ALL BLACK JEREMY THRUSH SIGNS FOR



Gloucester Rugby are delighted to confirm the signing of New Zealand international second row Jeremy Thrush from the Hurricanes for next season.

Thrush, who has won 11 caps for the All Blacks and was part of their recent UK Tour Squad, will join up with the Gloucester Squad at the end of the 2015 Rugby World Cup.

Director of Rugby, David Humphreys, was delighted to confirm his signing and commented, "Signing a player of Jeremy's ability further highlights Gloucester's ambition to compete with the best clubs in Europe. He has been a stand out performer in Super XV rugby over a number of seasons, and the experience he has gained being part of a successful All Blacks squad will be a key element in establishing Gloucester as one of the dominant forward packs in England.

"His recent man of the match performance against Scotland showed what Jeremy will bring to Gloucester in terms of his

rugby ability but he will also add huge value to the squad, both on and off the field, through his leadership abilities.

"As we continue to build our squad for the 2015/16 season, our initial focus was the retention of key players who were out of contract. This has now been done and with Jeremy's announcement this morning, we will continue to add strength in depth to our squad over the next few weeks."

Gloucester Rugby CEO Stephen Vaughan commented, "The addition of a top quality All Black like Jeremy to our squad demonstrates our determination to keep building towards having a squad capable of consistently challenging for honours going forward.

"We began a rebuilding process this season by introducing a completely new coaching set up and a host of new players and we see this exciting announcement as further reinforcement of our total commitment to investing in the playing squad."

GLOUCESTER not only won on the scoreboard last Friday but it was a moral victory for rugby.

Sitting in the press box, doing my upmost to remain impartial, I felt thoroughly deflated as Chris Ashton appeared to put the final nail in the Cherry and Whites' coffin.

Typically, the Premiership heavyweights did not come to play rugby. They came to shut up shop and force Gloucester into mistakes through the squeeze.

Saracens are symptomatic of the negative way rugby is increasingly played in the northern hemisphere.

Rugby where teams are often more successful without the ball than with it - defences win the day.

Love him or hate him, Austin Healey made the same point following Northampton Saints' festive victory over Harlequins at Twickenham.

Healey called for penalties to be devalued and questioned how match points could be reformed to encourage teams to play with the ball and not without it - to make rugby a more exciting spectacle in an increasingly competitive market.

Saracens did very little at Kingsholm - they are more comfortable without possession,


forcing mistakes to pounce upon and the stats are reflective of that.

The Barnet-based club had just a 26 per cent share of possession and 24 per cent territory - you could claim that was down to Gloucester but it is a common trend.

They made just one clean break and beat six defenders compared to the Cherry and Whites' nine and 43.

They ran the ball only 57 times, compared to Gloucester's 170 and

made just 252 metres, while opting to kick the ball away more.

Their first try came from the whistle of JP Doyle following a driving lineout and their other touchdowns from Billy and Mako Vunipola were off the back of forward drives.

Yes, it has a major part to play in the game but the big-spending club offered nothing else in terms of attack.

What do we want to see - brains or brawn? Hopefully a combination of both but at the moment the balance is off.

Gloucester on the other hand scored two tries which will surely contend for gongs at the end of the season.

They were full of audacity, skill, speed and flair - worth the attendance fee alone, unlike Saracens. If I was a punter I

would not be parting with my hard earned to regularly attend Allianz Park.

So when James Hook lined up and slotted the match winning kick from distance it was not just a win for Gloucester but a win for rugby.

Make no mistake, the same could be said of Gloucester's one-point victory over Exeter Chiefs the previous week. The Sandy Park faithful had every right to plead 'we was robbed.'

During that encounter the Chiefs had the majority of territory and possession and made 13 linebreaks to Gloucester's solitary one.

But the Cherry and Whites still displayed attacking enterprise and skill on occasions - take the buildup to Ben Morgan's try, with Matt Kvesic breaking out of his half as an example.

Fortunately it is not a common


trend at Gloucester and now they appear to be sharpening their clinical edge we will hopefully see their pressure turned into points on a more regular basis.

This afternoon's clash against against Oyonnax promises to be a much more open affair.

We whispered it quietly at the beginning of the season but as soon as the draw was made everyone knew Gloucester should top the pool.

They have done so in impressive fashion, currently unbeaten having taken 19 points from a possible 20.

David Humphreys men are top seeds in the European Challenge Cup and can book their place in the quarter-finals by completing a double over Oyonnax, who next season will be coached by former Kingsholm favourite Olivier Azam.

FLY HALVES - PART TWO

TERRY HOPSON

Terry arrived at Kingsholm at the start of the 1959-60 season, having already played two terms for Bath as a centre. Terry was an outstandingly gifted fly half who could kick long distances and make electrifying breaks.

He swiftly formed a legendary partnership at half back with Mickey Booth. Between 1959 and 1970 Terry played 314 games for Gloucester, and partnered Mickey in 204 of those.

