COACH'S CORNER

WITH PHILLIPE SAINT-ANDRÉ

THIS PRE-SEASON HAS BEEN VERY DIFFICULT; WE HAVE HAD A LOT OF PLAYERS WHO HAD SURGERY AND OPERATIONS AT THE END OF THE SEASON.

This new season has come around very quickly and we have had very little time to recover. Also we thought that the first game would be this weekend and not last week as the league was brought forward. We played in Ireland one game and picked up 6 injuries, we then played our first league match and got two more against Saracens.

We now have Woodman, Vickery, Fortey and Sanchez injured, they are all in the front row, also we have Kingsley Jones out. In Gomarsall and Moncrieff we have two scrum-halves out, also Tom Beim, Franck Schizano, Brian Johnson Robert Todd and Rory Greenslade-Jones that is five backs plus Chris Catling and now Simon Mannix these are all injuries in very key positions.

Last year we had a smaller squad of 31 fulltime professionals but we had very few injuries, this year we have 36 players, a much bigger stronger squad, I think but so many injuries.

We have to be positive though, this is a good opportunity for the younger players at the club to be a part of the squad and they have a possibility of playing on the pitch.

For the game against Saracens I was both pleased and disappointed. We played very good rugby for 35 minutes of the game, then for three minutes before half time we made some silly basic mistakes. When individuals make basic mistakes against such world class opposition it will be game over.


The players though, played with a lot of heart and commitment, putting their bodies on the line and giving 100%. It was difficult because the players did not get together until Saturday one day before the match, because I did not have enough fit backs. This made preparation more difficult and gave the players less time to bond as a team.

The players have a lot of pride and will keep doing everything possible to make sure we win. I can still promise a season of great rugby here at Kingholm, but I think the fans must be patient and get behind the team. My goals for the team have not changed it is now possible to get 5 points for a win this season, so things will change a lot. I think we must win at home this weekend. I think we always have a chance at Kingsholm we have the qualities to beat Sale and whichever 15 I put out on the pitch they will give 100% always to try and win for themselves and the fans. We are still confident.





roy "digger" morris 1911-2000

AN APPRECIATION BY PETER ARNOLD

T MAY BE A TERRIBLE CLICHÈ, BUT WE REALLY WON'T SEE HIS LIKE AGAIN, YOU KNOW.

When Digger Morris died at the respectable age of 89, it seemed as though a whole era of rugby, and indeed of amateur sport in general passed with him. He played the game hard because he loved it, and because he loved it, he talked about it, at great length, sometimes astringently, but always entertainingly. His opinions were forthright, and sometimes at odds with those of everyone else.

I recall bumping into him outside the betting shop in Barton Street, where you could expect to find him at around midday on most days. After our usual chat about recent results, he described one young player who had just won a game for us, and went on to win a couple of England Caps, as "bloody useless".

That was the Digger. If he thought it, he said it, and was right more often than not.

Digger was larger than life in all senses of the word. At 6'4" I'm a fairly elongated individual myself, but when talking to him he always seemed so much bigger than me. He fairly loomed at you, with a grin as wide as wide as the Horseshoe Bend and a fund of stories that was impossible to resist, even if you had heard most of them before. If you prodded a little, he could, however, come up with an unfamiliar gem.

I once asked him which of all the games he played in did he most fondly remember. After lengthy consideration, he opined: "I think it's the one when that bloody Kiwi outfit came here just after the War." It should be noted that 'that bloody Kiwi outfit' was a New Zealand Services side which was, in all but name. A full All Blacks side.

"I got kicked in the yud early on," explained the Digger. "So I don't remember too much about the first half. But during the second half, I dropped one of their blokes on his yud, and I had four of 'em on to me arter that. It was a bloody smashing game!"

No accounting for taste, I suppose.

Roy 'Digger' Morris was the absolute personification of the 'old', pre-professional, Gloucester Rugby Football Club. His large frame fairly oozed all the qualities for which the amateur Elver Eaters were famous, and indeed, infamous. While not famed for high skill levels in modern terms, both club and man were immensely strong, forthright, genial, determined and just kept coming at you, whatever the occasion, whatever the scoreline, whatever the opposition, until the final whistle went.

As it has, now, for the Digger. The rest, as the Bard wrote, is silence.




Conversation among Cherry and White supporters who have spent the (sunny?) last few months following the fortunes of Gloucestershire's cricketers seems to have been concentrated on the salary cap (and how Gloucester intend to split up their budget) and latterly the muddle regarding the fixtures. At least we didn't get a series of lists this time, only one - but when it arrived on Friday July 14th it most certainly was not to Gloucester's liking!

To quote Tom Walkinshaw, the concept of "habit

forming rugby once a fortnight" could not be further from the truth. With 14 guaranteed home games this season in the Premiership and the pool stages of the Heineken Cup, Gloucester found 9 were before the New Year. The imbalance will be even more acute should the Tetley Cup bring an early exit - with a huge gap between early January and mid-March.

Ken Nottage's towering influence brought the bosses of the clubs together but the sands of time meant the white flag was raised on THIS season. Gloucester will have to reach the latter stages of all the competitions if the fixture schedule is to be balanced up - and we wouldn't grumble about that.

Name one other significant day these past 4 months, and it was probably a Saturday, July 29. I was at Worcester watching Glenn McGrath knock over Gloucestershire as Jason Little's name became the missing piece in Philippe's squad jigsaw. If the other top sides wondered how serious Gloucester are about winning something this season, here was their answer.



Little's status in the game ranks alongside that of the new skipper, Ian Jones. Both have over 70 international caps, with Little twice a World Cup winner to boot. At 30, he's young enough to sign for 2 years and still stay a bit longer. His arrival will certainly demand greater efforts from the likes of Fanolua and Yates if they're to get a place.

Elsewhere, Philippe's been busy raiding the talent available from two clubs in particular. From his old club Montferrand come Olivier Azam, that rarity in the front row, a man who can play anywhere, and HervÈ Gregoire-Mazzocco, who with intense competition in the back row may find himself, at least initially, on the fringes.

Robert Todd and Jake Boer left London Irish for Kingsholm - with Todd and Little surely Gloucester's first choice centre partnership once Little arrives and Todd is fit again. Narbonne's Franck Schizano will offer more options on the wing, and England international Andy Gomersall would appear to put a question mark over Ian Sanders' prospect of much first XV rugby this season. At least Gomersall IS English, giving Philippe extra permutations with his clutch of overseas players.



OU'LL FIND A FEW WORDS OF APPRECIATION OF THE LATE ROY 'DIGGER' MORRIS ELSEWHERE IN THIS PUBLICATION, BUT WHILE WRITING THEM, IT OCCURRED TO ME TO WONDER WHAT HAS HAPPENED TO HIS SCRAPBOOKS.

I once had the privilege of being invited into his Coney Hill living room, which appeared to be carpeted by wall-to-wall greyhounds, to view them. It took hours, with Digger's pithy comments about just about every page, punctuating the whole process.

He told me that, back in the early 1930's, he was so proud of pulling on the famous cherry-and-white jersey, that he cut the ensuing report out of the 'Citizen' and kept it. It was the start of a wonderful collection of mementoes, covering

his long and distinguished playing career plus his war experiences in the RAF, serving in Africa and Italy.

It is to be hoped that the family has them safe and sound, and if they wish to keep them, then that is, of course, their right and no one would argue with that. However, they do represent a unique record of a unique man and a unique club spanning the War years. I can't help thinking that they should be professionally preserved and looked after. I'm sure that either the County Library Reference Department, or the County Record Office, right here in Kingsholm, would be delighted to accept them - perhaps on permanent loan.
