'TODAYS OPPOSITION



Unlike this time last year, when Gloucester kicked off their LV=Cup

campaign smack bang in the middle of a run of defeats, Bryan Redpath's come into tonight's opening game of the equivalent 2010-11 competition on something of a roll.

Last weekend saw Gloucester take a notable scalp as they defeated the Leicester Tigers by 19 points to 12 at Kingsholm. The win was Gloucester's fourth in a row in the Aviva Premiership and saw them move into third place in the table. Such a lofty position would have been considered unthinkable by all but the most ardent Cherry and White follower after the opening day defeat down at the newly promoted Exeter Chiefs.

Reading some of the anguished online postings, you'd have been forgiven for thinking that the world was about to come to an end in GL1 but the Chiefs, of course, have gone on to show that they are going to be far from pushovers this season. To be fair, it's been a fairly stressful past time, following Gloucester thus far in the Aviva Premiership.

The defeat at Exeter was followed by a narrow, last gasp 22-21 over Leeds Carnegie before a trip to the Madejski Stadium to take on London Irish yielded only a losing bonus point.

Two late penalties from Nicky Robinson, from a distance so great that he was almost out of the county (!), secured a 22-10 victory over London Wasps before a trip to the Rec to face much fancied Bath resulted in only Gloucester's second win there since league rugby began.

Some fantastic rugby against Harlequins was nearly undone by two second half yellow cards but Brett Deacon's late try secured the win and it took a similarly late score from Lesley Vainikolo to finally vanguish the Tigers last weekend.

Sales of blood pressure medication must have soared in recent weeks and a 15 point lead going into the final five minutes of a game would be most welcome!

However, tonight is a completely different competition and one which treated Gloucester kindly last season albeit in a slightly unusual fashion.

The first two pool games resulted in two defeats and that could well have been it. However, a scrappy 17-5 win over the Worcester Warriors kept hopes alive before an unlikely win at Harlequins secured a semi final berth.

Gloucester needed a bonus point win at the Stoop but found themselves trailing 20-0 after 25 minutes. Yet, an astonishing comeback saw five tries follow, the last literally as time expired and Tim Taylor slotted a nerveless conversion to take the game 31-29.

A weakened Cardiff were duly dispatched in the semi final but, despite pushing Northampton all the way in the final, Gloucester couldn't quite complete the job and left Worcester's Sixways with losers medals.

Quite what this season's LV=Cup has in store is yet to be seen and both teams tonight will be missing a number of key players on international duty.

However, one thing is for certain, it's an Anglo Welsh clash and they're always competitive!
