
fter all the debate around whether the Australia game was a good or a bad thing for the club on and off the pitch, everyone went home on Tuesday night with a smile on their faces having watched an excellent evening's rugby.

The Aussies scored most of the points but a few of the Gloucester youngsters showed their coming of age is only around the corner.

Hopefully we will see some of those youngsters this afternoon, with Freddie Burns' knock at the Kingsholm door getting all the more louder. It is a shame he is a fly-half in a way, because that is the one position Gloucester have not been caught short in so far this season.

Surely had Burns been a centre or a specialist full-back he would have been called into action much sooner. As it is, Bryan Redpath has asked him to play in the number 15 shirt a few times and, having never played there before, he has made a great fist of it. Surely his first start in his favoured position is not too far away, but Redpath is right to manage that correctly. Gloucester are a struggling side at the moment and to chuck in a youngster and put pressure on him to sort it out would be a mistake.

The other youngster to make an impression again was Dave Lewis. It was always going to take him time to get back to the heights of his first few games last season, but the couple of sniping runs he put in against the Aussies showed the pace off the mark remains. Perhaps he need to add strength



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and defensive qualities to his game to catch up with the likes of Joe Simpson of Wasps for example, but the Gloucester coaching staff must be happy with his re-emergence.

Henry Trinder was another to make his first team return and also never looked out of place. He was rightly frustrated afterwards with a couple of passes which went awry when the breakaway was on, but there was plenty to be encouraged by from the Cirencester boy. If he thought his error count was high on Tuesday night, a quick

comparison with the overall number of unforced mistakes so far this season and he will find himself at about par.

The last man worth a mention falls just outside the youngster bracket, although probably not in terms of the position he plays. Paul Doran-Jones has made the switch from tight to loose-head seamlessly in the absence of both Alasdair Dickinson (shoulder) and Nick Wood (foot). Aficionados of the front row will tell you the technique difference between the

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two positions are basically opposite, so for Doran-Jones to switch and strengthen the Gloucester scrum is quite a feat.

That has also brought Greg Somerville more into his own. Tight-head is as defensive a position as loose-head is attacking so a player like Somerville is never going to have a destructive influence on the scrum. Instead, with a powerful loose-head going about his work if the All Black can hold firm, so the scrum prospers.

Later in the season, when both Wood and Dickinson are back (wishful thinking?), Doran-Jones could well be used as a weapon in the last 20 minutes of games to come on and mop up once one of the other two has worn the opponent down.

On a final not it was great to see Jake Boer back in cherry and white, back at Kingsholm and back as captain on Tuesday. With the injuries and international unavailability at Gloucester at the moment, there are far worse players to turn to than old Jakey. And the workrate and never-say-die attitude was back on Tuesday night. I for one would love to see the famous scrum hat and gloves stay until at least the end of the season, if note longer.

The message is the same as it has been for pretty much the whole season, including the Bath game: cut out the errors and the wins will start to come. As the wins come the confidence grows and the form improves. Redpath keeps saying it's time for the talk to stop and the rugby to start but he obviously knows that is easier said than done.

## BRYAN REDPATH HEAD COACH

ON BEHALF of everyone at Gloucester Rugby, I'd like to with the Cardiff Blues a warm welcome to Kingsholm this afternoon.

It's a new competition for us this afternoon and a new sponsor for me to talk about during interviews! But it's good for the tournament that LV= have come on board. We enjoyed a run to the final last season and are obviously keen to go as far as possible this time around.

We're up against familiar foes this afternoon in the Cardiff Blues. We were, of course, drawn in the same Heineken Cup group as them last season and faced them in the final that I mentioned above.

So, both teams are well known to each other although we're not sure at this point exactly who will be lining up for the Blues at Kingsholm with so many of their players away with Wales this weekend.

Ten of their players were absent last weekend when the Blues lost 23-6 at Leinster but you can hardly call any side weak when they can still upon the likes of Gareth Thomas, Dafydd James, Ceri Sweeney, Paul Tito and Xavier Rush!

And, bear in mind of course that the Blues are defending their crown. We know from bitter experience how much it meant to them to lift the trophy last season. Even missing their Welsh internationals, they'll be looking to get their defence off to a



good start and will be coming to Kingsholm to win.

Since my last programme column, it's an understatement to say that it's been a busy couple of weeks at the club.

The arrival of the Autumn internationals has an impact upon squad availability. Mike Tindall has been away with England and Alasdair Dickinson, Rory Lawson, Scott Lawson and Alasdair Strokosch were all named in Scotland's provisional squad.

To cope with Scott's absence, and the fact that Oliver Azam is unavailable for selection, we've brought in Ben Phillips on a short term contract.

Ben's been with us for a couple of weeks having started the season at Birmingham & Solihull. He's shown up well in training, started a couple of A League games and also got a brief run in the Australia game.

He's done well and the opportunity is there for him to continue to impress over the next few weeks.

