European Rugby Challenge Cup, we now face a tough series of fixtures in the Aviva Premiership.



A FULL BLOODED DERBY

WHO can forget last season's West Country derby at Kingsholm?

It was one of the most fullblooded, controversial and chaotic encounters seen in a long history of encounters between these old rivals.

In any clash between Gloucester and Bath, whether it is a knockout encounter or a dead rubber the passion stakes are high.

Last season it boiled over with five yellow cards, two red and a penalty try at the death as Bath snatched a 17-16 win.


It was a clash that will live long in the memory but perhaps for the wrong reasons but here's hoping we see a derby today to behold for the right ones.

There is no question that the Cherry and Whites that take to the field this afternoon are vastly different to that in April.

Not just in simple terms of personnel but character, leadership and optimism.

Last year the wheels had already come off Gloucester's season but following such mass changes in the summer, David Humphreys and Laurie Fisher are slowly building a hard-nosed, consistent outfit with plenty of cause for optimism.

warmed up for the Christmas derby with European doubles – Bath over Montpellier in the Champions Cup and a tier below, Gloucester over Zebre.

Bath have won the last three league fixtures between the sides and sit second in the Premiership table with three more wins to their name.

"It's a massive game - derby day is always a special one. The stadium will be packed to the rafters because everyone wants to be there.

"Previous encounters have always got a bit tasty and those sorts of things happen when emotions are flying high.

"But we're back winning and building momentum, which is crucial because Bath will be high in confidence having beaten Montpellier convincingly both times.

"It was really important that we got that winning momentum against Zebre. It is genuinely a tough place to come and a lot of other teams have struggled here.

"We have to be pleased with how things are going, it's great to be back in the Gloucester set-up, personally I'm really happy to be

back in and everyone is enjoying their rugby again.

"Now we're looking forward to getting stuck into our rivals. One game isn't our season, we're here to compete and want to do well in all competitions.

"But it's something special, emotion, intensity and everyone on the field wants to be there."

As if all eyes were not already trained on West Country derby at Christmas there is the added interest surrounding Bath's mega-money rugby league convert Sam Burgess.

Slammin' Sam has long been earmarked for a place in the England World Cup squad and standing at 6ft 5ins and weighing in at more than 18 stone he presents a formidable challenge.

But Twelvetrees is relishing the prospect of a potential

showdown.

He added, "Next week is the big one, there's no hiding away from that and we let ourselves down the last time we played Bath at home which was disappointing.


"But it's Christmas time, we're at Kingsholm against our rivals and if we won 3-0 that would be the best thing in the world. There's no bigger game.


TAKING WING - PART ONE

PRE WORLD WAR II STARS ON THE WING FOR GLOUCESTER

WALTER TAYLOR

Born at Frampton in 1871, Walter Henry Taylor was one of the first of those Gloucester players who would send a hum of anticipation rippling through the crowd whenever he got the ball. This was due to his breathtaking speed which enabled him to score spectacular tries from deep inside his own half.

He was the club's leading try scorer for seven seasons. In a career which spanned the years 1890 to 1904 he played 250 games, scoring 127 tries. One of the very best wing three-quarters of his generation in England, he never played for his country, although he appeared in two



international trials, scoring a try in each.

In a remarkable first season, he made his debut for Gloucestershire while still only nineteen and kept his place, going all the way to the final against Lancashire. He also appeared for Western Counties against the Midlands in an England trial that season. Taylor captained Gloucester with great success from 1896 to 1900.

When he died in September 1955, he was the Grand Old Man of Gloucester Rugby, the last survivor of the inaugural match at Kingsholm.

CHARLES "WHACKER" SMITH Charles Albert "Whacker" Smith

Charles Albert "Whacker" Smith was, as his nickname suggests, a robust and sturdily built wing who was a formidable defender and tackled magnificently. However, when near the line, he was difficult to stop and in 270 appearances for Gloucester between 1897 and 1908 he scored 141 tries.

Establishing himself in the 1st XV in the 1899-1900 season, he scored a try in Gloucester's 13-0 defeat of the Barbarians at Kingsholm that April. The following year he played in two trials and was selected for England against Wales at Cardiff in January 1901 specifically "to stop the Welsh backs scoring." Although he put in some good defensive work, Wales won the game 13-0 and he was not selected again.

His record of eight tries against Clifton in the opening match of the 1901-02 season has never been equalled. He went on to score 29 tries in 27 games that season and to play in the County



Championship Final against Durham at Kingsholm.

In his last outstanding season, 1905-06, he played for Gloucester against the first All Blacks at Kingsholm and finished with 27 tries in 33 games. He did play for Gloucestershire against the first Springboks at Kingsholm in November 1906, but by then the injuries sustained as a result of his robust style of play were catching up with him and he retired in March 1908.

