Whoever is wearing the Gloucester shirt today though, they'll be giving it 100% as always.


The business end of the season is nearing, every game is hugely important and that just displays the quality of this league now with every side getting better and better.

seems like a distant memory as we welcome the players, staff and supporters from the Saints to Gloucester.


It was a baptism of fire for all of us and the six months since then have been, as predicted, an emotional roller coaster in terms of team performance and results!

# "SCRUMMAGING IS NOT ALL LCAN DO..."

NICKY Thomas was perhaps the least known of Gloucester's triple signing of props but he could arguably have the biggest long-term impact at Kingsholm.

Thomas, Paul Doran Jones and Paddy McAllister all put pen to paper last month to bolster the Cherry and Whites' front-row resources next season.

With the Premiership and European competitions running consecutively and without a break next season there will be an added emphasis on strength in depth and Thomas certainly has potential.

The Swansea-born tighthead was part of a formidable, all-conquering Wales Under-20s scrum but has found opportunities limited at the Ospreys.

It has been hugely frustrating for the highly-rated scrummager, who has spent the majority of this season playing for Aberavon and made just one appearance for the Ospreys.

But having previously studied, alongside Ross Moriarty and Callum Braley for a BTEC in sport at Hartpury he jumped at the chance to join Gloucester.

He hopes to master his trade alongside Gloucester's wealth of expertise and is relishing

Thomas, 20, said, "I was at Hartpury for two years so I know all about Gloucester and their fans but it's the opportunity within the club that excites me.

"The Premiership is more setpiece orientated than the Pro12 which will suit my game but it will be challenge going up against some of the best scrums.

"It's been very frustrating that the opportunities haven't been

there for me at the Ospreys. I had a good couple of years with Wales Under-20s but nothing picked up from there and I had to move on.

"I'm a Swansea boy born and bred and I would have loved to have played for the Ospreys but I guess the style doesn't suit me.

"When I see my good friend Nicky Smith going on to play for Wales after having opportunities and starting for the Ospreys it's even more frustrating.

"But that's what it's about at this age, taking opportunities. Gloucester are looking to build set-piece dominance and that was the biggest attraction about the club

"Laurie Fisher is one of the best forward coaches in the world and Trevor Woodman was both a great scrummager and a World Cup winner so I'm really looking forward to working with them and also players like John Afoa and Richard Hibbard.

"I'm under no illusions that Afoa is one of the best tight heads in the Premiership.

"I'm 20 and there's no way I will be the star breakthrough but this is my opportunity to learn and develop behind him and some of the other guys.

"David Humphreys pointed out that the Shed loves a penalty try through a scrum just as much as pretty one in the backs. They want a strong front row that's set-piece orientated and that will suit me.'

There have been concerns around Thomas' fitness and work-rate at the Swansea-based region and that is understood to be a reason behind his lack of chances at the Liberty Stadium.

Thomas admits it is an area which requires constant work and the degree in sport and exercise science he will transfer from Swansea University to the University of Gloucestershire to complete will be help in hand

And Thomas knows you need to look no further than his rugby hero Adam Jones for the blueprint.

The Wales and British and Irish Lions legend was known as the "30-minute man" when he broke onto the scene during New Zealand head coach Steve Hansen's tenure at the Millennium Stadium.

He was regularly hooked before half-time but worked relentlessly upon his fitness to become the world's finest tighthead

And Thomas is looking forward to what is sure to be a vital lovehate relationship with Gloucester fitness guru Paddy Anson.

He said, "Adam Jones is definitely my rugby hero, he's an out and out scrummager and achieved so much for Wales. It's unfortunate what's happened and it was a sad day for me when he retired.

"I'm very much in that mould as a player. As a tight head prop scrummaging is the biggest part of my game but as a 21-year-old I know I cannot rely upon just that and have to bring other factors to my game.

"Scrummaging is not all I can do, big collisions, counter rucking and defence are other big strengths to my game.

'Fitness has been a focus throughout the last year and it will be throughout my career but it's my job to hit my targets.

"I've come to the acceptance that like Adam Jones and Richard Hibbard, body weight will be an issue but it is my responsibility and while I might struggle I will have levels to reach and that's exactly what I will do.

"I've heard the set-up is very professional and I'm sure I will be working very hard with Paddy."

# LADIES AT KINGSHOLM THE VICTORIAN AGE



From the earliest days of the Gloucester Club, when matches were played at the Spa, ladies were encouraged to attend. Indeed seating in the pavilion at the Spa was reserved for ladies and members only.

