


## MIKE TINDALL

then we'll really be staking a claim for a playoff place.

The odd thing is that they were here just a fortnight ago and I don't think anyone expected that we'd win so easily. However, I think we'll see a far different side here tonight.

They'll have been wounded by that result and, in a way, will be glad that they're back here so soon as it gives them a chance to put the record straight.

They're a tough opponent and nothing less than our best will be good enough tonight.


Finally, I've had a bit of stick regarding my 'exuberant' celebrations when I scored my try against Italy last weekend at Twickenham!

n behalf of everyone at Gloucester Rugby, I'd like to wish the players, staff and supporters of London Irish a very warm welcome to Kingsholm this evening.

Actually, I should say welcome back to Kingsholm because Toby Booth and his side were our guests here only a fortnight ago but, on that occasion, it was the LV= Cup not the Aviva Premiership.

A fortnight ago, things went very much our way. Everything clicked for us and very little happened for Irish that day.

We'd be naïve to think that this evening's game will be similar to a fortnight ago. They'll be a far different proposition from the one we faced in the LV= Cup.

They had a rough run of results in the last couple of months in 2010, but have actually won three out their past five games and got back to winning ways in the Premiership last weekend with their win over Newcastle Falcons at the Madejski.

So, we know that we'll have to be at our best tonight if we're to maintain our winning run but, having done the hard work and picking up a win at Wasps last Sunday, getting a result tonight is very important for us.

It won't be easy as we're coming into tonight's game off the back of a short week. Kicking off at 5pm on a Sunday evening away from home leaves you with a bit of a challenge when the following game is on the Friday evening!

We've had to manage the boys carefully this week as a result.
There's no point flogging them on the training field at this point of the season particularly when it is such a short turnaround.

They need time for rest and recovery and the strength and conditioning staff, and our physios of course, have done a great job this week. Last Sunday's win over Wasps was a big one for us and we had to work incredibly hard on the day especially when lost a couple of boys late to injury and had to reshuffle our resources.

However, once we saw the weather on Sunday morning we knew that this wasn't going to be a high scoring encounter!

As Carl Hogg said at the post match press conference, it was a day for 'round the corner and collision'! The forwards had to roll up their sleeves and do the hard work and the backs had to make the post of the possession.

It all went fairly well in the first

#### Doran-Jones: Desperate for silverware

"A trophy swag-bag would be the perfect thing to tuck under my arm before I go. That would be ideal, and a good way to round things off."

NTERPRISING Paul Doran-Jones is desperate to steal some silverware with Gloucester before swapping Kingsholm for Franklin's Gardens.

Keen to leave a trophy legacy before joining Northampton Saints in the summer, the 25-year-old tighthead prop pledged full commitment to the Gloucester cause comes as standard.

Doran-Jones demolished the woefully inadequate Tim Payne as Gloucester's pack punished Wasps in the scrummage during last Sunday's 10-9 Adams Park victory.

The former London Welsh number three forged a robust combination with consistent Nick Wood and impressive hooker Darren Dawidiuk.

Gloucester's victory elevated them back to fourth in the Premiership, the playoff challenge escalating in the coming weeks.

With an LV=Cup semi-final on the cards to boot, Doran-Jones hopes to help Gloucester scoop their first honours since the 2006 European Challenge Cup.

Doran-Jones explained: "I'd absolutely love to help Gloucester win some silverware

before I leave.

"A trophy swag-bag would be the perfect thing to tuck under my arm before I go. That would be ideal, and a good way to round things off."

"But we can't get carried away, or get ahead of ourselves, we've got a lot of work to do. Sunday was the kind of performance that can win you things, so we've just got to keep focusing on repeating those levels."

"It's a massive decision (to leave) and it was really tough. People are going to throw things around and people are going to pick reasons, but it was just aimed at trying to develop myself as a player."

"I'm really happy at Gloucester, I love playing for the club and all the dayto-day stuff that comes with that at Kingsholm."

"It will be really hard for me to leave when the time comes. Whatever's happening then though, week to week now doesn't change one bit."

"We've still got to keep striving to build those performances, improve as a pack and give the backs the platform they need to pull teams apart."

"If we can do all of that we'll keep





ourselves in the hunt for the top prizes we crave."

Rejecting praise for his personal performance that scooped him ESPN's nomination as Man of the Match at Wasps, Doran-Jones hailed Gloucester's resilience and discipline up front.

Anticipating another frenetic encounter when London Irish return to Kingsholm in Premiership action this evening, he said a fast start will be crucial.

