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### A BRIGHT FUTURE AHEAD

GARETH EVANS believes the Kingsholm crowd can give Gloucester the edge to beat Exeter Chiefs in today's European Challenge Cup semi-final.

Eight of the last nine encounters between the West Country rivals have come down to a score or less and the number eight, who bagged a try against the Chiefs in the LV= Cup, reckons home advantage could be key.

A sellout crowd is expected at Castle Grim for the clash, with the club targeting a first major piece of silverware since 2011 and a route into next season's European Champions Cup.

Evans said, "They are always a good team to play against, we've had some crackers over the past few seasons, we both play an exciting brand and it will be a great occasion.

"The home crowd at Kingsholm can be a huge influence. It gives you that extra boost when you're tired, when're blowing and you need to find that extra 10 per cent that crowd can lift you and drive you home. I can't wait, a European semi-final at Kingsholm will be great."

While Exeter warmed up for the encounter by completing a Premiership double over



Northampton Saints to move into the top four, Gloucester slipped to an agonising 29-26 defeat to Harlequins.

Indiscipline proved costly for the Cherry and Whites who lost two men to the sin-bin in the last ten minutes and conceded two tries while they were reduced in numbers.

But, while Evans was disappointed with the defeat, he remains optimistic and insists it will not dent their confidence

ahead of the season-defining encounter.

"Frustrating is the word we will take away from that, we were in control for large portions of the game but in the end it came down to discipline and you can't afford to have two men in the bin at the same time and Quins made us pay.

"Quins defended very well and we got unlucky at some key points. We can talk about whether we were clinical enough while they had men in the bin and, if you look at those periods, they have won the points difference quite heavily and that

was the difference.

"But it won't rock confidence at all. The guys were sat in the changing room saying 'how have we managed to lose that', we know we're within a few per cent of being a very good team.

"We have shown what we can do in patches, throughout the season we've been getting closer and closer to getting a full 80 minutes and, once we do that, we will be very dangerous."

Much of Rob Baxter's side's strength is based upon their back-row with the likes of Thomas Waldrom, Dave Ewers and Ben White, with Cheltenham-educated

England flanker Tom Johnson currently unable to break into the match-day squad.

Gloucester rested Matt Kvesic for Saturday's defeat at the hands of Harlequins but, other than long term casualty Ben Morgan, the back-row will be at full strength against the Chiefs and Evans expects a ferocious battle at the breakdown.

He added, "Their back-row is going very well this year, they've got Tom Waldrom, who has been dotting down for a few tries, and it will be a key area of the battle.

"The breakdown will be hugely important as always and if we can win that it will have a big impact in the game."

# DID YOU KNOW?

DECIDING POLITICAL DIFFERENCES ON THE RUGBY PITCH

WITH a general election looming, it may be timely to recall a rugby match played in the early days of the Gloucester club between the adherents of the two main political parties of the day.

Towards the end of the 1885-86 season, a match was played at the Spa (this being before the acquisition of Kingsholm) on a Saturday afternoon between Conservative and Liberal members of the Gloucester Club. The game drew a large crowd and partisan support was vociferous throughout.

Indeed the Gloucester Chronicle reported, "...the excitement being such as is seldom witnessed at the Spa; the betting at the commencement of hostilities was in favour of the Conservatives to the extent of 6 to 2."

Hubert Boughton led the "Blues" and T. G. Smith the "Yellows." The Chronicle continued:

"At about twenty minutes to four o'clock Smith kicked off from the Beaufort end, the "ballot" ball falling into the hands of Dere, who returned it to the centre of the field, where some slight scrimmaging took place." The Liberals had a try disallowed, but "still hung" round the pollingbooth of their opponents, where H. V. Jones got the ball and passed to Coates, who made a splendid run in and scored a try, and Jones, taking the place-kick, placed a goal. Starr, following up, crawled into the polling-booth and recorded a second vote in favour



of the Liberals; the shot for goal was a failure."

"These reverses fairly aroused the spirits of the Tories, and for a time they played up with great determination, but they did not exhibit the same amount of dash and combination as their Radical friends. When the whistle sounded for the close of the poll the Liberals had a majority of one goal and three tries to one try."