In 1876, the Flamingoes broke new ground by travelling from London to play in Gloucester, and admission charges were made for the first time. The Gloucester ladies were reported to have "mustered in full force in the pavilion" for this match.

This success was closely followed in March 1876 by a major setback, when the first serious injury occurred at a Gloucester match - Sydney Lane sustained a fractured thigh playing against Ross-on-Wye, His misfortune was reported to have greatly upset the ladies present, and for some time their attendance at matches fell away as a result.

The first recorded instance of ladies playing football on the Kingsholm turf was on 11th November 1895, only four years after the ground was opened. An exhibition soccer match was played at Kingsholm by two teams of lady players who were touring the country.

It generated a lot of interest, and attracted a large crowd, despite appalling weather. However, the event also attracted a good deal of derision, as the Citizen reported the following day:

"When a lovely woman stoops to folly" there is no telling where she will end. They were announced as the "original" lady footballers. Their football is certainly "original" enough to warrant this title, and it is to be hoped that these aborigines may disappear before an enlightened and advancing civilisation.

If they could play football some sort of excuse for their appearance might be found, but they cannot, their notions of the game being elementary in the extreme and their attempts to play it fatuous. It must be remembered that the climatic conditions were all against a scientific exposition, pelting rain, muddy ground, and slippery, sodden ball being sufficient to test the stamina and skill of players made of much sterner stuff. Their movements

were for the most part leisurely, their pace slow, their ability a negligible quality. They betrayed a natural anxiety to avoid hurting one another by charging, and a disinclination to fall in the mud.

Let it be said that, so far as modesty is concerned, the most fastidious could hardly take exception to their attire. The blouses and "bloomers" left nothing to be desired as regards decency, and would even have been picturesque had it not been for their stained and weather-beaten condition, which accorded well with the dishevelled hair and general appearance of the wearers.

A noticeable exception was the lady rejoicing in the sobriquet of "Tommy". She was really clever with some of her dribbles, and was much more agile and fast – if we may use the term without reproach in this connection – than her comrades, who trotted about in a rather aimless fashion.

The game would, perhaps, have been more exciting if the goalkeepers had not been two mere men-things who most ungallantly kicked the ball away whenever the respective goals were in danger; and no goals were scored by either side. The first portion of the game lasted half an hour; and when the second had been in progress fifteen minutes the rain became so bad that even the lady footballers could not stand it.

It was getting dark too and the spectators dispersed. They had come to scoff, remained to do







so, and did. Football is all very well in its place. The two do not harmonise. They are hopelessly incongruous."

This experiment was not repeated, and the emphasis remained firmly on encouraging support rather than participation by the womenfolk of Gloucester.

Lady spectators were offered special membership rates by the Club, and even when there was a need to increase income substantially after the Great War, they were still charged less. The ladies continued to be accommodated with the members, away from the "popular" side, where behaviour and language were less genteel.

leading Gloucester player and local policeman, was recruited as

Violet requested assistance from the Club, and suggested that mixed matches be played at Kingsholm as curtain raisers before big matches. Her proposal came before the Club committee, but did not get far. The President, Dr Arnold Alcock, declared that he "considered it inadvisable from all points of view" - end of discussion.

### THE LADIES' Committee

Although the Club paid for professional catering after matches from early in its history



### VIOLET PEGLER

Just as the Great War changed perceptions and attitudes forever as regards the roles of working men in society, so the parts which women played in the Second World War changed their expectations and ambitions.

This certainly applied to Violet Pegler. She had a good Gloucester Club pedigree, her father, Fred Pegler, having played 239 games for the Club, from 1902 to 1913. He took his daughter to her first match at Kingsholm when she was aged 5. She became a regular spectator along with a small group of women friends, and played touch rugby whilst in the Army during World War Two.

In 1948, she advertised for players to start a ladies' rugby team, sufficient numbers came forward and Sid Dangerfield, a until well after the Second World War, the attractions of cutting costs eventually resulted in the formation of a Ladies' Committee to provide meals after the match on a voluntary basis.

This arrangement did not always go smoothly - in 1961 the whole Ladies' Committee felt so put upon that they resigned en masse. However, replacements were found, and the arrangement continued, but it became increasingly difficult to recruit ladies for these duties during the 1980s, and in the early 1990s the Ladies' Committee was disbanded, and the Club reverted to a commercial contract for all catering requirements.

### THE FIRST SEEDS OF Change


By 1972, Tom Voyce was President of the Club, and he met with a group of ladies who requested permission to stage a match against the Club team at Kingsholm. Tom reported to the committee, and some members expressed disquiet, but the match was eventually agreed on the understanding that it would be touch rugby involving only light contact, and with the proviso that the Club "would not be responsible for injury or accident".

