# Lesley Vainikolo

IT'S MONDAY lunchtime and the Volcano is only smouldering. Gone is the full war-paint kiss to the heavens, the almost unnatural physicality, power and aggression. For a few moments at least, Lesley Vainikolo is all hair cut and a deep, booming laugh.

The fall-out is still settling after the most remarkable Premiership debut ever – his five tries against Leeds Carnegie helped Gloucester to the top of the table after Round One following his single-handed demolition job at Headingley.

He has since suffered a muscle injury in his neck that rules him out of today's derby, but what is it about one of the most prolific try-scorers in history that turns him from a God-fearing family man into a try-scoring wrecking machine of unimaginable terror?

"Our parents brought us into this world to do something special. God gave me the talent to use what I have got, to have a purpose in my life," he said.

"My philosophy is to stick together as a family, to put a smile on their faces and repay their faith in me – I owe them everything."

The 28-year-old then narrows his theory still further when it comes to his rugby: "Every time I get the ball all I am thinking about is breaking the defensive line. I always feel I have it in me to run hard and run over the people in front of me.

"For me it's about doing the hard yards. I was taught to run hard and if you are tackled, come back and run harder - it's a one on one contest and that is what excites me."

Vainikolo's record in rugby league still takes some believing. His 149

tries came in only 152 appearances - an almost impossible strike-rate - even for a winger with his qualities of size combined with pace. The most remarkable aspect is that he appears totally at ease with his celebrity status and unfazed by the expectation he now faces at Kingsholm.

Tongan by birth, Vainikolo, the youngest of five brothers, moved to South Auckland when he was six and took up rugby league when he was 11. He was also a prodigious sprinter - and was timed at 10.6s for the 100 metres at the 1997 Junior World Championships.

"Four of my brothers played rugby," he said. "My mother was a good netball player and very athletic - we were encouraged to play sport - as the youngest and the smallest I had to fight for the ball.

"Only my eldest brother - Intamoa - had the brains to do something else but Kava, Solomone and Israel all played - they were fit, strong and when Kava and Israel were selected to play for Bay of Plenty it was a massive thing for the family."

Vainikolo's break came in 1998 when his idol, former Australian great Mal Meninga, contacted him to offer him a deal at the Canberra Raiders. "Mal was an idol for me when I was growing up," he said. "I spent five years at the Raiders and it was fantastic. Then Bradford came in and it changed my life."

If Bradford changed his life then Vainikolo's impact changed the face of the Super League. In 2004 he scored 37 tries in 26 appearances, including five hat-tricks. His last appearance was against Leeds Rhinos when he scored the opening try during the Bulls' 38-14 massacre and the last of his 149 tries. "The decision to come to Gloucester

was a hard one for me to make but I knew it was the right one. I like to think I helped Bradford achieve good things but this was a new challenge in my life and something I wanted to experience.

"I am learning in union it is about doing the little bits right, of getting the forward platform established, of retaining the ball for long periods.

"Things like the training techniques and the systems in place for us to function are much different but it is great to see the young guys like Lamby, Tony [Anthony Allen], Sinbad and Luke Narraway doing well.

"I am just a part of a team. Without the success of the other players around me, I am not going to be able to contribute to the team. This is a new job and I would die for Gloucester - there is no 'I' in team and I am part of Gloucester first and foremost.


"It is still early for me in my career, I have a lot to learn but I have made a good start and want to continue it."

His influence against Leeds was massive. Although his tries stole the show it was his all-round contribution that helped Gloucester to eight tries.

"The space that Lesley can create is the unhidden factor that we're keen to exploit," said head coach Dean Ryan.

"What we see with him is that his try scoring is fantastic; what we're seeing in terms of him creating space for others is something we're coming to terms with as a team and other players will benefit from it.

"I think we knew straight away that he has things that other players don't have."





# RYAN'S REVIEW

Gloucester will be back at Kingsholm for the first time this season today and head coach Dean Ryan reviews the first two victories against Leeds and Saracens.

Two weeks ago we started the Guinness Premiership season with a victory over Leeds, what pleased you with that performance?

**DR:** Movement. I thought when we operated in space we generated a threat that was very difficult to handle and at times we continued it against Saracens.

The outcome was that Lesley generated the headlines because of his five tries but the threat and discomfort he caused the Leeds defence contributed to extra space for Anthony Allen and allowed more freedom for the likes of Iain Balshaw and James Simpson-Daniel.

Considering it was our first competitive game I thought our attacking threat from distance was excellent and was a real bonus. The contribution of Lesley was also outstanding and five tries was a remarkable way for him to announce himself on the Premiership.

