
That said, we have been putting in a lot of work in recent weeks, we have some fresh players and I can vouch that they are all chomping at the bit to have a crack tonight.

Those who follow Gloucester on a regular basis would be under no illusions of the electric wing's capabilities – we have seen May do the great and unthinkable far too many times.


As the old adage goes there is no substitute for pace and he demonstrated that in devastating fashion against the All Blacks.

May has had his fair share of critics but he silenced them in the fourth minute of Saturday's defeat and left the 82,223 at Twickenham with no reservations.

The way he cruised around Conrad Smith and then beat Israel Dagg on the outside to open the scoring with his first international try was a stroke of genius.

Like a striker in football enduring a goal-drought, the pressure on a wing who is not fulfilling his primary job is palpable. Coaches and players alike will try to play it down but wings are there to finish opportunities, and boy didn't May just do that.

Hopefully we will now see the kind of form in a Cherry and

As May put it he "got the demon off his back", a monkey perhaps, but the sentiment remains.

play, if there's an opportunity to score I'm going to take it but I'm not going to not pass it if it is on for someone else.

"The pressure does build on you and I remember thinking 'bloody hell' after dropping the ball against Ireland.

"You just want that chance to go out and prove yourself and I had that against New Zealand and put it right.

"I knew I could do it and the coaches did as well so I'm glad they've had the patience in me and that I was able to pay it back and do it for the team and England.

"I've been really happy with the way I have started the season and it's even better to

translate it onto England."

May was not the only Cherry and White on international duty over the weekend with Greia Laidlaw leading Scotland to a 41-31 victory over Argentina.

The diminutive scrum-half with a deadly boot has arguably been Gloucester's best summer signing. Only fellow newcomer John Afoa comes close as such a vital cog in the team.

And just as Laidlaw has been the heartbeat at Gloucester he was so as captain of his country. He created tries for Sean Maitland and Stuart Hogg and booted 14-points.

Australia kept Richard Hibbard relatively quiet as they inflicted yet more late agony on Wales,

while Sila Puafisi, Aleki Lutui and Sione Kalamafoni helped Tonga to 23-9 victory over Georgia.


With such a glut of players on Test duty and others rested, we have seen two contrasting tales in the LV= Cup.

# ON CENTRE STAGE - PART ONE

IN THE EARLY DAYS OF GLOUCESTER RUGBY THERE WAS NO SUCH POSITION AS CENTRE THREE-QUARTER. THE BACKS CONSISTED OF THREE "THREE-QUARTERS" AND A "BACK" OR FULL BACK AS WE WOULD NOW CALL HIM.

BY THE TIME THAT GLOUCESTER MOVED TO KINGSHOLM IN 1891, IT HAD BECOME COMMON FOR A FIFTH BACK TO PLAY BEHIND THE SCRUM, AND SO FOR THE FIRST TIME TWO PLAYERS WERE CALLED "CENTRES".

# PERCY STOUT

The first star centre for Gloucester was Percy Stout who played for the Club between 1895 and 1900. He was an Old Cryptian and scored a try on his debut against Leicester.

He played four times for the Barbarians and was capped five times for England between 1898 and 1899. His brother, Frank, was a forward and often played in the same team for Gloucester and England.



These days it is usual for players to specialise in one position (with James Forrester's appearance at centre being a notable exception), but in the past it was common to play in several positions amongst the backs, and

even sometimes to take a turn in the forwards!

# **ROY JAMES**

Roy James who made 298 appearances between 1924 and 1937, predominantly at centre, played in every position behind the scrum. He played his first game in 1924 against Guy's Hospital, but did not become a regular until the 1926-27 season. He captained the club in 1930-31, when a moderate season was lifted by the first double over Cardiff for 40 years.

Roy also played 31 times for Gloucestershire, and was a member of the County Championship winning teams of 1930 and 1932. After his playing days were over, he coached Gloucester Old Boys and was their club president from 1945-51

The 1930's was a very successful decade for the Club, and their record against Welsh teams (which was always the measure of a Gloucester season) was second to none. A significant contribution to this success was made by two outstanding centre three-quarters, Maurice McCanlis and Francis Edwards.

# MAURICE McCANLIS

Maurice McCanlis won Blues for Oxford University in 1926 and 1927. He was also a good cricketer, which won him Blues from 1926-28. He had played a few times for Blackheath before arriving at Kingsholm for the 1928-29 season. In 1929, he scored two tries in a famous Gloucester win, the first away at Cardiff since 1898.

Maurice was also a regular









choice for the County, appearing alongside Roy James in the team that won the Championship in 1930. The County won the title again in 1931, McCanlis scoring a try in the final, when Warwickshire were defeated 10-9.

Maurice was now on the radar of the England selectors, winning two caps in 1931, and the following season helped the County to a hat trick of Championships when they beat Durham in the final.



