
We know we have that backing, and that support, roll on next Friday night!

I must end with a massive thank you for your backing this year, it's a cliché to say that it has been a rollercoaster, but we have plenty still to play for and it's a very exciting time.



IN THE RACE AGAIN

MARIANO Galarza finally feels a worthy member of the Gloucester squad after helping the Cherry and Whites to the European Challenge Cup final.

The Argentina second-row arrived at Kingsholm with a serious shoulder injury that required surgery and spent five frustrating months on the sidelines at his new club.

He was handed his first start in the 30-19 victory over Exeter Chiefs and finally delivered on his well-known potential.

Partnering Tom Savage in the second-row, the duo were relentless with the Puma providing an uncompromising, physical presence coupled with skill and athleticism.

And the 6ft 8ins, 18 stone international was relieved to finally prove himself in front of both his teammates and the home faithful.

He said, "You don't feel part of the team until you are on the field so it's a great feeling. It's been a long five months because when you're at a new club you want to show what you can do but I arrived with an injury and needed surgery.

"Now I am in the race again and I'm enjoying the moment. Matches like that are why I joined the club and now I'm enjoying that.

"It didn't feel real – my first start for Gloucester in a European semi-

final at Kingsholm. It was a good challenge for me and now we've done that I'm so happy, we're in the final at the Stoop and this is what we were looking to do. I felt good, I had 79 minutes and was happy but I can still do better."

The Cherry and Whites face Edinburgh at the Stoop on May 1, after they recorded a commanding 45-16 victory over Newport Gwent Dragons.

Galarza reckons it is essential that the club salvage

And he is confident that they have what it takes to topple the Scottish capital outfit.

He added, "It hasn't been the best season for us in the Premiership so we needed that and we're looking forward to hopefully lifting the trophy. Edinburgh did really well and it will be a tough game in the final but I think it's a game we can win.

"It's a final and anything can happen, they will bring a lot of energy and will want to win just as much as us so it will be a big game and occasion. But we have a great team and if we do things right we can win."

Saturday was a simply stunning second-row performance from Gloucester who now boast a wealth of riches in the boiler house department.

Savage and Galarza were

simply everywhere, in both attack and defence, and were imperious at the set-piece.

Gloucester did not lose a lineout all evening against Exeter and with their weight in the second-row the pack turned two Chiefs scrums against the head.

Waiting in the wings is Tom Palmer, who has been a very shrewd acquisition but is likely to be off at the end of the season, James Hudson and young man mountain Elliott Stooke.

Add to that the arrival of All Black Jeremy Thrush at the end of the season and there is huge strength in depth.

When Nigel Davies was at the helm he revealed Savage was the first name on his team sheet and after the injury problems of last season that is quickly becoming the case again.


But with international locks Galarza and Thrush on the books where will Savage, a player who can operate in the second-row or back-row operate?

HERITAGE

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DID YOU KNOW?

Why didn't we think of this one at Coventry recently?

On 21st January 1961, Gloucester visited Wasps and lost 10-6, the referee explaining that, "...the match was played 35 minutes each way at the request of the Gloucester skipper who stated on arrival that they wished to catch an early train home".

Do You Love Wing Forwards?

Tom Voyce, arguably the greatest of Gloucester players, revolutionised the role of the wing forward in the 1920s. He transformed the flanker from being just another member of the pack of forwards to a specialist ball-winner who broke quickly, chased down the backs and added speed to physicality.

He received plaudits aplenty for his exploits, earning titles such as "The Scourge of the Welsh" and "The Father of Wing Forwards". His England captain, Wavell Wakefield said that he always wrote Tom's name first onto the team sheet.

His exploits for the British Isles teams in South Africa in 1924 were legendary, and long remembered, When the Springboks visited Kingsholm in 1960, their Manager, Ferdie Berch, said how pleased he was to have the opportunity to meet Tom, who he described as "...the originator of the more, how shall I say, robust type of play. He laid the foundations of the play today."