We never made a secret about what Lesley can do. It doesn't hide that we still have a journey to evolve him into being a more complete player. Those five tries won't be on offer this week and some of the things that he still has to learn may be put under scrutiny."

Last season we only generated three tryscoring bonus points so to start with one a fortnight ago was very satisfying.

You continued that against Saracens with another bonus point win – is it the perfect start?


DR: IN terms of points, it obviously is but I don't get focused on whether we've got 10 points after two games but on what we did better than last week. Some of those mistakes we made at Vicarage Road we won't get away with in Europe. Still, it's nice to start like that rather than with two losses. We've been on the road twice because of ground redevelopments, so we' re pleased we're going home next week to a record crowd at Kingsholm, hopefully, and we're looking to build on this start.

Once again, when we played with ambition and movement we were very hard to contain. Some of the young players in the squad galvanised what we were trying to be on the front foot but I was also delighted with the contribution and work rate of guys like Alasdair Strokosch, Luke Narraway and Nick Wood.



second successive week with four tries was great for us.

Today we are back at Kingsholm for the first time since last season's Guinness Premiership Semi-Final – the old place has changed a bit during the summer?

DR: TO BE back at Kingsholm for a local derby in front of what should be a record Gloucester crowd at Kingsholm for a Premiership match shows exactly where the club wants to be.

I haven't met anyone who hasn't been totally behind the project and we are all tremendously excited about being the first team to experience a huge Kingsholm crowd in this new facility. It will be a history-making occasion for all of us and that is tremendously exciting.

Worcester are the visitors this afternoon – they are always tough, tense occasions?

DR: THERE have been plenty of changes at Sixways during the summer and Mike Ruddock has recruited some of the finest players in the world. Because of World Cup commitments guys like Rico Gear and other signings Sam Tuitupou, Greg Rawlinson have yet to arrive and they will only add significantly to what is already a strong squad.

We found out last season when Worcester came to Kingsholm that they are capable of causing real disruption — and that was when they were struggling against the back-drop of relegation.


They did wonderfully well to save themselves and I think the appointment of Mike will only enhance what they are trying to do.

# CENTRE OF THE UNIVERSE

GLOUCESTER: the capital of the world. No, really, how else are we to explain the fact that all roads lead to Kingsholm these days? Jeremy Paul has made the trip from Australia, Akapusi Qera has legged it here from Fiji - albeit via Pertemps Bees, which undeniably strips away a layer of romance - and Lesley Vainikolo has arrived from rugby league, which really IS a foreign country. The question is: why?

Players join Stade Français because they can have dinner at Brasserie Lipp and ogle women at the Moulin Rouge. They surface in Toulouse or Cape Town or Sydney because the treatment they receive is almost as good as the wine they drink. But Gloucester? Gloucester used to have all the pulling power of a one-legged roadsweeper with a bad stutter. What is it about the place, suddenly? Andy Hazell's disco nights? Patrice Collazo's yoga courses? Tea and sympathy sessions at Dean Ryan's house?

There is no point asking Chris Paterson. The state Edinburgh were in during the summer, he'd have considered joining anyone. Even Bath. But as a group, the new signings send out the clearest of messages about Gloucester's recent progress and their potential to win trophies - not one, but three or four between now and the next World Cup. They are here for one reason, and one reason only: success.

Of course, Ryan will need a degree of sensitivity when it comes to managing a squad with such depth of quality. There were three high-class centres operating at Kingsholm last season: the battle-hardened Mike Tindall and the two brilliant youngsters, Anthony Allen and Jack Adams. Now, Leon

Lloyd and Ali James have joined the throng. Only two can play.

The same goes for the hooking position, where it will be interesting to see whether Olivier Azam rolls over and dies because two international forwards, the aforementioned Paul and the former Sale scamperer Andy Titterrell, are encroaching on his territory.

The wings? James Simpson-Daniel, who should be on World Cup duty as we speak, is a class act; Mark Foster can finish with the best of them; James Bailey and Iain Balshaw both know an opposition goal-line when they see one. Now Vainikolo is on board, there is something claustrophobic about the contest for starting places. If Karl Pryce turns out to be as good as Ryan hopes, it will take Solomon himself to make the right decisions.

Word has it that the movers and shakers at Premier Rugby Ltd are considering a raising of the salary cap. It seems inevitable. The major powers in the English club game - the likes of Leicester, Sale and, yes, Gloucester - are in no mood to stand still, believing as they do that there is plenty of growth left in the thud-and-blunder business.

