But we dug deep and kept fighting and massive credit is due to Nicky for kicking those two late penalties from inside his own half to clinch the game

And then to back that up with a victory over Bath down at the Rec was a massive achievement.

We all know how difficult it

is to win down there and the way we dominated proceedings was immensely satisfying. Anyone watching the post match interviews could see how much it meant to me and I was delighted for the whole squad.

However, we did get a bit of a wake up call down in France last weekend and that was disappointing for all of us.

As the captain I have to hold my hands up. I was yellow carded a couple of minutes from time and, while I was off the pitch, Agen scored 10 points to take the game 26-19

It was frustrating as we'd led 13-3 at half time and looked to be in control but our indiscipline allowed Agen to get back into the game and we just couldn't turn the momentum.

We have to learn from that and look to start putting the record straight this afternoon.

n behalf of everyone at Gloucester Rugby, I'd like to wish the players, staff and supporters of Rugby Rovigo a very warm welcome to Kingsholm this afternoon.

To my knowledge, we haven't played against Rugby Rovigo before and, to a certain extent, they're something of an unknown quantity.

They don't have a squad packed full of internationals or household names and it's not as easy analysing an Italian club side as it would be if we were playing in the Aviva Premiership today.

But, rest assured, we will be coming into today's game fully prepared and focussed and looking to bounce back after a bit of a blip in Agen last weekend.

It was incredibly disappointing to slip to defeat against the French side in a game that I still genuinely think we should have won.

However, anyone who has read my comments following the game, will know exactly why I think we lost the game.

We picked up two yellow cards in the second half which meant that we ended up playing for 20 minutes with only 14 men on the pitch.

You just can't get away with that at the highest level. The best teams will make you pay and Agen made the most of their numerical superiority.

What was particularly galling was that they hadn't really done anything to hurt us up to that point. They had some big old boys in the pack and they were quite adept at the pick and go from the ruck. But, we were coping pretty well and 13-3 was a decent return at half time.

I was unhappy after the game and I'm not going to make any bones about that fact. We went down there with a good side, a side capable of leaving with the win and we didn't

Our last game here, the win I mention above against Wasps, was a terrific occasion. We may not have had a full house here but it certainly sounded as though the place was full.


We had great support throughout the whole game and I certainly had the crowd behind me when I popped into the ESPN studio after the game to do the post match interview!

Jim Hamilton: Learning from our mistakes is crucial

im Hamilton believes Gloucester must start dealing with referees to end their high penalty count.

Calling on the Cherry and Whites to stop handing opponents cheap threepoint chances, the hulking lock said the build-up of a string of conceded penalties always takes its toll.

Admitting Bryan Redpath's men must do far more than simply cut out the yellow cards, the Scotland international said the players must deal far better with differing refereeing interpretations.

Gloucester must now get their Amlin Challenge Cup Pool Five campaign back on track.

Hosting Harlequins and Leicester on successive following Saturdays in the return of the Premiership, Gloucester know the importance of emerging in win credit

Hamilton believes Gloucester must react more quickly on the field to how different referees will handle specifics of the game.

He explained: "That's very hard to gauge to be honest, but that's what

"But we've got to pick ourselves up and learn from that.

The vagaries of rugby law dictate that no two referees will see certain situations the same way, and former Leicester Tiger Hamilton knows Gloucester must end the errors, and watch their step more closely.

Gloucester begin a three-game Kingsholm sequence today, where a bonus-point win against Rovigo is an absolute must.

we've got to start doing, and doing well.


"I felt terrible about my yellow card at Bath, but luckily it didn't affect the result.

However, despite being in his fourth season at Kingsholm, the Manchester born scrum half who moved up the M5 from the Exeter Chiefs for the 2007-8 season is still only 21 years old.

Time has flown for the England U20 international, a fact that he was reminded of by his parents only recently.

"It's funny. It wasn't that long ago that my Mum and Dad mentioned to me that this season is my fourth with Gloucester and I was genuinely surprised – the time has flown by."

However, when he joined Gloucester Rugby, Lewis was one of the first players to benefit from the link.

"It all worked really well for me because I was looking to go to University. I was talking to Gloucester and Dean (Ryan) told me about this degree that I could do whilst training with the club."

"It all tied in really well because lecture times worked well with training sessions and, if there were any occasional clashes, both sides helped work things out for me."

"But, we'd hit a good patch and were playing with some confidence and that showed in the way we played on the night. There were a few gaps for me on the night and that helped me settle into it."

However, later in the season came a setback as, in another televised game, he suffered a broken ankle which proved frustrating for a young player who just wanted to get game time and establish himself.



There they will be joined by three


clubs that have finished third, fourth and fifth best runners up their pool group Heineken Cup matches.

Harlequins were the winners of the Challenge Cup in 2001 and also 2004. In their Pool Group 1 they face Connacht, Bayonne and the Italian club Cavalieri Prato.

Along with Sale Sharks, Harlequins, Brive and Stade Francais, we are one of five clubs who participated in the Heineken Cup last season.

Amazingly, **Stade Francais** appear in this competition for the first time since 2003. It was beyond comprehension at the outset of last







season that they would have finished in eighth place in France's Top 14 League!

The glamour club of Paris are in Pool 4 where they will attract plenty of attention in visiting Leeds Carnegie, Rugby Parma and Bucaresti Oaks.

