The final Leicester try would have finished most teams off. However, we dug deep and weren't going to let them score again in the final couple of minutes to deny us even a losing bonus point.


Eli's interception was just the icing on the cake even though his stride seemed to be getting shorter and shorter as he got closer to the line!

n behalf of everyone at Gloucester Rugby, I'd like to wish the players, staff and supporters of the Northampton Saints a very warm welcome to Kingsholm this evening.

It'll certainly be a warmer welcome than when this fixture was originally scheduled to have taken place! We were supposed to play this game on Boxing Day, of course, but the icy weather that gripped the UK at the time well and truly put paid to that idea.

So, it's hopefully second time lucky tonight. The postponement has, of course, meant that both sides are preparing for a midweek fixture, and the prospect of three games in a week, as we enter the final furlong of what has already been a very long season.

There's no avoiding it and no point in complaining about it. The congested nature of the modern fixture calendar means that any postponed game will be difficult to rearrange.

And, when sides have a decent run in any of the cup competitions, then the precious few spare weekends can easily be taken up.

We went all the way in the LV= Cup which meant that we were playing every weekend when some of our rivals were putting their feet up while our opponents today, Northampton, have made it to the semi finals of the Heineken Cup which has had a similar result for them.

In fact the Saints are in a slightly unusual situation in that they're in the middle of a run of fixtures which will see them play five games away from Franklin's Gardens.

They've obviously taken two Heineken Cup matches to stadium: mk in Milton Keynes for stadium capacity reasons. Last Friday though, they were in Newcastle, tonight they're here at Kingsholm and they're away at London Irish on Saturday. That's tough.

But, if any team can cope with a schedule like that, then it's Northampton. They've got a good squad and plenty to play for and I know that Jim Mallinder will have them properly prepared for all those games.

And, we're not exactly going to be feeling sorry for them bearing in mind that we were at Welford Road on Saturday before taking on the Saints tonight and then going to Watford to face Saracens on Sunday. Three of the top four in the Aviva Premiership table, all in front of the TV cameras, in the space of eight days!

Focussing initially on tonight, Northampton have had another good season to defy one or two pundits who thought that they might fall away slightly this season after such a good campaign in 2009-10. up at Newcastle the night before and we couldn't rely on the sides behind us slipping up.

To take three points away from Leicester was a magnificent effort and I couldn't have been prouder of the resilience shown by the boys when it looked as though the game had gone away from us when we trailed by 14 points.

You don't get in many tighter spots than trailing the champions by 14 points on their own turf but the work ethic, commitment and willingness to work for each other was superb and we travelled home in good spirits.

It has been a tough few weeks and our resources have been stretched a bit. The injuries have



In fact, prior to Christmas, they looked as though they were set to take the Premiership by storm and, it was only when they lost a few key players to Six Nations duty, that they stuttered a little.

But they've bounced back well since then and have made the semi finals of the Heineken Cup, so they're not doing too badly although they'll want something to show for their efforts come the end of the season.

So, while we're expecting a tough game tonight, we have our own reasons for wanting the points.

It's also why our result at Welford Road on Saturday was so important. We knew Northampton had won

Redpath: Age has no bearing on ability

"I see it as we've got to grow up pretty quickly, and get on with it, stop looking for this time or this opportunity."

pportunity might be sandwiched into a week, but Bryan Redpath has told Gloucester to take their chance before it vanishes.

Inexperience might sweep through Gloucester's backline, but Head Coach Redpath has told his youngsters to discount their youth.

Don't wait for your chance, snatch it with both hands, demands the former Scotland scrum half.

Redpath has told his young but influential charges to grow up fast – because age has no bearing on ability, and it is time for them to realise their potential.

Henry Trinder, Freddie Burns and Charlie Sharples are all still in their early 20s, but the trio will have a big role to play in Gloucester's Premiership run in.

It would be easy for Gloucester to hold them back, telling them they will be more equipped in a year's time.

A year from now though, the likes of talented teenagers Dan Robson and Ryan Mills will be battling seriously for first team game time – and Redpath knows quality always outweighs age.

Saints will descend on Kingsholm with a powerful line up tonight, whatever their squad rotation.

Just like Gloucester they face three games in a week in order to make up this rearranged clash.

Northampton might have a larger, more experienced squad, but Redpath refuses to pick out imbalances, make excuses or shy away from his belief Gloucester will only secure a top four spot through sufficiently strong performances.

Redpath explained: "You can hide behind this inexperience tag too much, sometimes you learn from mistakes, but you've got to go out, give it your all and be willing to push that extra bit.


"If you make a mistake, make sure you learn from it and don't just fob it off.

"Trinder, Freddie and Charlie have all been around the first team squad for a number of years now, and I don't see that as an issue.

"I see it as we've got to grow up pretty quickly, and get on with it, stop looking for this time or this opportunity.

"There's no point saying 'you'll be ready in six months' or 'you'll be better in a year' because of course





they will, but there might be someone else who comes along who ends up better anyway.

