The Cherry and Whites are the epitome of English provincial rugby, and proud of it, you don't have to be born within the sound of the Kingsholm crowd to play for Gloucester, but it helps! Gloucester is the City that behaves like a village and is unusual, possibly unique among English cities (proper ones I mean not your fancy dans like "Barf") in that rugby is the City sport, not football. It is rumoured that there is a football team but it is of little consequence when compared with the pride of Kingsholm. Coventry used to be like that before it all went downhill, there's serious signs of a revival now but Gloucester remains supreme for the moment. 