Putting aside the fact that Rugby League exterminated





wing forwards as a species, not everyone in the union game was a fan either. Dai Gent, who played scrum half for Gloucester and England, and later became rugby correspondent of the Sunday Times, was quite schizophrenic about his friend, Tom Voyce.

He wrote in 1932: "I hate all 'wing' forwards as a class. I think their type has been a curse to the game. But if the gods will send you a couple of geniuses in that special position at the same time, then you are a fool not to take what they give you! Voyce and Price were great players both, and of different types, though 'wing' forwards, and I could see much reason for playing both these delightful people, and I was only sorry they were 'wing' forwards!"

Ah! Those were the Days for Forward Play

On Christmas Day 1875, the Gloucester Chronicle carried a report of a match between Gloucester and Ross. Although played, as today, as a 15-a-side game, 10 players on each side were forwards, with 2 backs, 1 three-quarter-back and 2 half-backs.

The report reads as follows: "A more equal game or more sharply-contested match could not have taken place than this, which was played at Ross on Friday last, according to Rugby Union rules. The result was a draw, neither side scoring any point. The forwards on both sides played up well and the tackling was very good, so that few runs were made, and long and





fierce scrimmages were the order of the day."

Dodgy Masseur

Before the start of the 1948-49 season, Tom Day, the Player's Representative on the Club Committee, reported that the players would like the Club to appoint a Club Masseur. This was agreed in principle, but the candidate put forward could "not be entertained" by the Committee, for reasons not specified.



' The players were asked to propose someone else, but no suitable candidate could be found, so the committee minutes record that, "...it was agreed to let the matter lie on the table".

Gloucester's First International Referee

The first Gloucestershire referee to be appointed for an international match was Mr. G. A. Roberts of Gloucester. He refereed the France v. Wales international in Paris on 27th March 1924. Wales won 10-6.

What do you think the captains say to one another as they run out?

When Gloucestershire played Lancashire in the final of the County Championship at Kingsholm in 1947, Jack Heaton,



the Lancashire skipper, decided he would like a bet on the result of the game. But there was only half an hour to kick-off so he was unable to leave the dressing-room to find a bookmaker.

Then he remembered that the redoubtable Gloucester captain. "Digger" Morris, was a bookmaker. So, as the teams walked down the tunnel, Jack asked "Digger" if he


would take a £1 bet on Lancashire winning, and Digger immediately agreed, giving him odds of 6-4 on.

Later it was a happy Lancashire skipper who celebrated his team's victory, 14-3, with the winnings he had collected from "Digger".

Can You Name the 1978 Team?

In 1978 Gloucester started the same fifteen players in all five rounds of the John Player Cup on their way to a 6-3 win over Leicester in the final. The team contained eight internationals, two of them British Lions.


The team was: Peter Butler (fullback), Bob Clewes and Richard Mogg (wings), Richard Jardine and Brian Vine (centres), Chris Williams (outside half), Paul Howell (scrum half), Gordon Sargent and Mick Burton (props), Steve Mills (hooker), Steve Boyle and John Fidler (locks) and John Watkins, John Simonett and Viv Wooley (back row). Only Scotsman John Simonett was not a product of Gloucestershire rugby.





Savage was not surprised that his
Puma partner excelled with an all
action display.

"Mariano has been training really well, and he's been here a while so we've got to know him really well and been able to bring him up to speed and he's slotted in seamlessly.

"We've seen from Saturday what a quality player he is, and he came into a semi-final not quite knowing what capacity he was going to be involved and he's come in and performed like he's been here all his career, let alone making his first start.

"He certainly didn't look like he was making that first start, and was outstanding."


With the walls of the Kingsholm citadel a lot firmer this year, Savage is delighted that the squad is, game by game, returning Kingsholm into a powerful fortress, but with the Falcons in town today, another tough test beckons.

"It's another chance to keep our run going at home in 2015, and

keep improving. Consistency has been huge for us this year, and has been a bit up and down, so we'll be looking to continue on the better form that we have found now.

"The most important thing for us after a good performance is going in and backing it up. There is no point performing well one week, then not the next week.