ARTHUR HUDSON

Arthur Hudson was the most prolific try scorer in the history of the Gloucester club, with an astonishing career record of 235 tries in only 260 matches played between 1902 and 1920.

His first love was football and he made his Kingsholm debut playing for the City Albion AFC on what is now the club car park before switching codes in 1902, at the age of 20. His career took off in 1904-05 when he scored 35 tries in only 31 games and his tally of 41 tries for Gloucester in 1905-06

is a record that has never been approached.

Arthur combined his try scoring ability with a sound defence and played eight internationals for England. scoring eight tries, including four tries in one match against France in Paris in 1906. He played for Gloucester against the 1905 All Blacks and for Gloucestershire against the 1906 Springboks, both matches at Kingsholm.

He scored two tries in



Gloucestershire's first County Championship Final victory over Yorkshire at Kingsholm in 1910 and at the age of 37 played throughout their successful 1920 campaign, scoring four tries in the competition.

Arthur Hudson was an outstanding captain of Gloucester for five successive seasons 1908-1913. After his retirement he served as club secretary for 35 years and was revered as Gloucester's "Mr Rugby."

SID BROWN

Salford born Sidney Albert Brown was brought up in Gloucester where he excelled as a schoolboy rugby player and was capped by England at schools level.

He was an attacking wing threequarter who occasionally played in the centre. After serving with the 7th Gloucesters in World War One he joined Gloucester RFC, scoring two tries in a 13-0 win over Abertillery in his first game in September 1919.

The following season he was



his club's leading scorer with 20 tries from 25 matches and he was again the leading try scorer in 1922-23 and 1923-24. His try scoring feats attracted wider interest and he was capped by his native Lancashire.

Sid Brown switched his county allegiance to Gloucestershire in 1924. He played for Gloucestershire against the Second All Blacks (the "Invincibles") in September in a creditable 6-0 defeat at Kingsholm and then played throughout the County Championship campaign, ending with the final which was lost 14-6 against Leicestershire. He also played in Gloucester's Golden Jubilee game against the RFU President's XV in November.

Elected vice captain in 1925-26, Sid Brown had played 26 games scoring 21 tries, when he was injured playing against Aberavon at Kingsholm on Easter Saturday, 1926. He was taken to Gloucester Royal Infirmary where he died the following day.

The death of such a popular player who had scored 116 tries in his 185 appearances and had frequently captained the club in Tom Voyce's absence, aroused much public sympathy and an appeal on behalf of his widow and son raised over £1600, a substantial sum in those days.

KIT TANNER

Cheltenham born Christopher Champain "Kit" Tanner played just 66 games for Gloucester. spread over eight seasons 1930-38 but in those eight seasons he scored 42 tries and left an indelible impression on all who watched him play.

His running, when in full flow,







was described as "one of the loveliest sights ever seen at Kingsholm" and rather than kick, which he did rather clumsily, he would throw the ball from one wing to the other with deadly accuracy.

Cheltenham College educated Tanner was up at Pembroke College Cambridge, but had failed to get his 1929-30 Blue, when asked to play for the Barbarians against East Midlands at Northampton in March 1930. He scored a hat trick of tries in a 22-6 victory in front of the England selectors and two weeks later played for England against Scotland at Twickenham.

He gained his Blue in December 1930 and played three times for the Barbarians but missed further



England selection. After the Varsity match he made his debut for Gloucester.

He was back in favour with the England selectors and capped four times in 1932, scoring a try in his last international against Scotland.

Ordained in 1935, he became a curate at St Mary de Lode church in 1937 and was one of three clergyman playing in the Gloucester side. On the outbreak of WW2, Kit volunteered as a naval chaplain, and was posted to the

cruiser, HMS Fiji.

When the Fiji was attacked by the Luftwaffe off Crete in May 1941, he spent hours in the water and was personally responsible for saving the lives of close to 30 men before succumbing to exhaustion. He was posthumously awarded the Albert Medal for saving life at sea.

"There has been an extra spring in the step of the boys this week, and personally I am so excited to play in this, with it being my first derby in a Gloucester shirt. I am massively excited."

And, for the man with 77 Welsh caps to date, including plenty of clashes with England, the derby feeling is one tasted many times by the Neath born player, but the excitement never changes.

"I can make a comparison between the two, there is a massive rivalry involved and everyone wants the bragging rights.

"At the end of the day, for us it is a derby. But, first and foremost, it is a hugely important game in terms of our form and our league position. It's a big couple of weeks for us as a team."

