

THERE'S A GREAT SPIRIT IN THE CAMP AT THE WOMENT. I WAY HAVE BEEN AWAY. WITH ENGLAND BUT I'M STILL IN TOUCH WITH THE BOYS AND CONFIDENCE IS OBVIOUSLY/HIGH.

It's a great feeling to be able to sit down and write these programme notes on the back of another good couple of weeks for Gloucester Rugby.

The boys have been given a really tough examination in the past few weeks. We could see this run of fixtures looming ahead of us and knew full well how tough it was going to be. But, so far, and I'm crossing my fingers when I type this (!), we've done pretty well so far.

The last month have seen us take on London Irish twice and travel to London Wasps and Northampton Saints. That's a pretty testing run of games and to emerge from that with four wins is the result of a superb effort from the lads.

In particular, going to the likes of Adams Park and Franklin's Gardens and returning with the points is a great achievement. There's a great spirit in the camp at the moment. I may have been away with England but I'm still in touch with the boys and confidence is obviously high.

However, this is no time to be relaxing, patting ourselves on the backs and telling ourselves how great we are. The Aviva Premiership table is incredibly tight at the moment and even a brief run of results, good or bad, can have a massive impact.

Look at London Irish and Northampton Saints. They were both looking really comfortable at the top of the table not so long ago. A few defeats in a row and they've slid down a few places.

On the other hand, ourselves and Bath have strung a few good results together and moved into the play off positions. It can all change so quickly – we're only five points clear

of Harlequins who are in 7th place...

On to this afternoon's game, though. As I say, both teams are in good form which adds a little bit more spice to what is always one of the most hard fought fixtures on the calendar – as if it needed it!

In fact the banter started last weekend after England beat France. I was told of our win at Northampton after the game which put me in a pretty good mood and the Bath boys got wind of their win down at Exeter a bit later on.

We obviously won down at the Rec earlier this season and would like nothing better than to complete a double.

However, the Bath boys remember that game just as much as we do and they'd love to restore their pride by winning at Kingsholm.

It should be a great game.

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n behalf of everyone at Gloucester Rugby, I'd like to wish the players, staff and supporters of Bath Rugby a very warm welcome to Kingsholm this afternoon.

Gloucester Rugby vs Bath Rugby. A West Country derby in front of a sell out crowd at Kingsholm with both teams going well in the league as well. They don't come much bigger than this do they?

It's also a fixture that will always hold a special place in my heart as it's the first competitive fixture, if you ignore preseason friendlies, that we played after I was named Head Coach of Gloucester Rugby.

And they're coming here in pretty good form. They've had a real resurgence in form in the last few weeks. Since they lost down in Biarritz in the Heineken Cup in late January, they've reeled off five wins in a row. So, they'll be feeling pretty good about themselves.

The last couple of weeks have seen this run up a bonus point win at home to Northampton Saints and then they dogged out a win at the Exeter Chiefs which isn't to be sniffed at. That's the sign of a good side.

I don't think it's any coincidence that their resurgence in form has come following the return of Butch James. He didn't play his first game of the season following a knee injury until just before Christmas but he's been pulling the strings ever since.

He's a big part of what they do but we also need to respect the likes of Matt Banahan, Olly Barkley and Michael Claassens. They're all potential game winners.

As ever, though, we'll respect our opponents and prepare accordingly but we'll focus more on ourselves and on what we can do.

As you can imagine, we're feeling

pretty good about ourselves at the moment. That's what winning eight games in a row can do for you.

However, we're definitely not getting carried away. One look at the fixture list is all it takes to keep your feet well and truly on the ground! Bath today, an LV= Cup semi final against the Dragons next weekend and trip to Harlequins looming in the background.

And, take a look at the Aviva Premiership league table. Third place might seem like a good place to be at present. But, we're only four points ahead of Bath and five points ahead of Northampton Saints, London Irish and Harleguins Last weekend at Franklin's Gardens was perhaps a bigger achievement though. Northampton are every bit as good on their own patch as we are here at Kingsholm. They have a proud home record and they defend it with everything they have.

Conditions weren't great but they were the same for both sides and I thought the boys executed our game plan brilliantly on the day.

There was a bit of a wobble when we conceded a try early in the second half which gave them a one point lead and then Stephen Myler had a kickable penalty which thankfully he missed.



who are in fifth, sixth and seventh places respectively.

It's tight and a couple of results, good or bad, could see that table change dramatically so we know we have to keep our foot on the gas pedal.

We've managed to do that over the past couple of weeks and I have to pay tribute to the whole squad because we've had to cope with a few international absentees and we've picked up a few knocks along the way.

Last time out here at Kingsholm we knew that we'd face a far different London Irish outfit from the one that had played here a couple of weeks earlier in the LV= Cup.

And they didn't disappoint! They were a much different proposition but I felt that were in control throughout and did a very professional job on the night.

Those are the sort of situations in the past where games have slipped away from us on the road. But we took a grip of things in the second half and I thought we thoroughly deserved the win.