"That consistency is key for us, especially if we want to have more success this season, and in the future"


But let's not get ahead of ourselves yet, there are a couple more league games to play and the small matter of a European trophy to go after.

Let's go back to last weekend, about the only disappointment I can think of was the low attendance at the game itself. Yes, it was a rubbish kick off time (thanks TV people) on a Saturday night, but come on people - it was a semi-final!

That said, the people who were there made up for their missing colleagues with a great wall of sound through most of the game. A terrific atmosphere, maybe only bettered by that Saracens' game. It was good to have so many Exeter fans making the journey too - they made themselves heard and spurred on the Gloucester contingent to yet more decibels.

Having won the game the thoughts turn to the final and the ticket arrangements. When I went down to collect mine - at around





11:15 - I thought there would be a few people in the queue. There were... a few hundred! It must have come as a surprise to absolutely no one that the club's allocations went in the blink of an eye, and well done to all concerned in getting a few more.

Of course, the ever-resourceful supporters that we have didn't wait for our allocation to be released. By 11pm last Saturday night someone had already discovered that you could buy tickets on line from Edinburgh Rugby and had plundered their stock. Should make for some interesting conversations during the game!

I have a bit - just a bit - of sympathy for the competition organisers, The Stoop has a

capacity of a little over 14,000 these days, and would maybe be sufficient for most clubs. But not when one of them is Gloucester. I suppose it's better to have a stadium that is packed, rather than play in a larger venue that is three-quarters empty.

And we have good memories of playing in the final of the same competition back in 2006 against London Irish. That game's a little way off though - well a week - and we have the small matter of

Newcastle Falcons to attend to first. According to many of our 'expert' pundits, the fact that Newcastle have played some decent rugby this term is entirely down to the fact that London Welsh have been so awful that they have been nailed on for relegation almost from the off. That means the pressure the Falcons have faced in previous seasons has been lifted and they can cut loose a bit.





N his pomp at Wasps, Lawrence Dallaglio always claimed it didn't matter how you were playing in the early sparring of the season or the depths of winter, it was your form at the end that meant



the most, and the truth is Wasps' almost became strong finishing specialists in Dallaglio's era.

It's not a trait Gloucester have ever perfected, but perhaps this season the square pegs are dropping into the square holes just in time. The victory over Exeter last Saturday, which I sadly missed, sets up a Challenge Cup final which could be the first of two decisive games against the same opposition.

The first will obviously decide the second tier winners in Europe this season, but if that is Gloucester, then stage one of the Champions Cup play off - where they would paired with the team 8th in the Pro 12 - would as things stand see them face Edinburgh again. That, though, is in the future.

Today we welcome Newcastle, who've been able to play without fear for much of the season given London Welsh's seemingly inevitable relegation. Such is the geographical distance between the Falcons and Gloucester, only a small group of players have represented both teams in the professional era. It's fair to say some have been more prominent than others in terms of their contribution.

The Scotland international hooker came to Kingsholm after 15 months with the Falcons. He's previously been at Northampton but with limited opportunities behind England's Steve Thompson, he moved north on loan before making the switch permanent. A knee injury at Kingsholm forced him to retire after only appearing fleetingly in the first team.

JAMES HUDSON

The experienced lock spent 4 seasons in the north east, staying loyal to the Falcons after their relegation in 2012 and captaining the team to promotion the following year. A sound line out operator throughout his career, Nigel Davies brought Hudson to Kingsholm at the end of his first season. Now 33, he has made more than 40 appearances in his first two seasons with the club.



RORY LAWSON

Scrum half who became a popular figure during his stint at Kingsholm for his tenacious displays on the field and modest demeanor off it. With Bill McLaren as his grandfather, Lawson's enthusiasm for the game was never a surprise, and 31 Scotland caps showed his ability. Dropped to the Championship with the Falcons in 2012, but along with Hudson helped them win promotion before a wrist injury forced his retirement.







Greig Laidlaw opened the scoring from the tee as Exeter strayed offside in midfield, a score that Henry Slade equalised


