


# MIKE TINDALL

As I mentioned earlier. It is important that we play as we know we can this weekend. The game down at Sandy Park was a real kick in the teeth for us as we know that we're capable of so much more but, on the day, we just didn't deliver.

We were obviously devastated by the way we performed even more so because of the huge number of supporters who followed us down to Devon. As we did our warm ups, we could see Cherry and White everywhere which was fantastic but, of course, we now know that we let them down on the day.

It's always difficult to put your finger on exactly why things went the way they did and always easy to make excuses.

We felt good going into the game. We'd had a good preseason including a couple of testing away matches to get us ready for opening up on the road. The preparation was spot on.

One thing I will say is that we definitely didn't underestimate Exeter or fail to pay them enough respect. We knew full well what a huge occasion it was for them and that they would lift their game to the highest possible levels.

It's easy to make excuses and I'm not going to. We know that we weren't good enough last weekend and we've been busting a gut this week in training to put things right.

Words are all very good but it's our actions on the field that count and hopefully we'll prove that to you this afternoon.

Enjoy the game!

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n behalf of everyone at Gloucester Rugby, I'd like to wish the players, staff and supporters of Leeds Carnegie a very warm welcome to Kingsholm this afternoon.

It's good to be back on familiar ground after travelling to Wales to play the Ospreys, Ireland to take on Munster and then down to Devon last weekend to face the Exeter Chiefs.

Playing two of our three preseason friendlies away from home was a deliberate tactic, of course, as we sought to improve on our away form from last season.

Unfortunately, despite some decent performances in Swansea and Cork in preseason, we didn't deliver down at Sandy Park.

Even a few days after the event, the defeat at the hands of the Chiefs is tough to take. As I say, we'd done some good stuff in preseason but the display last weekend was a huge disappointment for everyone involved.

I spoke about it in some length after the game but the core basics of our game just weren't there. We made a huge number of clean line breaks but didn't finish them off. Forward passes, knock ons, they all contributed to chances going begging.

We also made it easy for Exeter to accumulate points. They did score a good opening try but ill discipline then gave Gareth Steenson far too many opportunities to kick for goal and he's too good a marksman to turn those chances down.

The bottom line is that our performance meant that Exeter didn't actually have to play much rugby to earn the win. They certainly didn't have to create too much.

I felt particularly bad for the thousands of Gloucester supporters

who made the trip down to Exeter to follow us. I thought we had terrific backing on the day, there was Cherry and White everywhere.

But we let them down on the day and we have to set the record straight, hopefully starting today.

It won't be easy, however. Leeds also got off to a losing start last weekend, in front of their own supporters against Bath, and will be just as keen as ourselves to get some Premiership points on the board.

They are also a very difficult outfit to play against as we found out ourselves last season in our two encounters.

It'll be tough, it'll be physical. We'll have to be prepared to win every physical confrontation, to remain patient and keep hold of the ball, to make the most of the chances that come our way and to defend as though our lives depend on it.

We can't expect to just turn up and win. We have to earn that right and that's what we've been instilling in the squad this week at training.

As you'd expect, there's been a lot of hard work on the training paddock and a lot of straightforward talking. People have had to listen to things that they perhaps didn't want to hear but we know we were poor last week and

So, we're under no illusions about what lies in wait for us this afternoon. We're going to have to be extremely honest with ourselves and understand that anything less than 100% will not be good enough.


know that we have to be better.

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# Mike Tindall: We want silverware

loucester Rugby skipper Mike Tindall is determined to bring some silverware back to Kingsholm this season.

Since the World Cup winner made the short journey from Bath in 2005, he has only lifted the European Challenge Cup with the Cherry and Whites in 2006.

But after coming so close to glory in 2007 and 2008 when Gloucester

finished top of the Premiership table, Tindall says his desire to win the title is as strong as ever.

"Massively, it has been my aim for the last 14 years of playing professional rugby," said Tindall who has 63 caps for England.

"I want a domestic title. I want the Premiership title. Yes, we won the European Challenge Cup a few years back but we have finished top of the Premiership two or three times and not won it.

"That hurts after a while so we have still got to strive for that and that has still got to be our goal."

Bryan Redpath's side began the new campaign with a 22-10 defeat at newly promoted Exeter last Saturday to compound their away day woes.

They did outscore their opponents by two tries to one with James Simpson-Daniel crossing in the first

half and replacement Tim Taylor going over late on.