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Pasqualin: The Premiership semi final mission

nsatisfied Jordi Pasqualin is pleased Gloucester have proved their play off potential – but now challenged the Cherry and Whites to vindicate preseason predictions


The 20-year-old scrum half calmly guided Gloucester to an impressive 18-16 Northampton Saints victory on Saturday, and now wants the men from Kingsholm to raise their resurgence still higher.

Gloucester's fourth straight Premiership win cemented third place, and with two games in hand the top four charge is on course.

Cherry and Whites boss Bryan Redpath revealed Gloucester's Premiership title ambitions in preseason, to some eyebrow raising outside this county.

Pasqualin believes Gloucester have now done enough to warrant top four respect – but admitted that will evaporate if the Cherry and Whites do not complete their Premiership semi final mission.

Pasqualin explained: "A lot of people questioned statements like that at the beginning of the season, especially when we didn't finish where we wanted in the league last year.



"Waiting for your opportunities when you're young, you've got to be patient — but when they come, you've got to make an impression."

"But this year we've put in performances against the best teams out there – or what people think are the best teams out there – and we're proving that we're just as good as them and that we deserve to be in the reckoning.

"But we've got to keep the hard work going, we've got to keep pushing for that top four and the play offs.

"There's no point proving we're good enough, then not seeing that through, no one will accept half a job.


"Not only can everyone be pleased with their individual performances from Saturday, but as a team we played very well, and fed off each other's energy.

"We put in some big hits in defence and in attack we offered great variation off lineouts, and that paid off.

"We carried our defence through again, and it's about doing whatever it takes to bring them down."

An ankle injury to Dave Lewis and Rory Lawson's Six Nations duty could hand Pasqualin an extended run that might lead to LV=Cup semi-final





action and beyond.

Young Dan Robson came off the bench for an impressive cameo at Northampton too, but Pasqualin is keen to take his chance while he can.

Paying tribute to Gloucester's forward dominance, he also hailed the fans' strong contribution in the East Midland fortress.

He continued: "It makes my job a hell of a lot easier, the boys up front put another cracking performance in and we're just growing in confidence off that all the time.

"Waiting for your opportunities when you're young, you've got to be patient - but when they come, you've got to make an impression.

"I've been fortunate enough to have quite a lot of involvement this year, through international duty or injury, and if I keep progressing hopefully I'll be earning my spot purely through merit.

"Those boys are tough up there, just like we are at Kingsholm, so we're delighted to have come away with a win.


"Any win at Franklin's Gardens is

"It's massive for them too, and we're really proud to be able to secure results like that in front of them.

few of the players who may well be performing on the Kingsholm turf this afternoon will have experienced what it's like to play for both Gloucester and Bath.

Mike Tindall and Tom Voyce both started their careers at the Rec while Olly Barkley, of course, had a short stint in the Cherry and White hoops.

However, one man who has genuinely seemed to enjoy these West Country clashes in the past couple of seasons is a man who doesn't even hail from anywhere near these parts although the Kingsholm faithful are now happy to hail him as one of their own.

Samoan international Eliota Fuimaono-Sapolu spent four seasons in the blue, black and white of Bath before moving to join Gloucester in the summer of 2009.

In fact, his first senior game for Gloucester was against his former club here on the opening day of 2009-10, a day which turned out to be one to remember.

Intriguingly, when asked this week of the significance of the fixture for the two clubs, the qualified solicitor focussed initially on the similarities between the two clubs.

"It may just be my viewpoint but I find that there are more similarities between the two clubs than there are differences. I know that the Shed like to wind up the Bath fans and vice versa. But, having been at both clubs, I think they're quite similar."

"This game is incredibly important to both sets of supporters, I know how much it means for both. With us having won at Bath and having such a good record at Kingsholm, they have all the motivation they need to try and turn us over."

Not that long ago, of course, Bristol were a paid up member of the Premiership and there were other local clashes to look forward to. However, with Bristol now playing their trade in the Championship, the Apia born centre can understand why this game is so keenly anticipated.

"This is the West Country derby now. It's a shame Bristol have dropped out. I wrote something on Twitter not long ago which said that, if the West Country had a combined side, it'd be incredibly strong."

Looking back to this fixture last season, perhaps it was because he'd just made the move up from the Rec but he seemed to relish the whole occasion?

"It was good because no-one gave us a chance really. Even though it was at Kingsholm, people said Bath were the better side and they might say so again this weekend with the likes of Butch James and Olly Barkley playing well and Shontayne (Hape) and Matt Banahan could be back."

"It could be a typical star studded Bath team but we like it when people write us off. They have a go at us on The Rugby Club but it just spurs us on, we thrive on it."

Like any top class sportsman, the 30 year old wants to be pitting himself against the very best.

"Absolutely. You don't want them to have any excuses, that they weren't at full strength. But bring their best, bring their worst — we'll play them."

One thing that has characterised

During the 2007 Rugby World Cup, Eli represented Samoa playing out of position at fly-half.

