Connacht gave us a really good game in April, and Pat Lam is a world-class coach, so there is a really tough task lying ahead today.



A STEADY SHIP

WITH the regular Premiership season now wrapped up and another ninth place finish in the bag for Gloucester, you could be forgiven for being more than a little disappointed.

The same finish cost Nigel Davies his job and looking at the domestic season on paper, there has only been a very slight improvement.

This campaign the Cherry and Whites have won one more game, scored more tries and conceded less than last term.

But as the players reflected on the year in Tuesday night's end of season dinner there was plenty more to be encouraged about – not to mention the prospect of Champions Cup rugby.

At the end of last season the club were in disarray and rudderless. Twelve months on there is a clear direction, leadership and playing style.

Credit must go to Davies for some of this at least, he identified the weaknesses and addressed them with the signing of the likes of John Afoa, Richard Hibbard, Mariano Galarza and Greig Laidlaw.

Now Gloucester have a hard-nosed, experienced spine running through the team to supplement the likes of Tom Savage, who has returned to his

best, and Billy Twelvetrees.

This quality has brought out the best in several individuals, none more so than Matt Kvesic, who is showing exactly why Gloucester signed him and in my view England's finest specialist openside flanker.

There has also been the emergence of some exciting young talent, Henry Purdy and Ross Moriarty have exceeded expectations, Billy Burns continues to progress and Dan

Thomas is a real rough diamond.

Tom Marshall, Jeremy Thrush and Willi Heinz will add further depth and quality next season, where Gloucester should finally begin to climb up the table.

All the signs have been there since the turn of the year and the Cherry and Whites are unbeaten at Kingsholm in 2015.

At the beginning of the season both David Humphreys and Laurie Fisher were coy on targets but admitted they must restore Castle Grim into a fortress.

They are not quite there but they are beginning to bring that fear factor back and it is certainly something they can build on next season.

Speaking earlier this week

Humphreys said, "It still resonates with a lot of us that at the beginning of the season James Simpson-Daniel thought we had lost Kingsholm. But that is not the case anymore and that's a huge credit to the players and the effort, enthusiasm and commitment they bring to every game.

"We are unbeaten here in 2015 and with a full crowd behind us it is becoming a very intimidating place."

And so we come to today's clash with Connacht, the first of potentially two play-offs to qualify for the Champions Cup.

Without doubt winning the Challenge Cup should have been rewarded with the final qualifying

spot for the top tier of Europe, but we knew the rules.

Gloucester have already beaten today's opponents at the quarterfinal stage of their cup run and a victory over French opposition, whoever it may be, at home, albeit a home away from 'Holm at Sixways is certainly achieveable.

The Cherry and Whites are favourites to progress and they simply have to back up their cup triumph by securing qualification.

Nothing can be done about the system in place and they must ensure their success at the Stoop is not a hollow victory.

As Laurie Fisher said on that joyous Friday night in Twickenham, "Qualifying for the Champions Cup has been our aim all year, to be top six and in that top tier of Europe so we have to back up the Challenge Cup win with two performances down the track."

EUROPE BECKONS

WITH today's match raising the prospect of European Cup rugby next season and resulting from success in the European Challenge Cup, we look back at Gloucester's most successful season in the old Heineken Cup and at the Club's previous success in the Challenge Cup.

THE 2000-01 HEINEKEN CUP CAMPAIGN

Gloucester's group matches were spread far and wide, the opposition being Llanelli in Wales, Colomiers in France and Roma in Italy.

The first four matches were played in successive weeks. Gloucester kicked off in their first ever Heineken Cup game with an encouraging away win, 27-20, at Llanelli. Jason Little scored a try in only his second game for the Club, having scored two on his debut against Bristol the previous week; Andy Hazell scored another. Kicking duties were shared out between Andy Gomersall with a conversion, Simon Mannix with three penalties and Terry Fanolua with two.

The following weekend saw a try-fest against Roma at Kingsholm, with Tom Beim scoring five and Frank Schisano, in his only season with Gloucester, one. Elton Moncrieff added four penalties and two conversions, whilst Terry Fanolua again chipped in with his boot with three conversions. Roma were sent packing to the tune of 52-12.

Next came home and away games in successive weeks



against Colomiers and these severely dented Gloucester's chances of progressing.
Following a 22-22 draw at Kingsholm, in which all Gloucester's points came from the boot except for a penalty try, there was defeat by 19-30 in France.

After a break of more than two months, action resumed in the New Year with the visit of Llanelli to Kingsholm. In a nerve-racking game, Gloucester looked set for an early exit from the competition, but were pressing hard on the Llanelli line at the end of the game, when Elton Moncrieff scored a dropped goal in the most bizarre of circumstances.

