### **Rupert Harden: Ready to pounce**

# "...now we've got to get back to the standards we set for ourselves, and get the job done."

lawless rugby is not negotiable from here on in, believes determined Gloucester prop Rupert Harden.

The 25-year-old tighthead has called on the Cherry and Whites to deal with whatever Sale throw at them the most straightforward way – by cutting out the errors.

Fatigued Gloucester slumped to a 35-12 defeat at Saracens in their last Premiership outing, and now face Sale at Kingsholm today.

Beat the Sharks and Gloucester will make the play-offs: a fairly simple task that requires a fairly simple approach, said the Melbourne-born front-rower.

Bryan Redpath's men hit Saracens at the end of their three-match week, effectively hitting the energy wall in Watford.

Harden refused to allow that to account for the defeat, as frustrated Gloucester allowed the Fezheads to beat them the obvious way.

The Newcastle University graduate explained: "We cannot let anyone kill us through obvious tactics anymore, or things we know teams are going to throw at us.





"We're desperate to defend our home record, and more than that, we know what a win will do for us in terms of the play-offs." "If someone comes with something left field that might be one thing, but it's not acceptable to know what's coming, and not be able to deal with it. Saracens just wait, they just wait for sides to make mistakes, and then they pounce on them.

"We played right into their hands down at Vicarage Road, but if we go back, we won't make the same mistakes again.

"At Sale we never got going, we never got into our stride and we allowed them far too much time to build something.

"Forget the refereeing issues, we only had ourselves to blame for that defeat, and now we have an opportunity to put that right. We've got to get back up to speed, and I think we will.

"We're desperate to defend our home record, and more than that, we know what a win will do for us in terms of the play-offs."

Still frustrated by the Saracens defeat despite some time off last week, Harden backed Gloucester to have a good go at the Men in Black if they face them again in the play-offs.

He continued: "Saracens are



obviously a really good side, they're clinical and they don't really make any errors.

"They didn't really have that much, but our error count just kept allowing them a route to victory.

"When you start the second half with a box kick that goes straight to touch, then a penalty that misses touch, you're slitting your own throat.

"Saracens are never going to tear you up, but what they will do is kill you with their structure, they suffocate you. And we just fell into it, which was what was so frustrating.

"It would have been good to give them a hiding, hopefully before returning if that's what we can do.

"The long week was no excuse, everyone who goes out to play wants to play, and we just didn't execute particularly well.

"The saving grace is that we didn't go there and show our full hand and lose.

"If that had happened then we would be in trouble, because then we would feel we wouldn't be able to get the job done.

"I think we've shown that we can beat them, we've done that twice already this year, so it was disappointing to lose out last week.

"But we didn't really do anything we set out to do, and not because they stopped us, just because we didn't get going.

"Not getting out of our half was probably what killed us, we didn't do that as we tried to. So now we've got to get back to the standards we set for ourselves, and get the job done."

or our final home match of the regular Premiership season we are pleased to welcome Michael Pickford and twenty plus colleagues of his who were former players with Old Blues RFC. Now no longer part of our fixture list in the professional era they were a significant opposition in the truly amateur era.

Old Blues have a significant factor in the year they were founded for it was the same year that we were founded – 1873! Old Blues now play in Surrey League One! Their home ground is situated at Dornan Fields in Arthur Road, Motspur Park in Surrey.

They originally played in dark blue jerseys and white shorts. In more recent times they have changed into navy blue with old gold and cardinal red stripes with navy blue shorts.

Originating from Christ's Hospital which was founded by King Edward VI in 1553 as a hospital for orphans in Newgate Street, London, the hospital developed its own school which is still known today as the Blue Coat School. The school was named after its prominent uniform of long bluecoats and yellow stockings.

Former scholars of Christ's Hospital had been known as 'Old Blues' from early times and subsequently a group of former pupils bonded together to form a Christ's Hospital old boys rugby football club and they were aptly named Old Blues RFC.

