


Captain's CORNER

We've been working on them in training all week and will hopefully reflect that hard work on the pitch here today against Worcester.

From a personal point of view, I'm really pleased to see them back in the Premiership. There's been a really close link between the two clubs in recent years and there always seem to be a couple of former Gloucester players

in their side looking to prove a point against us!

Not having them on the fixture calendar against us last season was a real loss. There's always a certain spice to the Gloucester vs Worcester matches and I'm sure we'll see more of the same this afternoon.

It will be strange though to see them lining up without Pat Sanderson. He was the sort of guy you love to have on your side but hate to play against and he really did become a talisman for Worcester.

The Warriors may well miss that gap toothed back rower, snarling at the opposition and urging his team mates on to a bigger effort but Richard Hill will have them well drilled and organised and it'll be tough for us today.

Coach's NOT

with Head Coach, BRYAN REDPATH

ON BEHALF OF EVERYONE AT GLOUCESTER RUGBY, I'D LIKE TO WISH THE PLAYERS. STAFF AND SUPPORTERS OF THE WORCESTER WARRIORS A VERY WARM WELCOME TO KINGSHOLM THIS AFTERNOON.

It's nice to see the Warriors back in the Premiership again. I know that for our supporters, it's become one of the most keenly awaited fixtures of the season and, on the pitch, it's one of the hardest fought!

In recent seasons, it seems that however Worcester are doing in the league, they always seem to raise their game against us and give us a hard time

For example, two seasons ago, when they ended up being relegated to the Championship, they managed a draw here at Kingsholm and we only just scrambled a win up at Sixways. They always seem to be tense, close encounters!

Richard Hill has done a really good job there. He took over when they'd just gone down and managed to bring them straight back up which shouldn't be underestimated.

He's recruited some good players over the summer, he's always had an eve for a good player and they're not missing too many boys to the World Cup so they're looking a pretty solid unit.

And, of course, Hilly knows what it takes to get the job done at Premiership level. He kept Bristol in the Premiership for several seasons, often without a squad of big name players and probably the highlight was their third place finish in 2006-7

So, we know that we'll have to be on top of our game this afternoon which means taking things up a notch from our performance at Franklin's Gardens last Sunday.

That was a pretty frustrating day at

the office. There were times when we looked very good but there were some aspects of our game where we weren't guite at our best and that's ultimately what cost us the win.

People outside the club might look at a losing bonus point away at Northampton as not a bad outcome. However, we know in our heart of hearts that the game was there for the taking. We could have and should have won it

I couldn't fault our application on the day and we showed great mental strength in the second half when we trailed by ten points and were down to 14 men. We were committed as a team and all the players worked hard for each other

We also created a lot of chances but we weren't quite precise enough when we got to the final third and left quite a few points out there.

There were lots of good things in our performance and I'm actually guite encouraged that we can be so competitive when we know that there are quite a few areas where can improve significantly.

What's important is that, as a group, we know what we're trying to achieve on the pitch. What we now need is a little more precision in our execution.

It was the first game of the season and obviously nothing is won or lost at this stage and hopefully we've shaken off what remained of the rustiness from preseason.

We have improved throughout the matches we've played so far. There was a step up from the London Welsh performance when we took on Russia



and we went up another notch against the Saints last week.

We're still not quite at our best but we're getting better and hopefully we'll maintain that momentum this afternoon.

It's good to be back at Kingsholm. We're always lifted when we perform here in front of our own supporters and we'll be striving to give you all something to shout about this afternoon in what is sure to be a great atmosphere.

Finally, the World Cup gets underway this weekend so I'd just like to wish all the Gloucester players who are out there the very best of luck.

I was fortunate enough in my playing career to play in two Rugby World Cups and it really is the pinnacle of a player's international

I hope they all enjoy it, play to their potential and come back fit and healthy!

ASTERING a new role means nothing to Lesley Vainikolo - nothing in comparison to the struggles of the countless before him.

Experienced wing Vainikolo has been tasked with securing Gloucester's midfield amid injuries and World Cup absentees.

A 32-year-old challenged with changing position at the last minute in a personnel shortage - some would baulk at the demand, and the timing. But not Big Les.

The likeable Tongan said anyone at Kingsholm would do whatever it takes to play wherever, whenever, in Cherry and White.

When the current crop of players think about their predecessors, Vainikolo said they are all well aware modern day sacrifices simply do not compare.

So when Gloucester boss Bryan Redpath asked Vainikolo if he was ready to step in at 12, there was only ever going to be one answer.


Big Les has filled the inside centre berth sporadically over his four years at Gloucester, but will always view himself a winger.

But a chance is a chance, whatever the shirt, he said.

"Any opportunity to play in any position, that's all you work hard for," explained Vainikolo.

"We all talk about pulling on the Gloucester jersey and the pride in doing that, the glory and the history

"A lot of things have happened, we've got a small group, but it's a






"Every time we pull on the jersey we just want to do everything we can and give everything to make sure we can be successful and leave it on the field.

"It's going well, a new position for me, a good challenge, both for me and for other people around me.

"I challenge myself to get up to



what's required for the position, and hopefully I can manage it.

"It's going good, I just need to tidy up a few things. Hopefully the more games I get at 12, the better it will be.

"It's an honour to have that responsibility, but at the same time I've got to perform as well, and take that opportunity with both hands.

"It's not good to see a great player and team mate like Tim Molenaar out with injury, and I think it would have been a different result for us if he'd been there on Sunday. But he's out at the moment and we've just got to

opportunity.