His kick from right under the posts had no hope of going

over until it hit one of the Llanelli players trying to charge it down, and it ballooned up over the bar. Gloucester had squeaked it 28-27

The final game in Rome was duly won 38-29. Simon Mannix was the main contributor with eight penalties as well as converting the tries scored by Joe Ewens and Jason Little.

In somewhat fortuitous fashion, Gloucester were through to a quarter-final at home to Cardiff. They made the Kingsholm factor count. Although failing to register a try, six penalties from Simon Mannix and one from Byron Hayward were enough to secure victory 21-15. This led to an all-English semi-final.

Gloucester made an electric start and forced an early penalty, which Simon Mannix kicked from in front of the Leicester posts. The game was played at such a pace that it was hard to catch your breath, but Leicester turned round 16-9 ahead, having scored what proved to be the only try of the match in contentious fashion.

Leicester knocked on and the referee called advantage to Gloucester, who failed to progress before losing the ball again, but the referee failed to bring them back for the original offence as Tim Stimpson started a flowing move, finished off by Leon Lloyd scoring under the posts.

If anything the heat increased in the second half, and Junior

Paramore and Martin Johnson were sent to cool off in the sin bin after the most notable confrontation of the afternoon.


The tension could have been cut with a knife as Gloucester threw everything into a last-ditch effort. Four points behind, they kicked a penalty into touch, from which Mannix kicked to the opposite corner - no try resulted but lan Jones somehow regained possession, only for it to be lost again and Leicester cleared to end the match

It was a desperately close run thing, and to this day remains the closest that Gloucester has come to success in the European Cup.



Gloucester's progress through the group stages was perhaps most remarkable for the scale of success achieved against Toulon home and away. Victory 74-3 in Toulon, still Gloucester's biggest ever away win, was followed a week later with a 66-5 triumph at Kingsholm. Gloucester scored ten tries in each match.

However, Gloucester also went into the record books with 106-3 (4 tries for Sinbad) against Steaua Bucuresti, which remains their highest team score and greatest



margin of victory in any game. Bayonne were the other victims as Gloucester romped through with six wins in the group.


This meant a home quarterfinal and Brive did not put up much of a show at Kingsholm as Gloucester ran in 7 tries as they won 46-13

The semi-final opponents were Worcester, who had been defeated 27-16 in the league the previous week, and this proved a good guide to the form in the Cup as Gloucester ran out 31-23 winners with tries from James Simpson-Daniel, Anthony Allen and Mark Foster.


The final against London Irish at the Stoop was a dramatic affair, which went to extra time before Gloucester edged home 36-34. Gloucester were leading 18-13 at half time, thanks to tries by Mark Foster and Andy Hazell. A long range try by James Simpson-Daniel seemed to have sewn things up for Gloucester going into the last quarter.

But then Irish came roaring back and two tries (one converted) in the closing minutes levelled the scores. In extra time a penalty goal from London Irish edged them ahead but then came the moment of the match when Jamie Forrester collected his own hack through to touch down just inside the dead ball line and claim a memorable victory 36-34.









has been a great year for the young boys, although some of it has come about through injury unfortunately.

"Living with Bill has helped me a lot, he's been at the club a long time now and he knows it inside out and he's helped me out from day one, getting to know the place, and getting to know the boys as well."

Meakes', and after Clifton RFC took the leap of faith to bring the centre to the UK, it has been a rapid rise from the outskirts of Bristol to Cherry and White, a fact that has the 24-year old pinching himself.

"Yeah, all the time if I'm honest. During the week, it is just normal business but when I sit down at home, I do think about how far I have come and where I am now, and I'm not ashamed to say I do pinch myself.

"I definitely do look back to Clifton, every time someone asks me how I got to here, I look back to Clifton and how good they were to me when I came over, they showed a lot of faith and supported me financially which I'm sure wasn't easy for them, but I am extremely grateful for that. I had the time of my life there and made some friends for life and had some great days and played some great rugby."

Starting in the European Rugby Challenge Cup final against Edinburgh three weeks ago, a red card dented Meakes' evening, but he is seeing the experience as another chance to learn.

"I've never sort of been in that position before, being in a final, and being sent off before, so it was a whirlwind evening. The main focus was winning the final and I was ecstatic to be part of the team.

"To get the red card wasn't great, and looking back I will probably take that back but I was happy to be a part of it, and be part of the win.

"Something like that can be a massive learning curve, firstly receiving the red card, and then dealing with the behind the scenes that follows, and it has been a real eye opener for me. Going forward, and touch wood, it doesn't happen to me or any of the guys again, we will be much more prepared for it."

With Connacht Rugby picking up the seventh spot in the Guinness Pro12 following last weekend's fight-back against the Ospreys, Pat Lam's men travel back to Kingsholm for a second time this season in this afternoon's play off, and Meakes reveals the squad are no strangers to reacting to different opponents from different competitions.