#### He continued:

"We went to quite a direct game to account for the weather, and I really enjoyed it. They gave the award to

me, but any dominance was down to the whole eight."

"We've got a lot of weight in there with Big Jim and Will James at lock, and we were more than solid, which is a great forward effort."

"We train really hard as a pack of forwards and we put a lot of detail into the way we try to play. We want to play with movement and shape, but you can't do that in conditions like the weekend, and it was great we could adapt."


"Not many teams go to Wasps and win, they've got a really solid defensive structure and for us to manage that is massive. It carries

on the momentum we've built over the last few weeks, and allows us to keep that going."

"Irish will be a much tougher proposition this time around, they'll be galvanised by their win over Newcastle – but also by their frustrations with their performance here two weeks ago."

"They're a powerful side that obviously underperformed at Kingsholm two weeks ago, I think everyone knows that."

"We're not taking anything for granted, and we know we've got to start strongly and apply early pressure to have a chance."



#### harlie Sharples has come way a long way in a short time.

'Discovered' at one of the Premiership Rugby Camps run on a regular basis by Gloucester Rugby's Community Department, he made the first team at the tender age of 18 and scored his first senior try in a win over Bath.

He went on to feature in the Junior World Cup for the England U20s before starting to score tries for fun for the first XV.

It's been a hectic couple of years and he's still only aged 21!

Talking to him at the club's training ground at Hartpury recently, his sheer enthusiasm for the game shines through and, surrounded by a number of his best mates, there is obviously no

level of performances, then I'll stay in the mix."

"But we can't do our job without the centres like Eli and Tins giving us ball at the right time, putting us into space etc. The fly halves do a great job getting the back line moving and we can't do anything, of course, without the pack winning quality ball!"

Establishing a regular spot on the wing is a challenge in the Gloucester squad this season. As well as Sharples, the likes of Jonny May, James Simpson-Daniel, Lesley Vainikolo and Tom Voyce all have powerful arguments for regular inclusion.

"There's competition and that's the way it's always been. We've always had good wingers and I've had to gradually work my way up the list. Hopefully, as long as I keep working hard and maintaining my "And playing at 15 helps my appreciation of the game overall and improves my wing game as a result. I'd love to be as accomplished a back three player as Balsh (lain Balshaw) was when he was here."

There has been lots of talk about the youngsters coming through the ranks and making their mark at first team level and it's obvious that they're a really tight unit on and off the pitch.

"Yeah, we all live in the same block of flats so we see a fair bit of each other away from the rugby. We've all come through the Academy together and, although we've lost a few along the way, it's great to see your mates alongside you in the first team."

"We've played a lot of rugby together over the past few years and that's what we love doing. It's cheesy but when we're all out there playing at Kingsholm, it's like a dream come true."



"To get back there would be great but we've got to turn up at home to the Dragons first. Noone's taking anything for granted on that one but we haven't even discussed it yet. We've got to get through these league matches first."



Richard Hill, now at Worcester was at the helm where playing matters were concerned.

He declared at the outset of the season that finishing mid table in the League was a realistic target. It is fair to say that was exactly what he delivered.

It was a satisfactory outcome based on local talent. Leicester's famous ABC club had problems with a front trio of Andy Deacon, Phil Greening and Tony Windo!

Inspirational captain, Dave Sims had Rob Fidler as his lock partner. The latter developed well enough to be considered for England's Argentina tour.

Can you recall a back row of Pete Glanville, Simon Devereux and Nathan Carter who never seemed to stop running?

Admittedly, it was not all forward play. Mark Mapletoft in his first season at fly half was a revelation and topped the national points table. Chris Catling became recognised as one of the best young full backs in the country with Scott Benton at scrum half attracting attention.

In a battle hardened pack Phil Greening's arrival on the international scene was no more than the faithful who attended Kingsholm expected.

The season commenced with the club's worst ever defeat on the opening day of the season. Fielding a virtual United team the club were heavily beaten by 75 points to 19 on 31st August 1996 at The Stoop, home of Harlequins. In fact four consecutive defeats followed this reverse.

So five League games had been lost, it was a period of fairly coronary inducing times. Many pundits were forecasting that the Cherry and Whites were odds on for relegation!

It was a chilly Sunday afternoon at Kingsholm on 6th October where the players decided that reports of Gloucester's demise were greatly exaggerated.

On that day eventual champions Wasps were defeated in some style and the season was deemed to be

back on track. A 28 points to 23 victory in front of 5,886 spectators was a godsend.