There will also be a return to these shores for Tom Palmer and James Haskell, who are two of a bevy of stars in the Parisian club's gaudy colours.

It will be fascinating to see how Aviva Premiership newcomers Exeter Chiefs progress in their European bow. They have a tough pool to emerge from where they meet Montpellier, Bourgoin and Newcastle Falcons.

On a parochial note we face two clubs who were in the French second division last season. They are SU Agen and La Rochelle. Rovigo from Italy completes the group.

Agen are no strangers to Kingsholm. Remember in the 2006-007

Heineken Cup, the French club completed the double over us! Can you recall Rupeni Caucaunbuca wreaking havoc here at Kingsholm?

Talking of La Rochelle, Seru Rabeni came close to joining the Kingsholm ranks ahead of the 2009-10 season.

The Fijian was reported to have been on the verge of signing a three year contract. If there was solace for Rubeni it came in the shape of a short term contract offered to him by Leeds Carnegie.

Seru Rabeni's contribution to Leeds Carnegie successful Premiership survival bid in fact earned him a place in Sky Sports Dream XV and then a lucrative move to one of our pool opponents La Rochelle.

We have faced La Rochelle before in the 2001-002 Challenge Cup. We defeated the French club 34-15 here at Kingsholm on September 29th before an attendance of 6,568.

Our try scorers that day were Junior Paramore, Joe Ewens and Christian Stoica with **Ludovic Mercier** converting 2 tries and landing 4 penalties.

It was on 12th January when we made the trip to La Rochelle, a torrid affair ending in a 36-12 victory but not without mishap with Trevor Woodman being dismissed.

Darren O'Leary, Chris Fortey and Patrice Collazo were our try scorers. Ludovic Mercier weighed in with 19 points from 2 conversions, three penalties and two dropped goals in front of 5,000 spectators.

Our meetings with Agen were not so fruitful. We entertained the French club in the Heineken Cup on 26th October 2006 at Kingsholm losing by 32 points to twenty-six before 10,134 spectators. Anthony Allen scoring 2 tries with one from Olly Azam. Willie Walker converted one try and Ryan Lamb kicked three penalties.

An evening match on 12th January 2007 in front of 8,000 fans saw Agen triumph again this time by 26 points to eighteen. Our points were accumulated by lain Balshaw and Peter Richards with a try apiece. Ryan Lamb added a single conversion along with 2 penalties.

Can we exact revenge this season? The Challenge Cup has fond memories for 'Cherry & White' fans when Dean Ryan guided the club to success at the culmination of the 2005-006 campaign.

Those amongst the 12,053 spectators at The Stoop on 21st May 2006 will always remember that final whistle, a moment of triumph.

Can we repeat it again?

Years ago, following a Calcutta Cup match, a spoof advertisement appeared on the noticeboard in the clubhouse.

It read, "Mike Burton has returned from Scotland with a badly bruised leg. Owner may reclaim it by writing to..."

As I say, no disrespect. I was reminded of the story when looking into the history of the Rovigo Rugby Club.

Apparently, it was founded in 1935 – comparatively recently by our standards – by a medical student who conceived a love of the game while studying at university. Whatever his motivation, his venture was supremely successful. The club has never been out of the Italian Super 10 league, which is their version of our Premiership. Over the years, until recently, Rovigo has won a whole raft of honours, although they fell on hard times, a few years ago, when a charismatic president and benefactor died.

Financial problems followed, and at one time, the club's very existence was threatened, but happily they weathered the storm, and survived to visit us, here at Kingsholm.

Come to think of it, that might be something of a culture shock. Their stadium only holds some 6,000 people, which is probably respectable by Italian standards, but hardly sufficient preparation for a Kingsholm crowd in full cry.

A whole galaxy of famous names have been associated with the Rovigo club over the years. Naas Botha played for them, as did one of the Contemponis.

They were also coached by the great Carwyn James at one time, and in case you're too young to remember, he was the manager who led the Lions to a series victory in New Zealand.

So a hearty welcome to our Latin visitors. We hope they thoroughly enjoy the Kingsholm experience.


Admittedly, there seems to have been considerable doubt

the visitors awarded a controversial late

Andy Hazell was the man penalised, wrongly as the televised pictures immediately confirmed, and the flanker admitted after the game that he wouldn't have slept for a week had Dave Walder successful slotted the kick.

However, perhaps justice as done as Walder's kick dipped just underneath the cross bar and Gloucester sealed the win.

It brought a thrilling end to a seesaw encounter and saw Gloucester maintain their unbeaten home Premiership record which saw them last suffer defeat at Kingsholm against, ironically, Wasps back in October 2009.

Robinson's crucial contribution captured the headlines but he will be the first to pay tribute to the role played by his fellow fly half Tim Taylor.

Taylor, who had to limp out of the action at half time, had pulled the strings with great aplomb during his 40 minutes on the pitch and helped Gloucester edge the first half by 16 points to 10.

It was a massive overall improvement on the previous week's performance at the Madejski Stadium when Gloucester had slipped to a 23-16 defeat at the hands of London Irish and the Kingsholm faithful responded in style by raucously backing their team all afternoon long.

To be fair, Bryan Redpath's side earned that support. From the very first minute, they played with a snap and intensity to their game which frequently forced their opponents onto the back foot and got the crowd behind them.