"So don't wait for that opportunity to be taken away from you, take that opportunity.

"It's a real challenge for us mentally and not something we'll shy away from.

"We've had some people really knock us in the past, but we need to be mature about it, grow up and accept

some of the criticisms of the past and just go out and try to prove that we are getting better, and we are on the right track."


Gloucester have spent three quarters of the season blasting their way into the top four mix – and now Redpath has told his players not to let that hard graft go to waste.

A win tonight and a victory over Sale on the regular season's final day may well prove sufficient for that craved play-off spot.

There has been no victory targeting from the Cherry and Whites boss though, who will do nothing other than prepare for each clash in turn.

Scrutinising the bigger picture cost Gloucester at Newcastle and Leeds in league defeats, and since then the overview has been ditched in favour of immediate focus.

Gloucester's 11 match win streak claimed the LV=Cup and cemented a top-four battle - but now the Kingsholm men must complete the job.



ory Lawson is a man who has clocked up a fair few air miles in the past 12 months.

A summer tour to Argentina with Scotland was quickly followed by preseason in Portugal with Gloucester. And, since then, he has shuttled between club and country depending on the stage of the season.

All being well, he's got plenty more of the same lying ahead of him with Gloucester's club season not due to end for a good few weeks yet and Rugby World Cup 2011 appearing on the horizon.

However, you won't find the 30 year old scrum half complaining about his lot in life. It's business as usual as far as he's concerned.

"Argentina seems a long time ago now and it's obviously been a long old season! But I think it's probably been the best season I've had so far as a professional and one that I'm keen to build on."

"It has been pretty intense and there is a skill involved in being able to switch off and relax. Time away from the game to re-energise is important if you're going to give your best at the weekend."

He is, of course, an enthusiastic golfer and took part in the recent Gloucester Rugby Golf Day but admits that he hasn't had much time to indulge himself on the course of late.

"No, that's a shame. I honestly haven't been able to play as much as I'd like to have done recently. I'm as keen on the game as ever and managed to watch the Masters on TV but I'll have to try and find time to play more often over the next couple of months."

There have of course been plenty of highlights for him this season. November saw him start his first Test for Scotland at Murrayfield and also skipper his country to victory over South Africa, an experience he describes as simply being, "...awesome...".

International duties precluded him from taking part in


"I'd be lying if I said it wasn't disappointing not to have been involved in the final itself but that's the nature of the beast. However, we've all worked hard together as a squad over the months and everyone knows that they've played their part in what we've achieved."

Pundits have dubbed Gloucester's current run of fixtures as the "week from hell" but Lawson insists that it can be viewed in a different light.


"You can look at it as being a big challenge. It'll certainly be a test of our squad. Three games in eight days is tough but it's been done before."

I'VE just looked back over the words I originally wrote for this fixture when it was due to be played on Boxing Day before snow and ice put paid to things for us.

So destiny is in our hands now, but we are slap bang in the middle of a run of fixtures that no one would really want.

I guess everyone would like to pick and chose their fixtures, no one in their right mind would want to play the three teams that are either just in front or just behind you in consecutive games, let alone consecutive games inside eight days.

And the challenges are not going to come much harder than we face

today. Northampton are going to provide a very real test of where we are in our development.

I must confess that before the start of the season I thought they were going to be a mid-table side, unable to keep the momentum of last term going.

I'm already eating my words, Saints are proving to be a very impressive outfit. They go about their business very much in the mould of their management team of West, Grayson and Mallender. All three were no slouches as players though – with maybe the exception of Paul Grayson – never really setting the world on fire. Great team guys who

would always put it in on the pitch, though.

The Saints team they are assembling are very much in that image. While near neighbours, Leicester, are seemingly bringing in more and more players from overseas and other clubs, Northampton are developing their own and making one or two astute (ie our own Doran Jones) signings here and there - not mega stars but players who will buy into the ethos of the club. With one or two exceptions that has been the Saints way since they rebounded from being relegated in 1995.

There are a lot of parallels between Northampton and us. Both clubs have deep roots in the community in fact Saints were probably the first true community club being formed to provide an exercise opportunity for local youngsters. Both have a support base that is tremendously passionate and loyal.

There are also parallels in the way we are progressing as a club now - we've gone through the mega-star signing bit with varying degrees of success and are now building much more of a team here.

In fact I was chatting to an ex player the other day, he told me that the word from inside the camp is that team spirit has never been better, that the players really buy in to what Bryan Redpath is trying to achieve, and that we really are a team - not a group of players who come together, but a collective unit. Philippe SaintAndre would be very proud.

It's sad when great players like Nicky Robinson and Paul Doran Jones have to leave, but in the harsh real world there will always be budgets to balance, and that sometimes means you can't hang on to everyone you would like to keep.



Then there was London Wasps. I lost count of the number of times when we had them on toast only to see them nip in and pip us on the post in the dying minutes.


I could name other examples of this odd phenomenon.




