


GLOUCESTER ALL SET FOR



Gloucester Rugby enter 2012 with an awful lot still to play for. Qualification for the knockout stages of the Heineken Cup looks to be beyond Bryan Redpath's side but Gloucester are still defending their LV= Cup with pride and in the hunt for an Aviva Premiership play off place.

The Swindon born loose head prop is now in his ninth season with the club and closing in on 200 appearances.

He joined the Gloucester Rugby Academy from Radley College, quickly became a regular in the first team squad and in recent seasons has made the number one shirt his own.

Season after season he has delivered a consistent level of performance as well as proving to be incredibly durable.

Wood has represented England at U21 level and been a frequent membe of the Saxons set up. He toured South Africa with England in 2007 and was selected to make his full debut only to have to withdraw due to injury.



So, there's plenty to play for this afternoon as if a Worcester vs Gloucester fixture needed anything more to spice it up!


Gloucester triumphed earlier in the season at Kingsholm but Sixways has always proved to be a

The Cherry and Whites dominated but it was their former winger, Marcel Garvey, who danced his way through the forwards to open the scoring for Worcester.


But the home side were penalised at three consecutive five-metre scrums and Gloucester were awarded a penalty try.

Walker added nine points while the home defence kept the secondhalf scoreless.

The only disappointment for the home side was a season-ending injury to full-back Chris Latham. The former Australian international fractured his shoulder blade while making a try-saving tackle on Luke Narraway.

"We took a bit of a gamble this week and gave the guys a bit more time out," revealed Mike Ruddock after the game. "In fact we had a barbecue and bit of a get-together on Monday afternoon so I might have to make it a regular thing. We didn't leave it on the training pitch we transferred it onto the park."





3TOWATCH: ALEX BROWN

Having successfully come through an Aviva Premiership A League game last Monday following a lengthy absence due to injury, second row Alex Brown is back in contention for selection this weekend.

He was initially injured during the season opener at Northampton Saints, finally opted for surgery on his shoulder after the week three defeat at Harlequins and has been sorely missed ever since.

Regarded as one of the best line out takers in the country, Brown signed from arch rivals Bristol Shoguns in 2003, and soon became a regular in the Gloucester line up.

Not only is Brown superb in the line-out, but he is one of Gloucester's biggest hitters in defence and a willing ball carrier.

One of the most consistent performers in the Premiership, he won two more England caps on the summer tour to South Africa in the summer of 2007 to add to the one he won on debut against Australia.

Alex has continued to be one of the Premiership's most consistent performers and signed a new contract with the club in Spring 2011.


A local derby with plenty riding on the outcome? Couldn't be a better recipe for a passionate, hard fought encounter between two sides desperate for a win could there?

BRYAN REDPATH:


The former Scotland scrum-half retired from playing in May 2005 after a successful professional career that saw him represent Sale, Narbonne, Edinburgh and Melrose, and win 60 international caps in addition to appearing at two Rugby World Cups. He arrived as backs coach at Gloucester Rugby in the summer of 2005 and was named Head Coach in June 2009 following the departure of Dean Ryan.

In his first season in charge, he guided Gloucester to seventh place in the Guinness Premiership table and to the final of the LV= Cup.

2010-11 saw an even better return as Gloucester finished third



in the Aviva Premiership table and won the LV= Cup as they defeated Newcastle Falcons at Franklin's Gardens.



3TOWATCH: HENRY TRINDER

22 year old centre Trinder is one of Gloucester Rugby's current crop of sparkling young English qualified backs.

He progressed through the Academy and also benefitted from a loan spell with Championship side Moseley before really catching the eye in England U20s Junior World Cup Championship campaign in Tokyo in 2009.

2010-11 was his breakthrough season in the first XV as he scored 13 tries from 15 starts across all competitions, form which caught the eye of the England selectors.

He represented England against the Barbarians at Twickenham in the non cap international before linking up with the Saxons in their Churchill Cup defence

A cultured runner with ball in hand, he also possesses a more than useful kicking game of his left foot and is another widely fancied to make the England EPS squad for the RBS Six Nations.

BURNS NOT FAZED BY DERBY DAY

It's a sign of the growing maturity of Gloucester Rugby's young fly half Freddie Burns that neither the opposition nor the conditions fazed him last weekend at Saracens.

The Men in Black are always a pugnacious opponent to come up against. Dogmatic? Pragmatic? Yes, but also a side that wins more often than it loses. It may not always be pretty but it's effective.

So, when the heavens opened an hour or so before kick off at Vicarage Road last Sunday, you could have forgiven the Gloucester side for assuming that the ideal weather had


Burns explained.

"We pride ourselves as a movement team so in those conditions it was always going to be tough.

"It was hammering down through the game and then stops as soon as it finishes, but we're happy enough with that draw to be honest.


"I sat in the changing room talking to some of the backs and we were wondering whether we'd even played any rugby.

That result, however, is already history. It's been analysed and the


"Look at the Premiership table and there's so few points between teams that one win can push you up while one defeat can bump you right back down.

"It's going to be hard as they'll be full of confidence from their win last weekend. So they'll be a tough team, and we've just got to play the conditions again.

"If it's dry we'll run it, if it's wet we'll have to sit back and kick. But it was just pleasing to get that result in bad conditions, to prove that we can play that way.

"We can't use the fact that we are a running team as an excuse for losing the game. We've proved now can go to places like Saracens, play the kicking game and still come out with a good result.

"You've got to simplify the game and go back to basics. And to be honest in conditions like that I'll probably learn more than I would if it was a dry day."