On the pitch, it's been a real mixture of good and not so good. For example, we were disappointed with our performance against Wasps.

I couldn't fault our work ethic on the night, we dominated possession and territory and forced Wasps into



a big defensive effort.

However, despite that, we simply didn't create any pressure. Wasps defended well but we needed to focus on our basics and our concentration.

That was why I was pleased to see the reaction up at Edgeley Park when we took on Sale.

Our error count was still too high and we gave away too penalties which gave Charlie Hodgson to kick seven penalties which was ultimately our downfall.

But our attitude in the second half was what pleased me. We played for 50 minutes with only 14 men but still managed to outscore them by three tries to one.

We were solid in defence, our pack gave them problems in the set piece and we were patient in our attack. Our clearing out was better than it has been in recent weeks which gave us quicker ball to work with and the difference was obvious.

The Greg Somerville try was a case in point as we kept hold of the ball, worked the phases and remained patient until Greg finally forced his way over.

And it was good to see that attitude carry over into the Australia game.

Obviously, it was a different looking team that was on display that night but the levels of commitment were right up there.

It was a great chance for some of our younger players to pit themselves against international calibre opposition.

And I genuinely thought we did well but the Wallabies' performance will prove to be a great learning experience for our boys. They put their bodies on the line to prevent us scoring when it looked as though we had them under the cosh and then pounced when we made the slightest error and punished us with those late scores.

Overall, it was a great occasion. It was great to see Kingsholm packed to the rafters and the ground was absolutely buzzing.

I think both sides enjoyed playing in front of a full house and all the players will benefit from the experience.

I'd like to think that there will be plenty more of those occasions at Kingsholm in the future.

#### CAN YOU PLAY A MUSICAL INSTRUMENT?


No, I'm useless. My brother can play guitar but I can't play anything.

### WHO IS YOUR BEST FRIEND IN RUGBY?


I've two really. Ollie Hayes who is down at Bristol is a really good friend of mine and also a lad in the Academy at Bath called Guy Mercer.

have a number of quality players who would grace pretty much any professional club so we're hardly scraping the barrel. The problem seems to be getting them all on the pitch at the same time.





Reflecting on his three year spell at Kingsholm recently he said, 'I loved it, it was great playing at Gloucester'. Richard last visited the United Kingdom last May.



A DILEMMA faces Bath, Harlequins and Sale along with Northampton when they qualify for the Heineken Cup. Under new regulations introduced by ERC this season, all quarter final venues must have a minimum capacity of 15,000. This season London Irish, Leicester and ourselves did not face this crisis as all three clubs play at venues with a capacity in excess of 15,000.

**THE WINNER** of this season's Championship are deprived of a bumper pay-out this season. Under former rules the club that finished top of the old National One would received a £750,000 compensation package from the RFU if they were unable to take their place in the Premiership. This did occur in 2002 when National One Champions Rotherham were unable to replace Leeds due to their Clifton Lane ground being deemed inadequate.

FORMER Kingsholm favourite Ludovic Mercier is still playing for Italian club Petrarca. That unerring accuracy with the boot has still not deserted the well travelled Frenchman. Penalties, conversions and dropped goals are still being put to the test for his Italian club. A man with a still mighty boot! Ludo recently recorded his 431st point in the second tier European competition.





**MOSELEY** who have two of our former players in Ian Smith and Don Caskie at the helm are hoping to increase the capacity of their Billersley Common ground to 7,500. A decade has passed since they sold their famous old stadium at The Reddings. After flirting with the University ground they moved to Billersley in 2005. They still have money in the bank from the sale of their original ground thought to be in the region of £1.2m.

HAVE you noticed the various names to grounds of clubs who play in National League One? They are certainly diverse! Blackheath play at Rectory Field, Blaydon at Crow Trees, Cambridge at Grantchester Road, Cornish All Blacks at Polson Bridge, Esher at Pillar Data Arena, Nuneaton at Liberty Way, Otley at Cross Green, Sedgley Park at Park Lane to name a few.

BISHOPS STORTFORD RFC in Hertfordshire have had a new RFU funded drainage system installed. The £59,000 project comprised of £35,000 from RFU's Capital Facilities Investment Programme. Previously the club received an RFU Community Club Development Programme grant of £30,000 towards their new training floodlights in 2006.

HOW demoralising it must have been for the Manchester Club players at the onset of this current season. In their opening two matches in their National One campaign they conceded no fewer than 243 points and failed to open their own account.



OH DEAR! At the beginning of September when Saracens entertained Northampton at Wembley, New Zealand entertained South Africa in Hamilton in the Tri-Nations. Well, the Guinness Premiership tussle attracted more spectators than the Southern Hemisphere international! Perhaps the intended inclusion of Argentina into a four nation tournament in 2012 will add spice to an event that has lost its appeal.

When Saracens staged their Premiership match with Northampton at Wembley last September it was widely believed to have cost in the region of £300,000 to hire the stadium along with organising various events which included Diversity, the 'Britain's Got Talent' winner.