Potentially, there is a quartet of home international half backs who could take the field in today's game, with Hook (Wales) and club team-mate Greig Laidlaw (Scotland) taking on current England pivot George Ford and the vastly experienced Peter Stringer of Ireland for the visitors. For Hook, it is testament to the quality of players in line to lock horns.

"They have some quality players across their squad. George in particular is really shining and there are quality players across the board and the head-to-heads that can be made up.


"I can't wait to be tested, and fingers crossed it will be a really great game with the atmosphere and crowd that is expected.

"We have spoken a little bit about the game at Kingsholm last year, it got a bit tasty. But that is what derbies are all about in terms of the passion the players show."

The lure of a derby game at Christmas has captured the imagination yet again, and the Kingsholm crowd will no doubt embrace the derby feeling, Hook definitely does.

"You have that excitement on derby day, and that is the same whether you're starting your career or you're right at the end. When I was playing in Wales, the Xmas games always threw up the Ospreys v Scarlets and they were amazing occasions.

"People around Gloucester have been talking

about this one for some time but it doesn't affect your preparation, as you have to do what works for you."

And, speaking about his summer move to the Cherry and Whites, the Welshman is playing with a smile on his face and this is testament to the work on the field and how he has settled in.

"It has been a great move for me so far. It was a slow start and the boys are starting to gel now and the club is so great.

"I am really loving it here and it has been a great move for me. The support has been awesome and the supporters deserve a massive performance in this game!"

The hype has been off the scale, far more than I can recall happening before, certainly not since the last greatest ever rugby league player - i.e. Andy Farrell -


was signed by Saracens. And he didn't exactly set the Union game on fire...



OTH teams come here off the back of successive wins in

Europe. In the Champions Cup, Bath still have it all to do to make the quarter finals, especially as their remaining away game in their pool is at Toulouse.

In the Challenge Cup, Gloucester can secure top spot in their group by beating Oyonnax here next month. The tournament will become more testing in the knockout stages.

This evening though, festive bragging rights locally are on the line. Time to seek the opinions of two men who have served both teams, and play opposite each other in the second row.

For all their fierce competitiveness in a physically demanding position on the field, **Dave Attwood** and **James**

Hudson are personable, thoughtful men off it.

THE INTENSITY OF THE FIXTURE:

JH: I played for Bath at Kingsholm



in 2006 and it was my only experience of it until last season. I was a young player and it was made very apparent how important it was. We warmed up in front of the Shed and you could feel that added bit of enthusiasm

from the fans. Gloucester and Bath are cities with big support bases, and when you bear in mind the success the clubs have had, matches between the two have tended to be important games as well.



DA: It's a stand out fixture, and after what happened last season even more so. An awful lot of emotion goes into the game from players, supporters and back room staff. Everyone is desperate for a victory, and that is essentially what a derby day needs. Since Bristol dropped out of the top flight, there isn't that third element to the season which has historically been there, so Gloucester against Bath is always a day to look forward to.

THE OPPOSITION:

JH: I lived in Bath for six years, so I know their fans will expect their performance to go up another gear for this game. Their squad is deeper than last season, and they've still strung together a good sequence of results despite an increasing number of international calls. They have a balance of people coming through like Auterac and Catt in the forwards and other experienced players who are not in the international picture.

DA: I look at Gloucester's results every week. When you've been part of a club, in my experience you take an interest in how they are doing. I've kept an eye on their squad ever since I left. We're quietly aware of what's going on but we'll spend a lot of time focusing on the Bath plan because margins are everything. 1% either way can tip you over the edge one way or the other.

HEAD TO HEAD:

JH: Dave's playing really well, and took his opportunity with England in the autumn internationals. He's done well at club level for a while now and formed a good combination with Stuart Hooper and Dominic Day. Bath have some big guys in the second row.

DA: James is a smart player with a good work ethic. He's proved that around the Premiership at all his clubs and facing him will be a stern test. I know a lot of the boys there. Gloucester have got some great players throughout the team but obviously facing "Huddo" would be a key match-up.

THE POTENTIAL IMPACT OF SAM BURGESS:

JH: Anyone who has a reputation as an outstanding athlete - which Sam is - is going to attract attention. Bath are not exactly short on quality in the 10/12/13 are and he'll only add to that. He's physically strong, can carry in a direct manner and his ability to offload the ball is one which all the good centres have.

DA: Sam's an excellent professional. He's got credentials for a reason. He's smart and he works hard. He's spent a lot of extra time getting up to speed. How will the Shed treat him? There's always a pantomime element with the fans there. They can be a bit aggressive but that's part of the enjoyment of playing at Gloucester and it's one of the reasons the game carries so much intensity. I'm sure Sam's been through it before so it won't be anything new to him.