# FRANCIS EDWARDS

Francis Edwards, a product of Wycliffe College, first played for Gloucester in the 1932-33 season, starting in just eight games, but he became a regular in the following season. In 1934-35, in 31 appearances he scored no less than 21 tries. He also played 23 times for Gloucestershire.

By 1937-38 he had moved to the north of England where he played for Birkenhead Park, and the following season made it into the final England trial for the Rest which beat the senior team, but no cap was forthcoming.

The War then intervened, and Francis played in several of the wartime internationals, for which



caps were not awarded. After the war in 1945-46, he played one season for Leicester and just one game for Gloucester, before retiring.

# KEN DANIELL

Ken Daniell, who went to the Central School, was the son of Norman, who enjoyed a distinguished playing career with Gloucester in the 1920's. Ken was very fleet of foot and initially played on the wing, before moving to centre to "see more of the ball".

Ken's first season was 1945-46, but he really came to the fore the following season, which included a stunning try at Cardiff, who then boasted the entire Welsh international back division. Ken left them in tatters, intercepting and running in from 60 yards.



In 89 appearances for Gloucester he scored 42 tries, and in one period in the 1947-48 season, he scored at least one try in 10 successive games. Unfortunately

he picked up a knee injury during the 1948-49 season, and by January 1950 this had caused his retirement at the age of 24.

# **JOHN BAYLISS**


John Bayliss was a Gloucester legend, a bustling centre who tackled with ferocity. A favourite ploy of his, on receiving the ball, was to head for the nearest group of opposing forwards and drive straight into them, often emerging with ball still in hand on the other side. He was even more devastating against opposing backs, who knew they were in for a flattening whether they had the ball, John had the ball, or the ball was just somewhere in the vicinity.



He first appeared for Gloucester in 1960, and by the 1961-62 season he was established as a first choice selection. He was in the cup winning team of 1972 and captained the club in the following season. In all John made 402 appearances, scoring 92 tries and kicking a single penalty against Birkenhead Park in 1968.

John was a stalwart of the County team with 57 appearances, and was captain from 1974-76, when they won successive County Championships. Although appearing in several England trial games, he was never capped. He was offered professional terms by Warrington, but decided not to "go north"

Of course, because of John's fearless approach he was bound to pick up injuries, and in 1973 he broke his neck, but he bounced back and played on until 1976.

O, ahead of appearance number 152, Sharples is excited about the future and looking back on a special night at Kingsholm.

"That was a fantastic night for me, and I'm sure that it is one that I will always remember, not just because of the fashion in which it happened, but it was a real privilege for me and really special.

"Out of every game I've played, I have never got to lead the team out. To get the applause from the



amazing crowd was special enough, but to get the win and get the hat-trick as well, that just made it that little bit more memorable - so it was a really good night for me."

In the modern game, it goes without saying now that bringing up a milestone of 150 games, for a single club is a special achievement.

"I suppose you see it less and less these days and it is a business and you don't always get to choose where you stay and where you play your rugby.

"I've been perhaps fortunate, in that I've shown loyalty to Gloucester and the club has always been good to me. It is very much my club, and I came through the Academy system here. I have lived in the area for a long time and I very much see it as

"I do feel very lucky to say that I have been here for as long as I have, seven years and to have played as many games as I have, is something I am very proud of, and it is a big honour for me.'

But how does the feeling of being considered as one of the senior players sit with Sharples?

"That's a little bit more difficult to get my head around! When I rocked up through the Academy. Nick Wood was already on one hundred games and now he's the next more senior player to myself!

"There's lots of guys here, that perhaps haven't been at the club that long, but have been in the game for a long time. Guys like Tom Palmer, Huddo and Hooky - there are a lot of guys that are in the, how can I say it nicely, '30 years and above age bracket'.

"It is good to have those guys around for us younger guys. It's been a good few years of course since I considered myself as one of the younger players, and now it is making that transition to being one of the senior members of the squad, even though I am only 25!"

And, tonight Sharples is expecting a huge challenge with Conor O'Shea's Harlequins the visitors to Kingsholm.

"It will be a really tough game for us against Quins, they play a great brand of running rugby. We will need to be on our game, and we've had a few weeks off to refresh which you need in a long season.



"We've had a good week of training, and we have to turn up at Kingsholm with a good mentality and continue the momentum that the guys have worked hard to maintain with some good performances during the LV= Cup weekends.'

And, to be honest, I don't remember too many people not



The LV= continues to be bafflingly difficult to work out – I still can't understand the reasons why teams play opposition from other groups rather than from their own. But it is what it is. This season, the competition seems to have attracted more supporters as well, which has to be a good thing.

We were so close to getting off to a great start in the competition down at Exeter – impending arrival of grandchild number one meant I was busy with a paintbrush on the other side of the country and missed the game. I checked in at one point and we seemed to be steaming away with it, only to come back a bit later and find that it had got away from us by a single point.