In January 1967 Hopson played for Western Counties against the touring Australians and had a fine game. In addition to scoring two penalties in the 9-0 win, he was



stopped inches short of the try line, after making a typical break.

Later that season due to a disagreement with the club over selection policy, Terry returned to Bath. However he was back at Kingsholm the following season.

He played for Western Counties against the South Africans in 1969, and for Gloucestershire in the losing final against Staffordshire in 1970.

He played for the county 20 times.

Terry broke his leg playing against Sale in April 1970 which ended his career. For Gloucester he scored 102 tries.

TOM PALMER

Tom was a Cornishman who also played for Truro. He debuted at Gloucester in 1967, playing in the centre.



He played his county rugby for Cornwall and appeared at fly half in the final against Lancashire, at Redruth before 22,000 spectators, in 1969. At one point Cornwall led 9-0, but lost in the end 9-11.

Following Terry Hopson's career ending injury, Tom took over at fly half, and with the evergreen Mickey Booth forged a sound partnership. They were the half backs throughout Gloucester's successful cup campaign of 1971-72 culminating in the 17-6 win over Moseley at Twickenham, in the final. Palmer and Booth both scored drop goals.

Tom's form that season was so good that he was England reserve

fly half through the International campaign, and went on to tour South Africa with England that summer, although he did not gain a cap. Tom made 210 team appearances for Gloucester and scored 258 points including 28 tries.

CHRIS WILLIAMS

Chris was a big aggressive fly half, who first played for Lydney, St.Pauls College (Cheltenham), Headingley and RAF before joining Gloucester in November 1975.

He appeared for the county in a semi-final game against Warwickshire in February 1975, whilst still a Headingley player. He made a regular place for himself in the next county campaign and



appeared in the winning final against Middlesex in March 1976.

Meanwhile for Gloucester he had a good working partnership with Peter Kingston at scrum half in 1975-76, and part of 1976-77, when Paul Howell took over. This combination played against







Leicester in the cup winning team of 1978, and the losing county final against North Midlands in the same season.

Chris won one England cap against France in 1976. Peter Butler and Mike Burton were in the same team. Williams played 101 times for Gloucester scoring 27 tries, and 23 times for Gloucestershire with seven tries.

MIKE HAMLIN

Mike was a long serving fly half, who first played for Coney Hill and Cheltenham. joining Gloucester for the start of the 1982-83 season. He played 343 games for the club, scoring 63 tries.

For many seasons he had an outstanding partnership with Marcus Hannaford at scrum half He captained Gloucester from 1989-91, and led the club in the cup final against Bath in 1990.



He was a player who never seemed to get injured. Evidence of this is in the sequence of appearances in successive seasons, 1983-91: 41,41,40,40,35,36,33,36.

MARK MAPLETOFT

Mark was a popular utility back, equally at home at fly half or full back, and a deadly goal kicker. In his 114 appearances for Gloucester he scored 1,365 points, consisting 39 tries, 183 conversions, 257 penalties and 11 drop goals.

Mark started out with Rugby Lions for whom he played from

1990-94. He was a big factor in the team's rise to Courage League 1. However, after Rugby had endured two successive relegations, Mark came to Gloucester for the 1994-95 season where he played full back.

He made an immediate impression and was selected for an England 'A' cap, but he picked up an injury which kept him out of the game for a year. Back to full fitness for the start of the 1996-97 season Mark moved to fly half to accommodate the young Chris Catling at full back. This was a season of great success for Mark



as he totalled 458 points, and gained his single England cap.

In 1997-98 he played in the Cheltenham & Gloucester cup winning team which defeated Bedford 33-25. He scored a try, two conversions, two drop goals and a penalty.

In season 1998-99 Simon Mannix signed for Gloucester and Mark's chances became limited. and in July 1999 he moved to Saracens.

LUDOVIC MERCIER

In the early noughties there was quite a Gallic air to Kingsholm, with the presence of Phillipe Saint-Andre as Director of Rugby and Ollie Azam the Shed's favourite hooker.

A band used to play La Marseillaise before the game, and to add to this heady mix Phillipe plucked Ludovic Mercier from the comparative obscurity of French League 2 team Aurillac.

"Ludo" was already kicking conversions and penalties for fun. and he quickly became another Shed hero.

His first season was 2001-02 and in his first five games he kicked 24 penalties. He continued in this vein all season and totalled 508 points, including 96 penalties and 77 conversions. He might not have had the natural elan one might expect in a French player, but he adopted a more English style.

He did though have a sharp eye for an interception. A case in point was in the Powergen Cup final against Northampton in 2003, with Gloucester pinned back to their 22, Ludo intercepted and made it to half way before passing to James Simpson-Daniel, who scored a glorious try, which put the result beyond doubt.


In that season Ludovic



scored another 394 points and won selection for France 'A'. Unfortunately for Gloucester he then returned to France for two seasons to play for Grenoble and Pau, but returned to Kingsholm for the 2005-06 season.