The first man to be knighted for

his services to rugby union – Sir George Rowland Hill attended Christ's Hospital between 1865 and 1870. He was president of the Rugby Football Union between 1904 and 1907 and President of Old Blues RFC between 1919 and 1927.

The club was founded by J.Wingfield and others while he became the club's first captain and Canon G.C.Bele who was the headmaster of Christ's Hospital School became the club's first President.

Old Blues' first fixture was against Christ's Hospital School at Palmers Green on 8th September 1873. In that season of 1873-74 they played ten matches.

Tragedy struck the club in 1883 when their club captain – S.F.Walsh had a heart attack on the pitch in a match versus Rosslyn Park at their new ground in North Dulwich. This tragedy suspended the Old Blues RFC for ten seasons!

The Old Blues club was revived in 1893. They eventually moved to Horsham in Sussex after 350 years in Newgate Street! In 1992 the Old Blues purchased a 10 acre site in Fairlop, Essex, the site remained their base for 60 years.

In the 1920's and 30's the club was its peak with eight to ten teams fielded each week. Bath, GLOUCESTER, Harlequins, Leicester and Northampton were on their fixture list.

The year of 1960 signified a decline in their first class fixtures. In 1982 they sold their Fairlop site and moved to their present ground which is thirty miles from Christ's Hospital School.

Our involvement with Old Blues began in the 1922-23 season when Frank Ayliffe was our club captain. The Old Blues last visit to Kingsholm came in the 1970-71 season when Mike Nicholls was our captain. That was a season where 30 matches were played here at Kingsholm and our only defeat came in a 21 points to 11 reversal to visiting Bedford.

We met Old Blues RFC on 37 occasions with all the matches were staged here at Kingsholm. The Old Blues inflicted four defeats upon the 'Cherry & Whites', they also drew two matches, one of which was a remarkable pointless encounter in the 1960-61 season when Peter Ford was the club



captain. The sequence of results at Kingsholm were as follows: -

Following the Great War 1914-18 the club were indebted to several stalwarts including G.T.E.Cockrill, R.C.Hare, C.J.W.Hodgson, P.Mayne, G.E.Middleditch, A.A.Jones, among others for re-establishing the club to a first class level.

The Old Blues participated in the first 7-a-side competition! It was staged by Ilford Wanderers in April 1926 and they drew 3-3 with Wasps in the final.

Although the Old Blues last success at Kingsholm was in the 1955-56 season, they were still a force to be reckoned with when five years later they defeated Saracens The Citizen Sports Edition Saturday February 5, 1927

23 points to 6 on 10th March 1961 when Saracens were based at their former ground at Bramley Road!

Old Blues have completed a successful season for 2010-11 finishing as runners up to Old Freemans in Surrey One. They completed their league programme with a comprehensive win at Old Whitgiftians by 48 points to ten. Stan was making his 100th appearance for the club in 1925 against Old Blues. Stan Bayliss was buried in Gloucester Cemetery with his last resting place at the rear of the Cross of Sacrifice.

Old Blues are one of seven clubs with the prefix of 'Old' that we have played, the others are Old Cranleighans, Old Crocks, Old

s you enter the reception area at Kingsholm, a sign on the wall declares, "The Holy Writ of Gloucester Rugby Club demands: first, that the forwards shall win the ball; second, that the forwards shall keep the ball; and third, the backs shall buy the beer."

Things have changed slightly over the years and the backs have won plenty of plaudits so far this season for Gloucester Rugby but even the speedsters out wide will grudgingly admit that they couldn't do it without the hard work of the guys up front.

And one man in particular has certainly shouldered more than his fair share of the burden so far this season.

Prop Nick Wood has been a virtual institution in the loose head position. In fact, he's featured in more games in 2010-11 than in any other season in his career so far and freely admitted to the matchday programme that it's been hard work.

"It has been tough but I've enjoyed it all to be fair and I was very grateful to get a week off last week. At the start of the season, we had a good system working with Dicko (Alasdair Dickinson) and myself both playing well complementing each other."