The match went ahead between the players and their wives and girlfriends, and "Ladies v Players" matches were held several times in subsequent years.

During the early 1990s, the number of women playing rugby in England grew very quickly, and many rugby clubs formed women's sections. Several women's teams were formed in the Gloucester area, but none directly associated with the Gloucester Club. Student teams made the breakthrough in terms of playing competitive games of women's rugby on the hallowed turf of Kingsholm.

And the Day Finally Dawns The first women's team affiliated to the Gloucester Club only appeared on the scene with the formation of Gloucester-Hartpury Ladies this season. They have played most of their matches at Hartpury, but make history today by becoming the first ladies' team to play at Kingsholm as part of the Gloucester Club.

It's been a long time a-coming. Welcome ladies and congratulations - Violet Pegler would be especially proud of you.





"It's still early days working with Laurie, and perhaps in pre season we missed out on that chunk with him, but looking forward there is still so much that I can learn from him and focus on breakdown both technical and tactical.

"So far, I hope you can see the improvement in the forwards week on week, and that is credit to Trevor as well. Laurie is driving that and pushing standards, so we're all really enjoying that."

On top of that, Kvesic is still able to pick the brains of Andrew Stanley, a coach and friend that he has been with since he first laced up his boots.

"It's nice having Stan around, I've known him since I was 13 or14. It was disappointing that it didn't work out last year, but it is still great that he pops in a few times a week and still coaches me and the boys on the breakdown.

"He's Gloucester Rugby through and through and he was an awesome seven in his day, and there is still loads that I can learn from him.

"He's very inventive with creating new drills and always keeping you on your toes and keeping it enjoyable so he is a super guy to have around."

be, and he was back in the side almost as quickly as he came out of it. Henry, though, looks like a different story.



side. And unlike some of our nearest and dearest rivals. they've not gone to 'players 'r' us' and bankrolled a new side.



ITH places in the Premiership top six being so valuable, it's going to be a mighty scramble to get in.

You have to drop down to National Division 1 to find Gloucestershire representation again, and while there are two clubs in the third tier at the moment, one is very much at risk.

Cinderford's precarious position, sitting as they do in the final relegation place, made a recent supporters meeting all the more interesting.

This is their seventh season in the third tier, but shortly after

Christmas Nic Corrigan (below left) was appointed as Director of Rugby after a period working as a coaching consultant. It meant Andy Deacon - such a favourite here in his playing days - stepping aside after ten years in a variety of roles.

Corrigan, it must be said, has a very different approach. Not only is he involved at first team level, he is employed three days a week by the club as he tries to expand the footprint on which it stands.

"The club has been operating on a small structure and what those people have done you cannot put a value on " he told me.

"The reality is that League rugby is very competitive and any modern day Director of Rugby needs to have a view of both on pitch and off pitch, and it's not just about the first team. We have a vibrant club, and it's really important here that we create something that everyone supports and understands."

Corrigan smiles when I compare his role to that of David Humphreys, but on a smaller scale.

"I've had one meeting with David and he is scarily





impressive" he joked. "I am involved with our scrum drills on a Thursday night, and that's the equivalent of me being on the tools.

"Cinderford's role is to support Gloucester Rugby in terms of developing players, and the challenge is also to take the club out of the Forest of Dean and connect it with the rest of the county via the RFU, the GRFC and the business community.

"If we don't set our stall out properly people won't shop with us. Build from the top down and the shelf life is 4-5 years, and there are many examples of clubs that have fallen by the wayside. Cinderford is still standing and that's down to the management of it to this point. It's now about refining it."

Corrigan will hope his blueprint - which is to set up four new small groups below the board by the start of next season - doesn't have to cope with relegation, but the bare facts are these.





Old Albanians, the club above Cinderford, have a six point cushion with five games left after today, when both sides are at home. It should be five points apiece from games against bottom side Macclesfield, so the window of opportunity for Cinderford is small. They will hope for a favour from Hartpury on April 11.

Hartpury's season, in contrast to Cinderford's, has been encouraging following promotion a year ago. They are comfortably in the top half, and could, after winning at promotion hopefuls Coventry a fortnight ago, still finish in the first four.

Their Director of Rugby, Alan Martinovic is a grounded man not prone to hyperbole but even he conceded it's been a good season whatever happens from here.

"We came into National One

not really knowing how we would do, so whether we have over achieved is for other people to judge," he said.

If they could help engineer a Hartpury win on the Saturday after Easter, it might just keep the door open for two teams from the county to play in the third tier again next season.