"I don't think there will be anything unfamiliar about this play off, we are in a really good place as a team and regardless of who we are playing, we will be concentrating on us and our game.

"We're playing a really good brand of rugby, and the boys are really enjoying being out there



and refreshed. This week is a massive focus, and we can't wait to get out there and play.

"Home advantage is a key thing, we take a lot of confidence from playing at Kingsholm and no doubt everyone will be ready in Cherry and White to cheer us on."

O the other week when I wrote, '... see you back here in October....', I was being a tad premature it


was being a tad premature it seems. Here we are back - in the middle of May.

WE MEET AGAIN FOR THE LAST TIME AT KINGSHOLM THIS SEASON, WITH FAMILIAR OPPOSITION, CONNACHT HAVING QUALIFIED FOR THIS CHAMPIONS CUP PLAY OFF DESPITE LOSING TO GLOUCESTER IN THE CHALLENGE CUP QUARTER-FINAL LAST MONTH AND ALSO LOSING THEIR LAST GAME IN THE PRO 12 AT HOME TO OSPREYS.

NTERESTINGLY, only nine of the starting XV here on Good Friday were involved last weekend but a leopard isn't going to significantly change its spots in seven weeks, so I think we know what Connacht's approach will be.

I felt the game at Bath last weekend was competitive but lacked any real tension, for obvious reasons. Both clubs had their eye on the week to come, but it was good to see Rob Cook back in the team after damaging his shoulder against Harlequins in November, an injury Cook openly admits was the worst of his career.

"It's hard when the boys are out on the pitch either training or playing because you create relationships there, and I didn't feel I was doing that because I wasn't doing anything towards it," he told me.

"The surgeon originally said anywhere between three and six months, so I thought it might only be three until it was emphasised



that the operation wasn't straight forward and that I needed to take it a bit easier in my rehab.

"I was probably lifting weights that were too heavy in the gym and not focussing on my technique. Once I understood that I might make more progress by not pushing quite so hard the improvement picked up. "

Cook might have been involved against London Irish - he was on standby for a place on the bench in case anyone dropped out - but that extra week rubber stamped his return to the team sheet.

"I was put through a sequence of eight tackles in eight different positions to make sure I was happy. Little things get the mind set right, like putting my scrum cap on, even though it was a training drill. Early in the week I nearly did it and when I got through it with no pain whatsoever on the Thursday I was happy I could commit to playing again."

Cook had an hour at the Rec, and I'd be surprised if he didn't start again today.

"I think it would feel a let down now if we ended up back in the Challenge Cup next year" he added. "We've got a massive opportunity - a lifeline for the season you could call it.

If we'd have won the Challenge Cup last season we would be in the Champions Cup already, but we knew the rules and we still have the chance to make something really good out of the season."


As Cook tries to help Gloucester to a memorable finish to the season, Henry Trinder's focus remains on his own long and winding road back to fitness and his wedding next month.

Trinder has had a season from hell - his words, not mine with just four appearances and shoulder and knee injuries to add to a lengthy list the centre has suffered in his career, and he's still only 26.

It was in February against London Welsh that his latest setback occurred, but for the moment at least things appear to be on track.

"Originally I was told it could be 12 months, but the strength and conditioning coaches are happy with the progress so I could be back a bit earlier than we first thought" said Henry.

"The new Premiership season starts seven months after the operation, so if I only missed a handful of games I'd be really happy with that. You want to start pre season with everyone else but I'm having to reign the horse back in a bit and only come back when



I'm ready."

"With a major injury and a long spell out the worst thing would be for it to go again so I am taking my time. I've started doing work with very light lea weights to slowly build the structure around the knee

"Upper body stuff I can do, along with cycling and lots of swimming, and at some point in the next few months I can look to start gentle running. I'm not at that stage yet. It's all about off feet fitness."

Henry can't be here tonight - which perhaps is just as well given what he called "emotional outbursts" when he's observing from the stands. He wouldn't be alone in those, mind you, and you can also be sure he'll know what's going on via social media. The crowd for Connacht quarter final was over 13,000, and another knockout game will draw another big crowd today.


"There is a different atmosphere around the club in weeks like this" Trinder said.

"In the Premiership we got too far behind, but our performances once we got beyond the group stages in the Challenge Cup showed the grit we have and what we are about.

"Connacht have a simple game plan but they have a good structure to what they do. The sticking point sometimes when you play the same team in quick succession is whether you can get up for the match or not."

In the aftermath of the Bath defeat Laurie Fisher - who only tweets when he has something meaningful to say - remarked that he was proud of the effort but that game had too many "soft moments" for his liking.

With a more experienced side today, it's hard to imagine that being repeated.