He continued: "It's good to play with all those guys with that speed, their raw pace is so difficult to defend

"On our strikes it's so effective because it allows us just to get the ball out as quickly as we can, get it to the quick guys and give them a chance to do what they can do. We've got to hit that ball, crash the line hard before we give it out wide.

"We know we've got the power and the strength, and then the speed out wide, but we've got to use them


zeal, Vainikolo said the Cherry and Whites must open their win account on Saturday now.

He added: "We talk a lot in training when we're defending, and we talk a lot on the field.

"But that's absolutely vital, that communication.

"You've got to feel confident in whoever's inside and outside, and we did that really well on Sunday. So we just need to work on a few things and see what happens.

"We've got to cut out the silly penalties; it's us, we don't need to

deal with it."

Whatever the line-up, Vainikolo said Gloucester must make sure they set their young pace aces free at every

all properly. And if we don't, then it's just a waste of time.

"We talk a lot about striking to score if we're in the right area of the field. But wherever we are, we always strike to break the line, and it pays off. That's what we can do if we stick to the patterns."

Pleased with Gloucester's defensive

"Worcester had a great start and they'll want to carry on the momentum. They will pose a major threat, but we've got to get going now."

KINGSLEY JONES is coaching Russia ably assisted by HENRY PAUL. DON CASKIE is performing likewise duties with Georgia.



When Darren Dawidiuk picked himself up and finished receiving the congratulations of his team mates having scored the final try of the LV= Cup Final win over Newcastle Falcons last March, he made a point of pointing to the skies.

In amongst the joyful mayhem that was greeting Gloucester's first silverware in five years, it was a silent and poignant moment as the 23 year old hooker's thoughts turned towards his younger brother Jack who sadly lost his fight against an incurable brain stem tumour in August 2009.

The popular Truro born hooker may not even have been at Gloucester had it not been for Jack's courage. Dawidiuk moved to Kingsholm from the Cornish Pirates in the summer of 2009 but only did so once he had his brother's blessing.

Dawidiuk was torn between pursuing his ambition of playing Premiership rugby and staying at home to support his family as Jack fought on. And the brave youngster had the casting vote as Darren explained:

"It was a big decision for me to come up here. I remember sitting down with my family, and just saying 'I don't want to leave the family'.

"But there was also Jack saying 'look, I want you to go – go and do it'. Even he was saying that. He didn't want me to miss out."

So, in the circumstances, it was entirely natural that even as Gloucester started to celebrate, Dukey thought of Jack:

"There's a little moment where I dotted over that try and the boys were jumping over me and going nuts, and I just pointed up to the sky and looked up.

"I had a text on my phone from my mum saying 'we all know why you pointed up.' It was just nice that the family knew that as well."

There's obviously character by the bucket load in the Dawidiuk family, epitomised by Darren's Mum Samantha Wearne who carried out a sky dive over the summer helping to raise £3,000 for the Little Bridge Children's Hospice in Bridgwater.

"My mum did the jump a couple of weeks ago, and the support that the Gloucester fans gave her has been overwhelming.

"People got behind her and supported her, and she didn't just do it to raise money she also did it in memory of Jack, and it's just

great to know that so many people got behind her and did support us as a family, and I really did appreciate that.

"Whatever we can do to help other families that are going through the same heartache that my family has gone through, what the children's hospice did at Barnstaple, we can't thank them enough.

"The last two weeks of Jack's life was really tough for us, but the help and support we had from the hospice, without them we couldn't have helped him get through that tough time and ease it as much as possible.

"He was in a lot of pain and the help that the nurses gave to him and the support they gave to us, and they are still giving my mum support now, the people that work at the hospice, they visit my mum and they make sure that she's doing ok. And it's fantastic they still support her even now."

The opening months of the 2011-12 season are huge for Dawidiuk. During his first two seasons with Gloucester, he's had to fight for a place in the matchday squad with the likes of Olivier Azam and Scott Lawson.

However, he's still managed to feature in some of Gloucester's biggest games during that time. He started in the vital rain sodden wins over Leicester Tigers and London Wasps and played his part in last season's surge towards LV= Cup triumph.

With Azam now plying his trade in the south of France, putting RC Toulon's much vaunted pack of forwards through their paces and Lawson in the southern hemisphere preparing for the Rugby World Cup with Scotland, it's a great opportunity for Dawidiuk to cement a place in the first XV.

"It's a good opportunity for me with Scott away. The injury to Matty (Cortese) means me and Koree (Britton) are competing right now.


"Brushy and Hoggy see me as a number one while Scott's away and I'm not going to waste my opportunity.


"I'm going to take my chance and make sure I make it hard for him to get back into the side when he comes back from the World Cup.

"But now I feel ready, and feel I can step up and be a number one."





sports, individuals don't lose games, teams do — just as an individual can't win a match on his own. Well Sinbad apart, that is.


We get off to a couple of crackers though, two home games and two derby games with Worcester being the first, they had a good win last weekend so will be buoyant coming into today's encounter.

CANNY SCOTS


ENGLAND may seen fit to have omitted most of the Gloucester lads (good luck to Mike Tindall, by the way), but the Scots had no such reticence.

The dilemma is further compounded by the fact that the experiment of playing Big Les in the centre looks like one which is worth persevering with.


Remember, we have Mike Tindall

SO near and yet so far for Gloucester who, for a blissful few moments, thought that they were about to clinch a second Premiership win in succession at Franklin's Gardens.

Freddie Burns dropped a goal on 76 minutes to give his team a slender 24-23 lead and temporarily stun the home crowd.
