Deacon is welcome, but he can't be everywhere at once.

We have some very promising young talent emerging among the forwards, but they do need some direction, which is why Peter Buxton and Jake Boer are so important. Yet if you recruit too heavily, you deprive your young talent of the chance to prove itself and develop. It's guite a balancing act.

The backs look to me to be fairly satisfactory and will, no doubt, cause opposition sides plenty of problems next season.

The worry remains at full back. Ollie Morgan is brilliant, but his injury record is a concern. Freddie Burns has done a great job, but he is after all, only a stop gap who would prefer to play at 10. I suppose tempting Jonny Goodridge back from Leeds is out of the question?

So I have few worries about the backs. As long as we don't suffer



too badly from injuries.

The matchday programme caught up with Olivier recently to find out a little more about what inspired a veteran of countless front row battles to enter the world of haute cuisine.


"Food is in my blood," explained the French international hooker. "I was

born on a farm with all the best products available to me and my family have always been keen on their food and their wine. I was taught from a very young age to appreciate good food."

"A lot of the recipes are inspired from my background back him in France but most of them are created by the very talented chef that I have working at the restaurant."


France is obviously renowned as the home of gastronomy so, whilst England has made strides in recent years, he must have had something of a shock when he first arrived in England?

"It's true, when I first arrived in England,



"Here in the Cotswolds, especially, you can find some fine produce and very good restaurants. One thing I am very keen to do in the restaurant is use good local produce whenever possible."

What was it that made him decide to open his own establishment especially when he is still playing full time. Is it



difficult to balance both careers?

"I always wanted to open a restaurant, that was a long term goal. An opportunity came up for me to pursue my passion for food and drink and I decided to go for it. It was a very easy decision to make."

"I make sure that I oversee everything that goes on the menu and I also choose all the wine. So, everything has my seal of approval."

"It can be difficult sometimes because rugby and the restaurant are both very important to me but, at the moment, rugby is my priority but I do give a lot of my free time to the restaurant and I'm always there on my day off."

"But I must also mention my wife Katie, whose contribution is very important. She plays a big part in everything I do." How would he describe Armagnac to someone who hasn't been there before?

Gloucester and Saracens served up a belter of a game in front of the Sky cameras over Easter weekend with the result of the game hanging in the balance right until the very last kick.


The momentum had swayed to and fro throughout a pulsating encounter but Gloucester looked to have done enough when they earned a penalty with only a minute or so left on the clock.

had to do was win the lineout and run out the clock.



However, despite scoring 26 points on the road in a European quarter final, it was the defensive side of the performance that was found wanting as Wasps clinically finished the chances they created.


Gloucester started strongly and, wisely given what followed when Wasps got their hands on the ball, maintained possession to earn an early 3-0 lead.

The feeling though as Gloucester left Franklin's Gardens was one of frustration.


Frustration that Gloucester had once again slugged it out with one of the country's in form sides of the season and come off marginally second best.