Mark McCafferty, who has played a blinder as PRL's chief executive these last couple of years, is a little wary, and with good reason. He points to the predictability of top-flight football - Manchester United, Chelsea, Arsenal, Liverpool, yawn, yawn, yawn - and contrasts it with a Guinness Premiership in which more than 50 per cent of matches are decided by a score or less; in which the likes of Bristol and Saracens can take up residence in the top four against all expectations. Raise the salary cap

by all means, but for heaven's sake think carefully before doing away with it altogether. A little parity never did anyone any harm, as all you good socialists in the Shed will happily confirm.


What of this afternoon's little setto with the lot from up the road? Worcester have signed every bit as brilliantly as Gloucester, but their three recent All Blacks - Sam Tuitupou, Greg Rawlinson and the supremely capable Rico Gear - are not due in England for another month or two.

Perhaps it's too warm here just at the moment. However, Mike Ruddock, the new top dog at Sixways, is very definitely in residence, and he has been bold in predicting a new style of rugby from Worcester.

Ruddock knows a thing or two about this daft game of ours - any coach who takes the Welsh to a Grand Slam deserves a part in Lord of the Rings as well as the Premiership - so we can expect him to deliver on his promise.

All things considered, this should be a very decent season for the Cherry and Whites. Wasps are in double figures on the World Cup personnel front, as are Leicester and Sale. Gloucester have lost just rather fewer, thanks to Mr Ashton's selectorial musings, and of the players missing, Gareth Cooper, Qera and Paterson have yet to pull on the shirt. The mathematics make a difference, as we may discover at Welford Road next weekend and here at Kingsholm a fortnight today.

Can the title be won? Let's face it: if the Forest of Dean can produce Wayne Barnes - a top-class referee who is also a barrister - anything is possible.

# **Five-Star Lesley**

LESLEY VAINIKOLO announced himself on the Guinness Premiership with a debut record five tries as Gloucester ran riot at Headingley.

The former Bradford Bulls star put Leeds to the sword with a devastating second half burst that turned a potentially sticky half-time deficit into a convincing victory for Dean Ryan's side.


He crossed for four second half scores that were the backbone of a crucial opening weekend victory for Gloucester.


"I think his first try was pure Lesley," said head coach Dean Ryan. "There are not too

many individuals who can do that sort of thing but his overall contribution to us was very important – it creates space for others and it was not a surprise to me that Anthony Allen had one of his best games.

"He has fitted in really well, is developing all the time. His overall contribution was far more than the number of tries he scored."

Gloucester got off to the perfect start when James Simpson-Daniel scored after four minutes when Ryan Lamb, Vainikolo and Leon Lloyd combined down the right. But Leeds hit back immediately with a soft score when Dan Hyde escaped three tackles down the short side of a ruck. Their 7-5 lead





became 13-5 when Alberto Di Bernardo kicked penalties after 14 and 20 minutes as Gloucester struggled defensively.


However, when lain Balshaw crossed past Tom Biggs following a period of Gloucester pressure, the tide began to turn. Vainikolo got his first score when he thundered through Tom Rock and had enough strength and speed to beat three other defenders to the corner for Gloucester's third try.

After the break, it was all Gloucester. First, Allen cut a lovely angle from a ruck to take Lamb's pass and score by the posts and although Rock narrowed the gap to 25-24 with Leeds' third try, it soon

became the Vainikolo show.

From a turn-over, Allen surged forward, Luke Narraway came into the line superbly and Vainikolo thundered in at the corner. Gloucester made Leeds pay from turnovers and when Andy Hazell scampered forward he sent the big man in for his hat-trick after 66 minutes.

There was still time for Lamb to kick across field after 70 for Vainikolo to get score number four and then, two minutes from time, the same combination worked again and Vainikolo stepped inside brilliantly twice to score try number five and crush a deflated Leeds.




# REACH FOR THE SKIES

# MATCH OF THE DAYS

They are the games that have defined Gloucester's history. In a new series this season, Dave King unearths gems from the past.



THE YEAR – 1972, the competition
– the RFU National Cup
Competition, the opposition
– London Welsh, the venue – Old Deer
Park, Richmond. The result? One of
the most outstanding achievements in
Gloucester's history.

The quality of the opposition was so outstanding that it was sprinkled with Welsh international household names that included six of the 1971 British Lions Team – John Dawes, Mike Roberts, Geoff Evans, Mervyn Davis and John Taylor. Other internationals in the London Welsh team were almost incidental. These players were the greats of the game and London Welsh a star-studded dream team of the age.