I'm writing this the day before last week's London Welsh match, so hopefully our young tyros have gone up to Oxford and got the right result.

Off the field, we have had a bit of a result too – for the third year running, the club recording a profit in its annual accounts. Given the amount of money some clubs are throwing around, and





presumably racking up some pretty frightening debts at the same time, it's good that our club is on a much sounder financial footing and that bodes well for the future.

We've also had the second of the multimedia fans forums - very useful when work takes you to the far flung corners of the UK. It's great that the coaches and officials are doing these events, the level of communication between club and supporters is way better than not so many years ago, helped largely by the ability to stream the session plus the updates on Twitter.

The fact that the club also take into account questions posed online via the Twitter feed is a welcome feature as well. It allows supporters who live away from Gloucester to take an active part.

But, back to today, a small matter of a Premiership clash against Harlequins. Both sides will be short of a few players due to the Autumn internationals. I know these fixtures bring great deals of cash to the bank accounts of the home nations, but it still rankles that clubs are expected to play important league fixtures

without some of their key players. I seriously doubt that any other professional sport would allow this situation. But it is what it is. and we just have to get on with it.

In the run up to the England vs All Blacks game, I had to smile at Austin Healey's 'head to head' comments in the Telegraph. In case you missed it, when talking about Jonny May, he described him as having '...good pace, not




exceptional...' Really Austin? Really??? I'd love to see his list of players around who can cover the ground quicker than Jonny May - it won't be very long, that's for sure.

"When I start talking about Dude I don't shut up" said James, smiling. "The first thing probably half the people I see say to me is 'how's the horse?' - even when I was hobbling around on crutches. It shows how they've shared in our fun with him.

He's been incredible."

I saw James at one of his favourite cafes in Cheltenham. A midweek lunchtime meeting with him would normally have meant a media call at Hartpury. But, tucking into a ham omelette, he openly admitted how the nine year old chaser had been a big outlet for him.

"I can't describe how good he's been for me" Sinbad said. "My ankle was very nasty, and remember I had my shoulder injury the season before thankfully we got that right enough to play again.

"To be able to go racing especially at Cheltenham - and watch him, get the adrenalin, get

James Simpson-Daniel

the buzz, has been a great pick up. It was nice to get what you might call the pre match nerves back again when he had his first run of the season at Chepstow.



All I'd had was a feeling of loss since my retirement. It got the heart pounding again and I welcomed it."

This is the fifth season "Oydunow" (the name of the Simpson-Daniel/Robinson/ Tindall syndicate) have owned Monbeg Dude. He really came to prominence by winning at the 2012 Open meeting at Cheltenham at 25-1, and then landing the Welsh National in January 2013.

Throughout, the horse has been trained in Herefordshire by Michael Scudamore, and James enjoys being able to pick up the phone to him.

"Michael is a brilliant trainer for us" said James. "He likes his rugby and we were friends with him before we had Dude. So we can ask him the silliest question in the world without him hanging up.

"Michael is probably a bit defensive with him, but he wants us to have an opinion about when and where he should run, so it's a good balance. He's not running at Cheltenham this weekend because if we went in

the same race he won two years ago he's be carrying a lot more weight. We're looking at a few other options."

Those options include the Hennessy Gold Cup at Newbury at the end of the month, or the Becher Chase at Aintree in December, which is run over the Grand National fences but a shorter distance. Earlier this year Monbeg Dude ran in the National and came 7th. Surely the boys would like to have another crack at it?

James finishes his food. For once, there is a pause in his enthusiastic chat.

"We've got that discussion to have and I'm not looking forward to it," he said. "I'd hate to make the wrong decision."

"This year there was no hard luck story. Paul Carberry gave him a cracking ride - he jumped well, on the whole - and two fences out there was no question in my mind he had a chance of winning.

"He did tire quite quickly after that but he's plugged away and kept going. He's held nothing

back and the weight wasn't a bad weight. There were no excuses, so would we get another run without a hard luck story?

"We've probably got five runs a season with him so could he go to another big race where he'd have a better chance?"

"One or two of the others might want to go for the National again because we're the type who would rather be ambitious with him. Every time we've been like that he's answered us and that's why we love him.

"Nicky (Robinson) would want him to run every day if he was able to. Essentially we are three friends having some brilliant days out watching our horse. What more could you ask for."

\*\*Monbeg Dude's owners are spread far and wide this weekend. Mike Tindall, along with lain Balshaw, is playing for the Classic Lions in a veteran's tournament in Bermuda, while Nicky Robinson should be on duty after injury for Bristol at Nottingham in the Championship tonight.








# **GLOUCESTER RUGBY**

hosts played all the rugby and were left to rue several missed opportunities at the turnaround with just a Sharples try and Greig Laidlaw penalty to show for all their first half control.


Brive did threaten on the odd occasion - their flair and adventure was admirable - but the host's defence was rarely breached. When it was, a loose


