


## FITTE FORTER

That's the sort of side they are. They have a very solid squad delight that a Welsh side takes in turning over an English opponent and we could have quite a game on our hands.


It's in our hands, however. We worked hard after the result at Rodney Parade to win our next three group matches and qualify for the semi finals.

### Redpath: The jaws of success

andid Bryan Redpath believes only brutal honesty can lift Gloucester out of their prizeless rut.

The Cherry and Whites boss admitted he has forced his whole operation to confront the deep-seated reasons for consistently snatching failure from the jaws of

Gloucester stand on the brink of silverware once again – but head coach Redpath knows his squad have crumbled at the crunch all too often.

Redpath's resurgent men batted Bath aside 34-22 for their ninth consecutive victory last weekend, and entertain the Dragons this lunchtime in the LV= Cup semi-final.

Win-or-bust rugby has backfired too regularly, and former Scotland scrum half Redpath revealed Gloucester have tackled the problem with a consistent wide-ranging review this season.

Paying tribute to assistant boss Carl Hogg and the rest of his back room staff, Redpath said question marks about their experience only redoubles their determination to

Redpath explained: "I'll be honest with you it's come down to challenging the people who have been here the longest; we need to change the culture around here and we need to really understand why in



the last six seasons nearly now, we've been in finals nearly every year and we've not won.

"We've won one in the six years that I've been here, and we've lost three finals, a semi-final and a quarter-final, and we've had to ask why.

"Now that generally comes down

to mental strength, or core belief in the group.

"When you get to these stages it's a one-off game, and I think we've tried to target that within Monday to Friday.

"And we've just been honest with ourselves, and said if we're not willing to do it then we're never going to change this rut that we've been in.

"Is that the reason why we've been winning since Leeds? I wish I had an answer, and I wish it was as simple as that.

"But we're doing alright, we are working hard Monday to Friday, and that means we bash each other around a little bit more, nothing crazy but just little bits.

"But you've got to keep modifying hat.


"I thought we looked a little bit flat on Saturday, I thought we looked a little bit tired, so we'll need to be smart with the lads this week in terms of how everyone has to front up in training.

"But the boys have got to take a lot of credit, and the staff as well."

Highlighting his back room staff's hard work, Redpath said the coaches are just as determined to secure silverware as the players.

He continued: "Hoggy gets a lot of criticism from people in saying he's not this, or he's not that, but





he's taken on 60 per cent of the defensive chores, and I do probably 40 per cent of it.

"And he's got his forwards, but people knock him, well maybe not knock him, but say myself and him aren't experienced enough to cope, and that drives us on.

"But with Bob Stewart the physio and Barny Allen the conditioner, we sat down as a staff group and said we need to change and set standards prior to the players actually doing it, we need to make sure they are set, and stuck to, throughout the whole season.

"And we need to make sure

they're not just set in pre-season, and it's great when everyone's excited and working hard, but then allow them to slip off when the first defeat comes, or when the first time the coach gets guestioned and says it's this or it's that.

"So it's a credit to the staff for fronting up and coming through with that, with only two coaches, it makes it tough.

"That's tough on myself and Hoggy, but at least we know where each other stands.

"So for me it's a big thank you to them as much as anything.

"It's a driver every time, you want

to succeed, I want to succeed as a coach. It's the same when you're a

#### he LV= Cup competition is one that holds mixed memories for Gloucester Rugby fly half Nicky Robinson.

He played a pivotal role in helping the Cardiff Blues win the tournament back in April 2009, unfortunately at the expense of the team he was about to join — Gloucester Rugby.

Just under a year later, he was pulling the strings from outside half as Gloucester took on Northampton Saints in one of last season's most memorable matches. The lead switched hands several times before the Saints eventually ended up victorious.

A pivotal moment in the game occurred when Robinson thought he had touched down only for the Television Match Official to rule it out. Once and for all, to put the record straight, did he score?

"I did score it and even Roger Wilson (the Northampton number eight) told me afterwards that he knew I'd scored it. It was ok for him to admit it then because he had his winners' medal!"

"But he'd got in the way and prevented the TV replay from seeing the ball being grounded which kind of summed up our season a little bit in a way. We were so close to being really good but not quite there."

"People came up to me for weeks afterwards and told me what a great game it was but it was small consolation."

"But we've learned our lessons from that game. It was our mistakes that helped Northampton win that match and lift the trophy. Sometimes you learn more from the games you lose rather than those you win."

"I've enjoyed the LV= Cup, though. The year Cardiff won, it was a really big competition with the final held at Twickenham, the game televised live on BBC with a big crowd etc. It was a big day and one of my best moments in a Cardiff jersey."

"It's a different competition now but I think it's a great competition given its place in the fixture calendar. It tests the strength of your squad and gives you the chance to lift a trophy and also qualify for Europe."