Such was the local interest that it was reported that there were no coaches available within Gloucester and trains to the capital were booked solid. The team were set fair as the club had booked the Kingsholm party to stay at Richmond Hill Hotel.

Those were the days when the players had been honed on cup rugby, many had experienced the North Gloucestershire Combination so a typically tough and rugged bunch of players approached the game. It was not in the mentality of Gloucester players to fear anyone.

Old Deer Park in Richmond was unique in that it meant the players had to cross the wide expanse of the adjoining cricket field which separated the club house at Old Deer Park from the rugby pitch. The atmosphere was incredible with 'Glawster' folk to the forefront.

The match was played with a strong wind and the men from Kingsholm had to face the vagaries of the elements in the first half but only conceded a Billy Hullin try.

Tenacious tackling kept the hosts at bay despite the concerted efforts of F.J. Williams and Gerald Davies. The efforts of the Gloucester players were superb, the team

had been rocked pre-match by the late withdrawal of influential forwards Alan Brinn and Dick Smith, the replacements Nigel Jackson and John Haines than rose to the occasion.

Jackson had to cope with three British Lions who were expected to reign supreme in the line-out, namely Davies, Evans and Roberts.

However, it was the Gloucester man who won good line-out ball in the second half that helped lay the foundations.

From one Gloucester attack, scrum-half Mickey Booth kicked the ball high and John Haines sprinted forward, arriving at the same time as a London Welsh defender. Amongst the bodies, Mike Potter wrenched the ball from the grasps of the tackled defender and dived over to score a try. Eric Stephens converted and then his ever reliable boot added a penalty to take Gloucester ahead 9-4.

It was the turning point of the game and Gloucester held out for a remarkable victory.

Although 35-years have passed since the event for Booth, born within sight of the hallowed Kingsholm turf at No. 7 Sebert Street, the memory is still vivid: "I recall the sheer after match joy with tears streaming down faces of our players, mine included.

"This was in contrast to the dismay evident on John Dawes' face. There was nothing fancy about our tactics, it was a simple case of winning the ball, tackle everything and keep the pressure on the London Welsh team."

"Yes, I was so proud as I ran down these steps and I used to think to myself I am the best scrum-half in Gloucester to hold my position in the club – that is what it meant to us all involved."

This was a result totally unexpected outside the confines of Gloucester. The press were forecasting a formality for the London Welsh team. It was one of the truly great days in the club's history for players and supporters alike.

For Potter, who scored that invaluable second half try, it was headline time. Mike was an unsung hero who had moved to Kingsholm from nearby Coney Hill and his moment of glory epitomised the entire local rugby scene represented within the city.

It could be argued that the day was equivalent to any cup final success that ensued. Names and reputations had been spread to the four winds. It was local success, a parochial determination that surpassed national fervour for that was the considered strength of London Welsh.

Mike Burton said: 'Their playing philosophy was the complete opposite to ours. Although they had the forwards they preferred to run and they had the players who could make the policy work. They thought that cup and festival rugby was the same thing.

"Those who disliked Gloucester's approach rooted for the Welsh. That game became the one which typified Gloucester more than any of the 360 in which I played. The game showed the Club in all its effectiveness. We encountered accusations that we were unattractive and downright dirty players and that we were killing the cup baby before it had chance to grow up. It hurt but we stuck to our formula."



the least. The All Blacks. South Africans


and Australians have raised the bar a bit and we have been left behind.


I have some sympathy for Brian Ashton who has seen his side thoroughly depleted by injury, but he hasn't helped himself by picking a squad of pensioners.


There are so many bright young players


FOR THE second successive game, Gloucester claimed maximum points with a four-try show against Saracens last Sunday.

Once again they had to survive a rocky opening when their line-out struggled, their re-start work was not up to standard and Saracens dominated but during their mid-game purple patch Gloucester's movement was something to behold.

Saracens built themselves a 14-3 lead thanks to a lovely try from Adam Powell when Gordon Ross cut an angle from a line-out drive and Dan Scarbrough gave the scoring pass. But the hosts then coughed up two very good chances when first Francisco Leonelli's pass was ruled forward and then Nick Lloyd dropped an inside ball as the pressure mounted.

It didn't look good for Gloucester, particularly after they lost the influential Andy Hazell to the sinbin for a late tackle on Ross. However, Ryan Lamb kept Gloucester in the hunt with a succession of penalties and when the impressive Anthony Allen carved through the Sarries defence, the tide began to change.

Gloucester shifted possession from a