#### KEEP THE FAITH

ALL right, so things aren't going well at the moment. So what else is new? Some of us have seen it all before. More than once in fact.

Things weren't easy in the first few years of the professional era, either. In those days we didn't bother about whether we were going to win the Premiership: the worry was that proud Gloucester was going to be relegated. On at least two occasions we weren't sure that we were safe until the last match of the season.

But we kept the faith. We supported the lads through thick and thin, went to away games in droves, and shouted our heads off all through the game at Kingsholm.

Oh sure - we complained. We

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criticised the club management, moaned about the coaching, and soon let a player know if we didn't think he was good enough. Which didn't stop us cheering if he changed our minds for us.

I remember one guy, who hardly missed a match and used to stand somewhere under the clock. His mantra was to shout, every ten minutes or so, "Sell 'em all and buy one good 'un!"

And I mean, every ten minutes. Right through the game until the final whistle. He didn't leave half way through. He didn't chicken out by walking out on the guys just when they needed his support most.

It's easy to support a team when they are winning everything. The measure of a good supporter is how he (or she) acts when everything appears to be going down the pan. By all means moan and complain – in the press if it makes you feel better- but hold your ground and stay put during the match itself.

If you feel bad after a game, think how the players must feel. It's their livelihood after all, and many of them have families to support. On top of that, they have their own pride, even if, or perhaps especially if, depression after a poor performance prevents them from showing it.

So do we. We have the reputation of being the most loyal and committed supporters in the country. How do you think the telly audience considers us if they see a stream of fans slinking out of the ground with tails between their legs before all is done and dusted?

So keep the faith. Stand your ground. Show everyone, especially

Not so Gloucester. The boys got stuck in, never gave up, and although condemned to playing most of the game with fourteen men, they outscored the Sharks by three tries to one.

On the down side, we were still dropping the ball too often, and giving away too many penalties, but nevertheless the match must have put some heart into the lads, and convinced them that they are capable of winning some good matches.

I don't think I'm taking a rosecoloured-spectacles view, but of



course, I could just be biased, and I make no apology for that.

#### **FAREWELL SHEP**

YOU will, I'm sure, have been saddened by the news of the death of cricketer David Shepherd. He was one of the finest servants Gloucestershire ever had, and after he retired, became acknowledged as the best umpire in the world. His large, rotund frame was a familiar figure all over the planet.

I got to know him reasonably well in his playing days, and I'm here to tell you that he was one of the nicest blokes who ever walked, with a friendly smile for everyone. Although his name will always be linked with Gloucestershire, he was, of course, a Devonian. A fact he betrayed every time he opened his mouth. You could always tell when Shep was around, simply by hearing that rich Devon accent sounding around the bar.

We're all sad to see him go, but why should I mark the passing of a Devonian cricketer in the pages of the Gloucester Rugby Club match programme? Thereby hangs a tale.

He was in a group of us at the old Gloucester Cricket Festival in the happy days when it was played at what I still persist in thinking of as the Wagon Works Ground. Someone mentioned rugby and, in the ensuing conversation, it became obvious that Shep knew quite a bit about the game. We asked him if he ever played.

"Oh yes!" he replied "In my young days I used to turn out for Bideford". We could quite see that and remarked that his considerable size and weight would be an asset to any pack,

He grinned and explained.
"Perhaps I would, but in fact I used to play scrum-half!!"


There was nothing to say to that.



#### COACH'S COMMENTS


To play with 14 men for 50 minutes and still outscore them by three tries to one, I'm delighted.

"There has been a lot of criticism thrown our way over the last couple of weeks - and in some aspects quite rightly so - but I've never doubted the players' ambition or passion to play for Gloucester.

#### **KEY MOMENT**

Gloucester were well and truly in the game at 13-8 when referee Wayne Barnes seemed to give a harsh offside penalty against the forwards. Sale fly half Charlie Hodgson kicked the penalty and, when Charlie Sharples was red carded for tackling a man in the air from the restart, the complexion of the game had changed completely.





The record will show that Gloucester lost to Sale Sharks at **Edgeley Park on Friday October** 30th by 28 points to 23.

What is difficult to convey in mere black and white is the sheer guts and determination shown by a Gloucester side that had it all to do at half time.

Faced with a 16-8 deficit, reduced to 14 men following a red card to Charlie Sharples and with two of the most experienced players having already limped out of the action due to injury, the second half could have been a complete nightmare for Gloucester.


What followed was a performance

of real character that may have started out as an exercise in damage limitation but very nearly resulted in an unlikely but heroic comeback win.

At half time, a losing bonus point looked as though it would be an unlikely reward. When the final whistle blew, there was genuine disappointment that Gloucester's quest for victory had fallen just short.

In the end, Gloucester were kicked to death. Sale fly half Charlie Hodgson may have been discarded for the time being by England but he's still more than capable of doing a very good job at Guinness Premiership level.