"Not only was it a good rotation system to keep the competition fresh but it kept our bodies fresh as well. Unfortunately, though, Dicko was sidelined for a few months."

"It's difficult for anyone who isn't playing at this level to truly appreciate how tough it can be. The hits get bigger and there's more running and it takes longer to recover."

"It means that you have to make changes to your life away from the game and I've had to make sacrifices in my personal life to make sure that I'm rested enough for my professional career."

One event that did provide a

metaphorical shot in the arm was, of course, winning the LV= Cup and the 28 year old Swindon born prop admits that it came as a huge relief.

"It was wonderful, actually. I had my knee operated on before the Challenge Cup win in 2006 so missed out on that and I'd played in the past two Anglo Welsh finals so I was starting to feel as though I was jinxed a bit."

"It was great for the team, to fulfil our potential and lift that stigma of Gloucester not being able to win something. It lifted a huge amount of pressure and now we can focus 'tweeters' in the squad an area which seems to have become another outlet for dressing room banter?

"I had a Twitter account originally about a year or 18 months ago but lapsed a bit and fell back into it a year or so later."

on the Premiership."

At 28, he's already racked up an impressive 175 appearances for Gloucester and there are hopefully plenty more to come. With that experience though comes the knowledge that he's now one of the senior pros in the dressing room.

"You look around and you realise how much things have changed over the past couple of years. There are still a few stalwarts like Hazey, Bucko, Zed and Sinbad around but there's plenty of fresh blood coming in."

In recent times, certain props seem to have gone on and on and Wood could well have his very best years ahead of him provided that he stays healthy.

"Of course, it all depends on the body. And, if the body holds out, hopefully the mind will be in good shape as well. I still love the game so I'll keep going as long as the body allows."

There was naturally an air of uncertainty and some apprehension around the place after his untimely passing, and I'm sure that contributed to performances on the field for a while at around that time. We do seem to have weathered that particular storm now, and it's a great shame that Mr Walkinshaw couldn't be at Northampton the day we thrashed Newcastle to win the LV= Cup.

So we've had the lot this season. Just a typical Kingsholm year, really.

nless we reach the Premiership Final, which is entirely possible of course, the formidable services of Olivier Azam won't be available again this season. That is how his suspension for seemingly head butting Adam Eustace during the Northampton match works out.

What happens after that, only Zed himself knows, if indeed he's made his own mind up yet, which I doubt. He is after all, 36 years old, which is getting a bit mature even for a front row forward.



However, watching his performance several times via my TV recording, I don't think we should let sheer anno domini influence us too much.

He's as tough as teak, and if he may have lost a smidgen of pace these days, that's more than counterbalanced by experience, wiliness and sheer enthusiasm. Even one of the TV commentators described him as a "nightmare to play against".

I've heard it said that Olivier got off lightly by only receiving a four week ban, and indeed, the head butt





incident did look horrid on the telly. There was also his previous record to consider.

However, having watched him many times, I don't really think that Zed is a dirty or malicious player. He doesn't really mean to hurt anyone, or cause injury.

His rugby brain works very fast, and I think it tells him what to do and where to go almost instantaneously. He then does that and never even thinks about anyone who might get in the way.

So that does sometimes result in some questionable play, but I don't believe there to be any malice about it.

Of course, only he can know how his iron hard frame can stand up to 80 minutes of Premiership rugby these days, and perhaps it could be an option to let him test himself in the pre-season matches before deciding his future.

But I don't think we want to lose him. To my eye, the forwards seem to play with just that bit more intensity when he's on the field, but even his familiar figure on the touchline is a boost to morale.

Surely, if he does decide to hang up his boots, some role can be found for him around the club. I believe we would certainly be the poorer without him, and no one knows more about the rough and tumble of the front row than Zed does.

But whatever happens, I hope he stays in Gloucestershire. He has a successful restaurant in Cheltenham and a settled family here. In fact, he's one of us, and I can't remember saying that about a Frenchman before.
