

One word describes the change at Gloucester Rugby Club that has seen the Cherry and Whites lead their ascent from domestic underachievers to the top of the Zurich Premiership table this year. That word is "professional".

This is not to suggest that in the past the Gloucester team did not take their role seriously - anyone who has ever donned the famous Cherry and White jersey could never be accused of giving anything other than 100% but with the advent of Nigel Melville's reign at Kingsholm came a new wave of professionalism.

This attitude has manifested itself mainly in the preparations for games, no stones are left unturned, nor avenues explored and every weakness sought and exploited as the coaching team formulates a plan to break down the game plan of every other Premiership and European opponent. In sport you get out what you put in and this hard work on the training paddock has brought a marked improvement in performance and results on match days.

This is not to detract from the results achieved by Melville's predecessor Philippe Saint Andre and the team of nations he assembled and in turn Melville has inherited. The flamboyant Frenchman opened Gloucester's eyes to a whole new market of rugby talent and brought the Club success on domestic and European fronts, never before seen at Kingsholm.

Two European semi-finals in two years, and a rise from the doldrums to the top spot in the Premiership are triumphs in themselves but with Melville's appointment, albeit with a team Saint-Andre assembled, came Gloucester's first real silverware. At the end of another marathon, energy-sapping season Melville asked his tired players to play for two extra weeks, and put off their summer breaks just a little longer. The players responded in spades. Their reward was a Twickenham victory, made all the more sweeter as it was over West Country rivals Bristol.

With expectations duly raised, and the traditionally demanding Gloucester crowd calling for more, Melville began assembling a side, on and off the pitch, that could build on the success of the Championship winning season. He took the line that 'if it ain't broke, don't fix it' and only three players Delport, Buxton and Amor were drafted in to an already competitive souad.

Biggest Win for Gloucester

Melville and Dean Ryan, the latter co-opted onto the coaching staff from the Shoguns, along with Australian Rudi Meier and former Springbok physio Wayne Diesel, began to raise the standards. They took the traditional Gloucester 10-man 'stick it up your jumper' game plan and added a variety of attacking

options that have seen a shift to a new fifteenman game never before witnessed at
Kingsholm. Melville has also set about
shattering the perception that Gloucester
sides cannot perform away from Kingsholm,
already in the Premiership this season, the
Cherry and Whites have beaten Quins and
Newcastle and earned a draw at Bath. The
disappointment in the Gloucester dressing
room after the game at the Rec
demonstrated how far they have come.
Never before would a Gloucester team be so
disillusioned at not securing a victory at the
ground they have never had a league win.

Today the Cherry and Whites visit the Madejski Stadium with another opportunity to show how far they have come in Melville's relatively short reign at Kingsholm. Gloucester has lost on its last three visits to Reading - two Premiership and one Cup and each time failed to perform to their potential. They are without three big names as Vickery, Woodman, and Simpson-Daniel are all on international duty this weekend, but they do include Andy Gomarsall, James Forrester and Marcel Garvey. Clive Woodward deemed the latter trio surplus to requirements this weekend and no-doubt each one will have a point to prove to the England supremo.