That victory signalled a seven match winning streak, a club record including three away victories. A place in the Pilkington Cup Semi Finals was achieved where we were a shade unlucky to lose to Leicester. It was an opinion re-inforced with a 32 points to 30 win over the Tigers in a floodlit encounter a few days later.

On an individual basis the following players made their League debuts -Dave Timmington, Charlie Mulraine, Phil Vickery, Richard Ward, Rob York, Chris Catling, Ed Pearce, Craig Emmerson, Eral Anderson, Audley Lumsden, Nathan Carter and Chris Fortey. Charlie Mulraine scored a try on his debut in that demoralising opening day defeat at Harlequins.

It was a season where thirty -five players appeared for the club with another two as replacements. There were no ever presents, with Dave Sims, Mark Mapletoft and Rob Fidler appearing in 21 matches.

Tries were at a premium with only West Hartlepool and Orrell scoring fewer! On the other hand, the opposition were prevented from scoring tries in five games, the best record in the division!

Twice a total of eleven tries were conceded in a match, at Harlequins and in a 71 points to 21 defeat at Bath in the penultimate match of the season.

Strangely, there were more tries scored in away matches than at Kingsholm! Twenty-two at home exceeded by one try away!

Captain Dave Sims became the second player after Ian Smith to reach 100 League appearances for the club. League tables had been in existence before professionalism.

Mark Mapletoft re-wrote Gloucester's record books in a tremendous season which culminated with his worthy selection for England's summer tour to Argentina. Mark ended the season with 269 points which placed him third in the Division One all time list and destroyed the club record of 85 points which Mark shared with Tim Smith.

The club fly half became only the second Gloucester player to pass career totals of 200 and 300 points after Tim Smith.

Overall, we scored 46 tries, converted 27, kicked 58 penalties and recorded 6 drop goals. We conceded 62 tries of which 46 were converted and conceded 54 penalties. No club recorded a drop goal against the Cherry and Whites.

Mike Lloyd was our leading try scorer with seven including a hat trick in our 37 points to 10 victory


Mark also equalled and then broke the club record for points in a match. First of all he equalled Tim Smith's record of 20 points and then in the momentous victory against Leicester he converted both tries and kicked six penalties for a 22 point haul. The six penalties equalled the club record he already shared with Tim Smith.

The highest attendance at Kingsholm was the 6,310 spectators who attended the Leicester match on 8th April 1997, while the 3,635 attendance against London Irish on 7th December 1996 was the lowest.

over West Hartlepool enabling him to become the first player to score a hat trick of tries for two different First Division sides. His previous hat trick was for Bristol against Rugby in March 1992.

Phil Greening was voted the R.F.U. Young Player of the Year and Mark Mapletoft was Unisys Top Scorer.

The average attendance for League matches at Kingsholm was 4,985 spectators while the average for away matches was 4,279.

Come to think of it, that was only two weeks ago, but I'm not really expecting a repeat performance. That would be too much to ask for, and in any case, the Premiership is a very different proposition from the LV= Cup.

On paper, the side which isn't very Irish and doesn't play in London, looked a strong one. Yes, they were missing a few players, but so were we.

What some people would regard as our first-choice three-quarter line was absent, with Tindall and Simpson Daniel away on international duty, and Vainikolo nursing a dislocated shoulder.

Yet, a fortnight ago, we turned out with Attwood and Doran Jones absent, as was Scott Lawson, and with Jim Hamilton on his first run out since breaking his foot back in October.

Yet it was the Irish front eight, often regarded as one of the most formidable in the country, who were on the receiving end.

As I say, this is a different day. Both sides need to win, Irish will want to set the record straight following a game in which they didn't seem to turn up, while Gloucester will want to prove that the last Kingsholm game wasn't some sort of transient purple patch.

There's a lot to play for in Premiership terms too.

But I don't have to tell you that.


If memory serves, Paul Turner did have one Cap for Wales, and that was all. There was never any doubt about his talent, but one could ask questions about his personality.


stretchered off like that.

30-16 LV= Cup win which saw them move to the top of their qualifying group.

That previous meeting, which saw Leeds achieve their first Premiership win of the season, was a hugely disappointing outcome and Gloucester's body language in the opening few minutes alone hinted at a grim determination to emerge victorious this time around.

as it forced the home side to come out and chase the game a little which, in turn, offered opportunities to Bryan Redpath's side.





Qualification for the LV= Cup semi finals was now in Gloucester's hands. A win over the Exiles would clinch the spot.



Gloucester ran in five tries in the first 40 minutes to all but put the game to bed much to the delight