The setback at Sandy Park was all the more disappointing given that, during preseason, Redpath's men had looked impressive on the road when chalking up a 24-14 win at Magners League champions the Ospreys.

Gloucester also pushed 2006 and 2008 Heineken Cup champions Munster all the way in a 15-10 defeat at Musgrave Park, their only loss of the 2010-11 pre-season campaign.

It was a deliberate tactic to take

the side away from Kingsholm and out of their comfort zone to try and improve upon Gloucester's away record in 2009-10.

Last season the Cherry and Whites won just twice on the road all season, at this week's opponents Leeds Carnegie and local rivals Worcester Warriors.

Leeds finished ninth in the final standings and Worcester were relegated to the Championship. For Gloucester to compete for the places in the top half of the Aviva Premiership Rugby table, it's obvious that picking up away wins at teams in the top half of the table is essential. And Tindall says working on their away day mentality has been a big focus of their pre-season preparations.

"The way the boys have reacted this summer has been exceptional really," added Tindall.

"Brush (Redpath) has tried to make it a hard and tough environment, tougher on yourself, tougher on other people and making people accountable.

"We are trying to grow as players and personalities and hopefully that will shine through in the tough games."

### ames Simpson-Daniel seems to have been part of the Gloucester Rugby set up forever!

However, the England international winger who recently became a father following the arrival of baby George, is still only 28 years old.

A rarity in the modern game, a one club man, Sinbad, as he is affectionately known in these parts, is now looking forward to a 2010-11 season which will be particularly significant for him as it will be his testimonial season.

### A testimonial at the age of 28 – that takes some doing?

"Yes, I've been here for a long time and I remember coming down from up north and meeting up with the lads, meeting people like Terry Fanolua and Ian Jones and other Gloucester greats." considered a Gloucester veteran and admitted that the game has changed a lot over the years.

"Definitely. I came into it as a mere schoolboy who thought it was as simple as just dotting down the ball down over the line! I thought it was very simple and didn't really appreciate how much more detail there was to rugby."

"But I've loved every single season, the people I've played with, the supporters who have always been there for me."

"It's going to be an exciting year and I am glad my committee are looking after the testimonial side of things so I can remain as focused as ever on my rugby. The rugby will be a massive challenge, we're desperate to win something. I know that we say that every year but it is genuinely the case."

Do any games or events in particular stick out as highlights over that time? "Someone did ask me this a few days

I could name so many. Trevor Woodman and Phil Vickery who are very good friends of mine and who were ushers at my wedding."

"Who would have thought when I first started that someone like Mike Tindall would join Gloucester Rugby from our biggest rivals Bath? He's become a close friend."

"And then, of course, there all the positive off field influences as well. I'll make sure to acknowledge them as and when."

### Looking ahead to this season, Gloucester's squad has stayed relatively stable compared to most Aviva clubs. That could be an important factor?

"I think that's a real positive. We don't need to start from scratch, we can build on what we've done before as a group, do some fine tuning and get really good at


"There have been some real characters like Jason Little and Duncan McRae, Frank Schizano and Rodrigo Roncero. executing what we consider to be our strengths."






It's not as if we were alone in losing last weekend, Leicester and Saracens both went down and come the end of the season they will be at the right end scrapping for honours.

he close season is now over, a period for dreams and aspiration, now the reality is upon us. Optimism abounds and rightly so stretching from Sandy Lane in Exeter to the extreme north of England in Newcastle.

Summer months came and passed with a glimmer of hope for the England international team with a rare victory in Australia in a team containing **Mike Tindall**.

It would be unwise not to appreciate that there will have to be a concerted effort of higher dimension for England to prosper in the forthcoming World Cup of next year. This is surely where the coaching regime appointed by Rob Andrew and Martin Johnson will be judged.

The demise of the England soccer team and their manager Fabio Capello has been well documented. Newspaper post mortems have highlighted the fact that there is an acute shortage of players born within these shores and playing in the Barclays Premiership as the main reason for the perceived debacle.

World Cups in any sport highlight the availability of players to any national coach. It is interesting to note that from a twelve team Rugby Union Premiership, that this past summer England were able to select 100 players to go on tour!

Forty six went to Australia, a further twenty eight players travelled to the United States of America for the



Churchill Cup. Another twenty eight players then travelled to Argentina for the IRB Under-20 World Championship.

Time will dictate whether this trend will be allowed to continue. Currently there are 64% of Premiership players that are England qualified. To the credit of the game of rugby union this figure remained constant since the game became professional.