Fuimaono-Sapolu's performances for Gloucester so far this season has been that he has played with a smile on his face. He genuinely seems to be enjoying his rugby.

"I am but it's down to the team really. They've been so positive and the focus this year has been for us to be so much better than last season and it's been really enjoyable."

"It also helps that we haven't had too many rainy games. Last season we had muddy game after muddy game!"

"But the main thing is the spirit, being underdogs and going under the radar. The boys are clicking."

Is it too wide of the mark to say he's fallen in love with the game again this year?

"Yes, that's it exactly. We said amongst ourselves a few months ago that we just need to love to play. Our defence will sort itself out but we need to play like we're 5 years old again, trying to get the ball from your friends."

"We talked after the defeat up at Leeds and realised that the backs were encouraging the forwards to take the ball up and it shouldn't be like that. We should be demanding the ball off them!"

"And we made a conscious choice to start playing that way. Let's not be too systematic, let's go and enjoy it, let's believe in ourselves. Let's get back to playing and loving the sport."

Noble ideals but he firmly believes that the young guns at Gloucester have the talent to turn those ideals into reality.

"Some of our youngsters have extraordinary talent. They're in the mould of New Zealand players. They're all fit, they're all very skinny but very powerful — they remind me of back home."

"You see Freddie (Burns) with his chip and chasing and little offloads. Charlie Sharples, someone not that big but running over players and bowling them over like Jonah. It's amazing. They're really confident and they're putting a lot of pressure on us older guys."

"But it takes pressure to make a diamond and we're loving it. We relish the pressure and the competition because we know we're getting better as a result."

Pressure is of course part and pace of the modern game and everyone has their own individual escape valve. Managing a quick trip home to see family has helped revitalise Fuimaono-Sapolu ahead of the tough run in.


"It really helps. I think I play my best games after a few days away. I went to Portugal, came back and went well against Saracens. I had five days at home before we played Irish."

"I'm one of the few guys who doesn't have family around, not even anyone in the northern hemisphere. So, I'm so grateful that Brushy gave me 5 days to go home."

"It wasn't the quantity of time, it was the quality. My sister has just had a baby and in our culture we get together as a family for a birth as we would for a death. As everyone gets together for a funeral, everyone comes together for a birth in Samoa."

"I'm so grateful to the club. It meant a lot to me but also to my family as it showed that I came and that I care."

"Mentally and spiritually it's huge but I did train every single day in 30 degree heat!"

When you look at the players they have at their disposal you would think they should be nailed on for a top four place – that's where I had them in my pre-season final table places prediction anyway.


But for whatever reason they have been slow out of the blocks this year – injuries to key players, no doubt.

But since our old mates from Bristol appear to have dropped off the edge of the world, and don't really look like clambering up again any time soon, it's up to today's participants to fly the flag.

We've been doing a pretty good job of it so far. I was very impressed by Bath's demolition of Northampton the other week, but was equally chuffed by the way Gloucester disassembled London Irish on the same weekend.

Both have come into good form after early tribulations – remember the September fixture down at the Rec? I won't dwell on the result for fear of embarrassing any Bath supporter who may have strayed this way this afternoon.



Both teams have effective game plans, a very high work ethic and some outstanding individual players. And you never know who the star is going to be.

Tom, of course has a foot in both camps, which is as good a way of getting a groin injury as I can imagine. He is an old Bath player, but the great nephew of the great Tommy Voyce who, some claim, invented wing forward play and was a Gloucester stalwart for many years as both player and official.

ny win over Northampton at their fortress Franklin's Gardens is to be savoured. I know they have had an attack of the collywobbles lately, but there are some formidable performers in their line-up.

We know from our own experience how these inexplicable

lapses in form can turn around between one match and the next for no apparent reason. Add to that the thought that the Saints very rarely lose at home, and you have a recipe for a difficult 80 minutes.

No one seems to have told Jonny May that. The first of his brace of tries would have made James Simpson Daniel proud.


Young Jonny wove his way

through the opposition in distinctly Sinbad-esque fashion, mud or no mud, and later finished his second try with an efficiency which made things look simpler than they were.


But of course, our pack, which looks more formidable game by game, murdered the opposing eight, and their highly-rated front row must have wondered what day it was

If Nicky had signed on for another couple of years then Freddie's opportunities would have been more limited than they may be now.

It was obviously a very tough decision but I'm sure both Nicky and Freddie will shine in their respective environments.


Wasps ranks. The ball was allowed to bounce and was then slapped back loosely allowing James Simpson-Daniel to pounce for the crucial try.



For starters, the defence was certainly more robust. It took Gloucester 28 minutes to secure the try scoring bonus point in the LV= Cup. It took 24 minutes just to score the first try on this occasion.

However, a positive aspect of this performance was that Bryan Redpath's side didn't look at all perturbed by the amount of time it took to break down the visitors

Full of the confidence created by winning six games in a row, a quiet air of self belief permeated throughout the side.