The match was played for charity and a cheque for £18
11s 10d was handed over to the Mayor. He decided that the funds of the poor-box were rather low at 26s, so disposed of £5 there. He gave another £5 to the Charity Organisation Society, and the balance to the Soup Kitchen.

### FIRST SUNDAY MATCH

The first Gloucester match

played at Kingsholm on a Sunday was against arch-rivals Bristol, on 3rd February 1974. Gloucester won 7-3 with Stuart Dix scoring the only try. The game was reported in The Times under the headline "10,000 watch first Sunday match".

### WHEN REPLACEMENTS WERE A NOVEL INNOVATION

The match programme for Gloucester v St. Luke's College on 13th November 1974 informed the Kingsholm faithful that:

"Under the new law regarding replacements both sides this evening will have players standing or, rather, sitting by, to take the place of any colleagues who may be genuinely injured. It should be emphasised that the extension of this law applies only





to county championship matches and the Rugby Union knock-out competition games - from the first round only. Further, only two replacements are permitted for either side; moreover, a player may be replaced only when, in the opinion of a medical practitioner. he is so injured that he should not continue playing in the match. It may sound a little autocratic, but it ensures there is none of this soccer nonsense whereby a manager can send on a substitute at any time because he doesn't like the way a player is performing."

### **HOW TO START A SEASON**

On 15th September 1900. Gloucester started the season with a home win against Clifton by 66-0, with George Clutterbuck scoring 6 tries, a record number of tries in one match for Gloucester: he was supported by "Whacker" Smith scoring 2 tries, and "Jummer" Stephens (grandfather of current club president Eric Stephens) one, out of a total try count of 16.

In the return match at Clifton on 9th February 1901, Gloucester triumphed by 64-3, with Clutterbuck collecting a further 3 tries; this was matched by J Lewis out of a total try count of 14.

Clutterbuck's record did not last long. The following season, Clifton again travelled to Kingsholm for the first match on 21st September 1901. This time they were humbled 74-0, a score which beat all previous Gloucester records, as did the individual try scoring feat of "Whacker" Smith with 8 out of a total of 18 tries. Clutterbuck played in this match, but the fickle finger of fate failed to





give him a single try. In the return match on January 11th 1902, Gloucester prevailed by

a paltry 20-3, scoring 6 tries; the glut was over. George Romans did the kicking in all 4 matches, and helped himself to 31 conversions.

### WHO GETS MEAT FOR TEA?

The provision of hearty food both for the players and the spectators seems to be a recurring theme over the years. In 1929, cartoonist "TEEK" was amused by the change which came over Gloucester fans at the start of the rugby season.

The Club also had a commitment to provide teas for the players, and at the start of the 1947/48 season a Mr. Outridge made an offer to cater each Saturday during the season. His charge would be £7/10/- for 55 persons for a Meat Tea, and £5 for a Plain Tea with cakes and sandwiches. The committee decided to accept the offer of £5 teas, and only on exceptional occasions, at the discretion of the committee, to give the £7/10/- meal.

Apparently Cardiff was regarded as an exceptional case, since the Meat Tea was first offered after the match with them on 11th October 1947. It must have gone down well, because Leicester were also awarded a "full meat tea" three weeks later. By 15th November, the full tea was also to be provided after United matches.

By December the teas were so popular that the tea room was becoming overcrowded, and players who came in late went short - and close supervision was introduced on persons entering without tickets.



With ticket sales for the game flying over the sunny Easter weekend, a bumper Kingsholm crowd will back the boys this evening, and Twelvetrees knows the home crowd can have a big impact with their vociferous,



honest and passionate support throughout the eighty minutes.

"The Kingsholm crowd will be massive, as it always is at home. Every time we turn up and they are cheering us into the stands

when we go and warm up. The Shed are really loud and really get behind us, and this shows when the boys are blowing a little bit harder, you get that extra bit of energy when it comes to the dying minutes of the game.

"It has shown in the games we've had at home this year, the home support are helping us to get over the line, so it is a good weapon to have for us as a team."