The creation of the England qualified player scheme which gives incentives for clubs to field home grown players in their match day squads has caused a degree of consternation.

A recent report stated that Wasps, Bath and Harlequins comfortably exceeded the target of fielding an average of fourteen or more England qualified players in their twenty-three match day squads. It also recorded that several clubs failed to meet the target set by quite considerable margins!

What a contrast to the background of two individuals with Kingsholm connections starting this season with new clubs in a coaching capacity.

Former British and Irish Lions Head Coach, Sir Ian McGeechan O.B.E. has been appointed Performance Director by Bath. Sir Ian was the Lions Chief in 1989, 1993 and 2009. He has also coached Scotland, Northampton and London Wasps. He left the Adams Park club in May 2009 to manage the Lions.

As a player he represented Scotland thirty two times and toured with the British Lions in 1974 and 1977.

Meanwhile, at the other end of the spectrum, Richard Ward, our former lock forward has taken up a



coaching role with Stroud R.F.C. at Fromehall Park.

Our visitors today, Leeds Carnegie, registered their eighth signing of the close season when they signed back row forward Daniel Browne from Bath on a two year contract. The club's intent to cement a place in Rugby Union's Premiership cannot be auestioned.

Leeds Carnegie in seven visits to Kingsholm for league encounters have recorded only one victory! That win occurred in the 2004-05 season when they triumphed by a 33 points to 15.

Those seven visits saw the 'Cherry & Whites' record 214 points while today's opponents have registered 99.

Results in seasons where the Yorkshire club have been our visitors have been as follows: -

2001-02, 58-17. 2002-03, 28-10. 2003-04, 24-19. 2005-06, 31-7. 2007-08, 39-16. 2009-10, 19-0.

Leeds first visit to Kingsholm came on 21st December 1996 for a Pilkington Cup tie. We were able to record a comfortable win by



55 points to 21 on that winter's afternoon. Leeds were at the time members of Division Three.



Today's match is our first home fixture in the Aviva Premiership. The new sponsor has been one of the more easily recognised financial institutions paying £20 million for the right.

This sum will help balance the accounts of clubs such as Harlequins, Sale Sharks, London Wasps, Saracens and Worcester Warriors who are reported to be losing substantial amounts verging on 2 million each.

Will we ever see a 14 club professional Premiership? It would not appear to be imminent for Premier Rugby have stated that relegation will stay in place for the next six years. Scrutiny shows that there are only fourteen clubs capable of staging top flight rugby union.

Who will join the Aviva Premiership next season? Worcester Warriors must be odds on favourites to gain promotion with their £2 million parachute payment



# Gloucester Talk with Peter Arnold

# HERE WE GO AGAIN



t's nice to be home, but I don't seem to have been away. It only seems a couple of weeks ago that I was wrapping up me final contribution for the 2009/10 season, yet here I am, hunched over the Iron Maiden, starting the whole process over again.

Summer, such as it was, has passed in a flash, partly, I suspect, because the close season has regaled us with much to remember on the sporting front.

Tennis fans will have been delighted with the best Wimbledon for years. At the time of writing, Lewis Hamilton is leading the Formula 1 drivers' championship.

And as for cricket

- well, I suppose you could call it "interesting", Not that we're in any position to be holier than thou over the no-ball betting scandal, bearing in mind the Bloodgate' affair at Harlequins.

Which brings me to the object of the exercise. I think we can be quite satisfied with the pre-season games. To have beaten both the Scarlets and the Ospreys and only lost by a score over the sea on Munster's own peat bog offers a modest degree of approval and cautious optimism for the new season.

I'm well aware that one can't read too much into such games - there is too much experimentation and too many substitutions on both sides for that – but it wasn't a bad return for three matches against testing opposition nonetheless. 
'lonno' never did seem to like us very much, a view coloured, perhaps, by the number of yellow cards he was awarded at Kingsholm!


As for the rest you pays your money and you takes your choice. Today's welcome visitors have also made some shrewd signings, and

"Gareth again did well. He didn't get as much game time but got some key turnovers and put in some big hits. He chased back well in defence and his work rate and attitude were excellent."






international stars but sought to go out and win the game by playing positive rugby.

Munster defended tenaciously but Gloucester very nearly snatched the spoils right at the death with Tom Voyce just bundled into touch at the corner as time expired.


Defeat equalled disappointment on the night but satisfaction in the knowledge that progress was made and another step taken forward in the build up to the Aviva Premiership kick off.