He played in the team which won the European Challenge Cup against London Irish that season, scoring two penalties and a conversion. In 2006-07 he found game time more difficult with the arrival of Ryan Lamb, and he left the club at the end of the season.

In his 105 games Ludovic scored 1,325 points, consisting of 14 tries, 224 conversions, 247 penalties and 22 drop goals.

Defending the Junior World Championship was a special achievement for the band of promising youngsters and also the Backs and Attacks coach in the Cherry and White squad, and it is clear Purdy is keen to continue that momentum.

"It was a great experience, I was lucky enough to be in for two years, and they were both great experiences. This summer especially, to go over to New Zealand and retain the trophy was fantastic.

"It was a great bunch of boys and there was a lot of great camaraderie and banter and this made the trip even better.

"We played a great style of rugby under Walshey and it was a super summer and provides me with some really special memories."

The progression from Junior World Championships into the full national side is a clear pathway, displayed recently in the Southern Hemisphere with Handre Pollard (South Africa) and Sean McMahon

pulled out a great result.






But the win comes at a cost. Fortunately it looks like Nick's injury is not so serious, but sadly it seems that we are going to be without Ben for some time.

It's a salient reminder of the risks that are in front of these guys week in, week out. The hits are huge now and I know I mocked Saracens a bit last week over their micro-chip things but, joking aside, that is a great innovative idea for our sport.

We're playing catch up with others - notably NFL in the States and I believe it has been trialled in Rugby League - but if those things can help prevent one serious injury then they are worth the investment.

I can't not mention the reaction

of the Saracens team and staff in the way they reacted to both Ben and Nick's injuries. Watching them applaud the players off the field - including some of their replacements who seemed to



form an impromptu line-up by the tunnel - was good to see and shows the sportsmanship and respect that lives on in our sport.

I guess the other frustrating thing from last weekend is that the win didn't make a difference to our league position. I don't think that there has ever been such a congested mid table since leagues began. At the time of writing Wasps have won seven and lost six and are in fourth position, we have won six and lost seven and are in ninth! It's all to play for!



EED another clue ? Probably not, but he owned a French restaurant in Cheltenham, and he'll take a keen interest in tonight's game.

Olivier Azam is on his way to Oyonnax in the summer as their new Director of Rugby, having cut his teeth looking after the forwards at Toulon and Lyon.

"I first spoke about coaching to Nigel Melville and I did a bit under Dean Ryan," Olivier told me ahead of today's game.

"I knew I wanted to go into coaching and I have learned from every coach in the way they would do things and why. I would ask myself if I would have made the same decisions. I tried to analyse things from the coaches' point of view.

"I did my badges at Gloucester and the opportunity to go to Toulon when I retired was exciting as they had not done well the year before. I was with another young coach (Pierre Mignoni) and we worked hard together. It was a great experience to have Philippe Saint



Andre and then Bernard Laporte auidina us."

Philippe and "Zed" go back a long way. They played at Clermont together before the one brought the other to Kingsholm first time round nearly 15 years ago. His first spell ended in 2003, but he was only back in France with Montferrand for a year before he had two English teams chasing him.

"I had wanted to go back to France to try and get in the French squad for the World Cup," Azam said.

"I was not enjoying my rugby though and Philippe was at Sale. He wanted to take me there as a player coach but it was a bit early for me, and Tom Walkinshaw heard about it and picked up the phone.

"He made sure I came back to Kingsholm and I'm really glad he did because I spent over 10 years as a player in the end at the club and met a lot of good people which was important for me."

Even now, I could feel Azam's warmth towards the club still burns strongly. He welcomes the fact that Alex Brown, Peter Buxton and Trevor Woodman are still involved, and has been sorry to see a string of former colleagues (Brown, James Forrester, Andy Hazell, Olly Morgan and James Simpson-Daniel) all retire early because of injury.

"They have been unlucky because they were good professionals" Olivier went on.

"I really enjoyed being around guys like Andy Hazell because of everything he put his body through on the pitch, and I also knew if we worked hard to give James some good ball he would always do something amazing things I couldn't do!

"I've been lucky in my career. I had only two big injuries over 18 seasons and I missed more games because of the scrapes I got into. That was part of my game and I didn't mind getting


stuck into the opposition. I think I have strong genes, so I must thank my parents for that."

A parent himself, Azam's son is a keen Gloucester supporter, and having met his wife here too, any televised matches are essential viewing with Thomas wearing his very own Gloucester shirt. Next season, dad will ensure he's got an Oyonnax one to go with it.


"Oyonnax reminds me a lot of Gloucester when I first joined the club because of the spirit which is running through it. This is their second year in the Top 14 and the town lives for the rugby team.

"They need to keep developing as a squad but they have a lot of pride and they work really hard, that is what they are known for. At the moment I am focussed on keeping Lyon in the Top 14, but I am starting to analyse the squad and staff at Oyonnax to make sure we can improve the team next season."