"We've actually found some form this year in the LV= Cup and it's benefitted

our league form as we've carried our LV= form into that competition."

That's all history of course and this weekend offers an opportunity to return to the final although the visiting Dragons, understandably, will have something to say about that?

"Definitely. They've built a good squad over the past couple of years and had a good season last year in the Magners League. It's not been so easy for them this season and they've lost their coach which must have been disappointing for them."

"Since then though, they've kicked on and had some quite good wins and are mid table in the Magners. And this competition

is a chance for them, just like us, to get to a final, to win a trophy and to clinch Heineken Cup qualification."

"As a Welshman, I know how much we enjoy playing against English opposition. They'll be up for it and we have to match that ferocity."

The two teams have already met once this season as the Dragons took the spoils in the opening round of pool matches at Rodney Parade. The 29 year old, who is closing in on 500 points for Gloucester, admits there's not much between the two sides.

"We beat them home and away in the Heineken Cup last season but it wasn't easy. In the first game at Kingsholm, they ran us right to the end."

"They've got a squad of good players. They don't lose many to the internationals, a bit like us so they'll be nearly at full strength. It's a big game for both teams."

2011 got off to a tricky start for Robinson as a niggling hamstring injury kept him sidelined for a few weeks but he's come back in pretty good nick and played his part in some impressive wins recently.

"I'm feeling good. It was frustrating to be injured as it always is, especially when the boys are playing really well and getting some good wins. It really makes you eager to get back and show what you can do."

"I wasn't too pleased with my own form prior to Christmas but, certain things are sorted out off the field, and I'm 100% focussed on my rugby and trying to make the most of every minute I have left at Gloucester."

Away from the game, it's Cheltenham week and a love of horse racing almost seems to be a prerequisite for members of the Gloucester Rugby back line. Will training finish early enough to be able to sneak up to Prestbury Park?

"I'm hoping to. Last year, I managed to make it up there for a couple of afternoons. Living locally means I can get there quite easily."

"I've learned quite a bit about it from a couple of the boys this year so I know more about the festival and the horses. It's always good to get over there and sample the atmosphere."


Those couple of boys would probably include James Simpson-Daniel and Mike Tindall. All three have an investment in a horse — so, how's it going?


(Laughs). Well, it seems to have picked up a few of the injury problems that the three of us have had but he's still quite young so we're hopeful he'll qet a few more runs this season."

IT'S surprising what a win like last week can do for you isn't it. It should have been just another match but it's always more than that when you put one – or more precisely four – over your nearest and dearest.



it would have been easy for him to cruise through his contract and not put the effort in – and we all know players who have done that – but he didn't. I can't help but respect him for that honesty.

Newport. Now there's a name which resonates with those of us who were around in the old preprofessional days. There was a time when Newport and Cardiff were the undisputed kings of the Welsh game. So much so, in fact, that they used to play each other four times in a season.

Newport often came to Kingsholm just after Christmas, and provided a very stern test after the lighter fare with which we were presented during the festive season.

We won some and probably lost a few more, but you could always rely on seeing a tough and hard-fought encounter. I particularly remember that Mike Burton always seemed to be in his element.

These matches weren't ones you would take an impressionable maiden aunt to, but, as always, both

In those days, Newport was unique in that the club was affiliated to both the, RFU and the Welsh Rugby Union so that a Newport player qualified to play for either Wales or England.

National qualification was both stricter and simpler in those days. This fact led to one of the best bit of Kingsholm badinage I can recall,

I was sitting in the front of the

old stand and the game was getting its fair share of penalties, mostly in Gloucester's favour. At one point, the ref blew up right in front of us, and awarded another penalty our way.

An anguished Welsh voice from the enclosure declaimed "Jesus Christ, referee! "

A rather posh English voice responded "No. That's the English part of your affiliation old boy!"

In fact, as I learned later, the respondent was a local clergyman.

hat's all this about Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal suggesting that Mike Tindall have his nose straightened in time for his wedding?


Personally, I think Mike's S-shaped appendage is a badge of honour which should be preserved for posterity. Has anyone asked Zara how she feels about it?

The pack made the hard yards but one player above all others skated his way over the boggy surface to score two crucial tries.

7-3 lead and he added his second after fine work from his fellow backs to ensure his side went into half time with a narrow 12-6 lead.

Robinson, though, displayed ice cool nerves and a siege gun boot to slot two long range penalties with Myler only able to respond with one leaving Gloucester to defend an 18-16 lead for the last 17 minutes.

They duly did so by the pack completely dominating possession, wearing down the Saints forwards and playing the final exchanges almost exclusively in the Saints 22.

Appropriately, it was a penalty won at a scrum on the Saints put in that clinched the win and the celebrations began, on and off the pitch.



two tries nearly bookended one from Williams to secure a famous, and possibly vital win for Gloucester.
