

SPOTLIGHT OLIVIER AZAM

The Gloucester front row may have lost an awesome presence in Trevor Woodman over the summer, but they have certainly gained another one through the return of Olivier Azam. After a spell with French side **AS Montferrand Azam** has come back to Kingsholm, the place where he formed a formidable front row partnership with Woodman and Phil Vickery and helped propel his side to the top of the Zurich Premiership standings.

Azam is a tall man for a hooker, standing at 6' 1". Hwe is very powerful and, having experience at prop, is a devastating scrummager. His work around the park is typically fierce and he certainly relishes the challenge at the contact area. Azam does not take a backward step on a rugby field, a quality that typifies Gloucester's tradition and reoutation.

The Frenchman was always a popular figure during his first spell with Gloucester and the Shed have welcomed him back with open arms. He is a player you love to have in your team and despite his fierce stread on the pitch he always has lots of time for fans off it, an admirable quality in the professional rugby environment. Azam's antics and look have attained him something of a cult status amongst Gloucester fans and he does perform the role of talisman when the Cherry and Whites come to town.

On top of all that, though, he is one heck of a player. His set-piece work is very strong, as you'd expect, but he works hard around

the pitch getting his hands on the ball and keeping the impetus going. When he tackles he makes an impact, and he wins his fair share of turnovers. Gloucester have plenty of flair players in Duncan McRae, Henry Paul, James Simpson-Daniel and Marcel Garvey, and they have plenty of ability in the pack with Jake Boer, Alex Brown and James Forrester. Olivier Azam is a vital cog in this team, a true competitor, and is definitely a man worth keeping an eye out for this afternoon.

SUPPORTERS!

Welcome to the Rec today to the Gloucester supporters, as their team return to Bath once more, hoping to end their record of never having won a league game on our ground. An exciting draw two years ago in our recent bleak period was the closest they have come to date - and, of course, all those in Blue, Black and White here this afternoon will be hoping that it stays that way for some time to come! Gloucester are in a rich vein of form, however, so an excellent game is in prospect as we have now chalked up backto-back wins and started to remember how to tackle. Last season's 41-7 triumph by Bath ensured that we finished top of the league table by a margin of 6 points. Wasps' home defeat by

Leicester actually meant that we did not need that final victory, but the team did not know that as the final games kicked off, and they provided us with a memorable end to the season at the Rec.

There remains a fierce local rivalry between the two clubs, although both sets of supporters now find themselves curiously united by a common sense of grievance. We share the experience of having won the league in the 'regular' season, only to fail to secure the Championship at Twickenham and end up with no silverware to show for a season of achievement. If we Bath supporters feel 'robbed' or, at the very least, mightily frustrated at the ultimate outcome, then spare a thought for the 'Shedheads'. In 2002-3

Gloucester not only won the league by 15 points but were simply humiliated in the Zurich Final by Wasps. The margin of their league superiority - amounting to 3 bonus point wins - was surely the only evidence needed that they were indeed the team of that season, which their Cup victory over Northampton merely served to confirm.

Bath last year, and Gloucester two seasons ago, were top of the table for virtually the entire campaign, and were then faced with a competitive lay-off for three weeks as a 'reward', whereas the momentum of the runnersup was maintained through a semi-final play-off and, in both 2003 and 2004, a European Final. There is always the risk of injuries, of course, but if luck is with you then maintaining

that competitive edge is a distinct advantage - as the last two years have proved. Yes, "rules are rules", and management. coaches, players, supporters, and even journalists were all aware of how the competition would be decided before it kicked off. Something to be grateful for in itself, I suppose, after the embarrassing shambles of previous seasons when it seemed that the goalposts were almost literally moved on a weekly basis. Remember when Leicester beat Bath in the first-ever Premiership Final? Quite late on in the season there were attempts to make the end-of-season match at HQ rather more than just a 'showpiece'. Sensibly the idea was resisted on that occasion, and a separate trophy was awarded to Leicester on the day.

So, why the change? We are told that the Clubs themselves all support the current format. Perhaps they do. The determination of the entire league competition on the last weekend in May has accorded the Play-Off Final a dramatic significance without which it would certainly struggle to capture the imagination, but is such a contrived ending to a nine-month league competition necessary, let alone fair? A Grand National with only three runners? The Zurich Premiership is surely now sufficiently well-established in its own right, and rightly





acknowledged as the leading club tournament in rugby, that such an engineered conclusion is rather self-mocking.

Furthermore, who's not in favour of the play-off system? Well, we're not - the fans. Scrutiny of all of the unofficial supporters' websites (with the exception of Wasps', understandably) showed clearly that whilst many welcomed or accepted an end-of-season 'celebration of the club game' at Twickenham, virtually all contributors considered Bath to be the true champions in 2004, just as they had 'crowned' Gloucester in 2003. Maybe we will be stuck with it for the foreseeable future, maybe not. In rugby, if the early years of professionalism have taught us anything at all it is not to be surprised by the next surprise!