ERE we go then, the latest in the long list of 'most important games of the season that we must win'.


Only this one, as far as this season goes, really is. Win today and we can look forward to another in the 'games we must win' series. But we can think about that at around about 9:30 tonight.

While last weekend may not have been the best for the first



AS it April 1st? No.
True, the Walkinshaws
do not own 100% of the
club, but over the last 18 years
their backing has been loyal and
the ties feel emotionally strong.

I can only say that Stephen Vaughan has proved himself to be a shrewd CEO and if he thinks there is money out there - you could almost call it a Dragons Den situation - then perhaps Ryan Walkinshaw might consider releasing a slice of his family's stake in the club for the right investment.

Either way it looks a slow burner of a situation given the large sums of money involved.

So, let's spin back to April 1997, when Tom Walkinshaw bought Gloucester Rugby. How many semi finals have the team been in since then?

The answer is 12, with tonight being the 13th, and if that's more than you can mentally recall let me help you through a dozen games that have been converted into six pieces of silverware.

It would be fair to say that three of those successes in



finals do NOT mean a great deal given the current structure.

Two were in the short lived Cheltenham and Gloucester Cup, where in 1998 and 1999 Gloucester won finals at Franklins Gardens against Bedford, and the Premiership play off win over Bristol in 2002 was at a time when winning the league meant a separate trophy.

That idea was soon ditched too, and while Gloucester fans hated the ruling with a real passion for several seasons afterwards, I think there is an

acceptance now that the play offs, as a concept, isn't going to change any time soon.

The other three final victories included one in this competition at the Stoop, the same venue being used for this year's final, although a repeat fixture against London Irish is no longer possible.

James Forrester's successful chase of his own kick gave Dean Ryan something to show for his first full season in charge in 2006, and Nigel Melville also marked his first full term with a trophy in 2003, when Forrester also scored in the Powergen Cup triumph over Northampton.


In terms of profile, that to me was the most significant, and certainly more so than the LV= Cup win in 2011 when, again at Franklins Gardens, Gloucester under Bryan Redpath comfortably accounted for Newcastle.

If that was Redpath's only chance of glory, Dean Ryan's departure in 2009 came after three opportunities slipped through Gloucester's fingers.

They had reached the Premiership final in 2007 only to be soundly beaten by Leicester, and Tigers got to Twickenham final 12 months later as well with a narrow win in the semi final here. When Ryan's team were hammered by Cardiff in the EDF (now LV=) Final, his tenure didn't last long.

The same was true for the man Ryan replaced. Former Wasps scrum half Melville had seen Gloucester lose a Parker Pen (Challenge Cup) semi final to Sale only weeks after his arrival in 2002. But three years later - and remember Gloucester had lost the 2003 play off final without playing a semi final, such were the rules 12 years ago - Melville left after Saracens secured a Heineken Cup spot beating Gloucester in the Zurich Wildcard final.

One might argue Gloucester's route into the Champions Cup



next autumn is no less of a "wildcard" option - all of which leaves the one semi final that these days be the highest profile of them all.

It remains the one occasion that Gloucester have reached the last four in the top flight European competion, and even 14 years on, Leon Lloyd's try for Leicester in the Heineken Cup

clash at Watford in 2001 remains a topic of controversy whenever the game is discussed.


It's worth saying then that of those dozen semi finals, Gloucester have won nine and lost only three, but on the evidence of last weekend and previous tussles with the Chiefs, they'll need to play well to enhance that record any further.

Exeter are well drilled, solid at set pieces, tireless in terms of their work ethic and with enough flair to add some sparkle - you could say there is no obvious weakness.

This looks the stronger of the two ties, and while Chiefs may still have the Premiership play offs to think about, it's fair to say the Challenge Cup, and what may follow, is everything to Gloucester in terms of the season.

Win here, and they will fancy their chances against the victors at Murrayfield last night between Edinburgh and the Dragons. Achieving that however, will take some doing.



### GLOUCESTER EDGE TENSE THRILLER


Again, Hook was the catalyst as the Welshman threaded a perfectly judged kick through

Time to do it all again tonight!




