



# IN OPPOS



t has been a strange start to 2008 for the Guinness Premiership pace-setters - but as they turn for home in the title race they still occupy a play-off place. Recent defeats to Bristol and Harlequins undermined their early season momentum but six points in the last two games. including a maximum five against London Irish and a point in Stockport against Sale, has kept them in the hunt



But rewind still further and it easy to appreciate

that Gloucester's form has been patchy. Losing away to the Ospreys in the Heineken Cup could hardly be described as a surprise and they were then on the soggy end of a 10-5 defeat in the mud against Bath and a thriller against Leicester during the international period.

The one defeat to really set the fires raging at Castle Grim was at Bristol – when head coach Dean Ryan described the performance as 'appalling' and 'unacceptable'. But amid the defeats, lack of form, injuries and a raft of players unavailable on international duty, Ryan's side actually kept themselves in the top two.

The head coach will have his international players available again this afternoon Gloucester look to consolidate their position before zeroing in on Munster in the Heineken Cup quarter-finals against Munster next Saturday.

Last season's losing Guinness Premiership finalists

moved heaven and earth to strengthen what was already a tremendously gifted squad.

While the likes of the brilliantly precocious Ryan Lamb, the rapidly emerging Anthony Allen and fullback Olly Morgan had another season under their belts, heavy weights arrived in numbers.

Lesley Vainikolo, the try-hunting giant from Bradford was the most high profile arrival and has scored nine times already in Premiership. He now has five England caps following his debut against Wales last month and is a key man in the squad.

Scotland's Chris Paterson and Fiji's Akapusi Qera have all both to the mix and strength in depth. There have been other additions too: Alasdair Strokosch is a tackle-hungry, workaholic back row forward who was Scotland's stand-out player in the Six Nations Championship, Leon Lloyd made the switch from Leicester and Andy Titterrell has added versatility and dynamism to the hooking options and has come into his own in the last few games.

Vainikolo announced himself on the Premiership with a debut record five tries at Headingley as Gloucester ran riot in the second half to claim a 49-24 victory with eight tries in all on the opening day of the season.

Gloucester followed that up with a hard-earned victory away to Saracens that put them under greater scrutiny. Although Vainikolo suffered a neck injury, Gloucester plundered tries from Anthony Allen, Ryan Lamb, Luke Narraway and Olly Morgan to record a 38-31 victory.

It gave them maximum points after two rounds and last week they opened up at Kingsholm with a 29-7 success over neighbours Worcester Warriors.

However, it was tougher than the scoreline suggested but thanks to a brilliant individual try from James Simpson-Daniel, a punishing drive and score from hooker Olivier Azam and a returning try from Mike Tindall eased Gloucester to victory in front of almost 16,000 supporters.

Since then, they have won 11 of their 17 games and with the likes of Simpson-Daniel in red-hot form, they have their big guns back just at the right time.

Although the EDF Energy Cup passed them by again for another season, Gloucester qualified top of their Heineken Pool following four bonus point victories in six attempts and Ryan has already re-signed a number of key individuals ahead of next season. Although 2008 has yet to see them re-produce the rugby that saw them make such a great start to the season, there is enough in Ryan's squad to suggest they can continue challenging on two fronts.


Flanker Buxton has a gruesome reputation of getting the grim and gritty work done and through this has become a key and crucial member of the Gloucester squad.



#### LESLEY VAINIKOLO

This hard-hitting Tongan has been introduced to the Guinness Premiership this year after joining from the Rugby League circuit where he served as a prolific try scorer for the Bradford Bulls.

'The Volcano' has so far for Gloucester scored 11 tries in 13 games and will be hoping to enjoy the same try ratio for England now that he has gained residency. He featured in this year's Six Nations but has yet to open his try account.

Vainikolo will be able to handle any pressure situation effectively after playing Rugby League at the highest level with New Zealand and his strong defence will surely be a crucial factor if Gloucester want to hold off the




#### MARCO BORTOLAMI

Bortolami was made captain first season with the West Country outfit and has continued to impress and lead the team. His natural leadership qualities made him natural choice to take charge of Italy in 2003, this made him the youngest ever captain of the Azzurri at just 20-years-old.

He now has 45 international appearances to his name and his leadership and tactical skills marked him down as one of the outstanding players last season and his partnership with Alex Brown has proved formidable.

#### JAMES SIMPSON-DANIEL


'Sinbad', as he is known to many, is one of the most electric finishers in the Guinness Premiership and on his entrance to the game scored a hat-trick against Bath.

#### COMPETITIVE HAZELL EAGER FOR WARRIORS TEST



hen you come up against traditional ruckers and maulers from Sixways the usual collection of no-nonsense hard heads expertly schooled in making life notoriously

difficult - a man with the ferocious competitive instincts of Andy Hazell come in very handy.

During a period when clubs have been disrupted by injuries and international call-ups, Hazell's return from a knee injury more than a month ago for Gloucester has been very timely to Dean Ryan's squad.

Considering he had been out of action since the end of November after limping off against the Dragons in the EDF Energy Cup, he has done remarkably well to last the course so well and against Sale a fortnight ago he was at his vigorous best - hunting down Charlie Hodgson, breaking play and generally making himself a right old pain in the rear end.

In short, Hazell is one of the most significant players in the Gloucester squad. Like Peter Buxton and the hugely impressive Alasdair Strokosch, his fellow flankers, he is the heart-beat by which the team operates.

"There seems to be a special feel about the place at the moment and I want to play my part in that."

Hazell is now Gloucester's longest serving player. He has already seen a decade of service in the number seven shirt and in all competitions made 179 appearances with 19 tries.

But it his energy, enthusiasm and work-rate that is most captivating. It is a testament to Gloucester's achievements that they have managed so well without such a competitive tyro and they will need him this afternoon against the Warriors and Pat Sanderson.

Today, Gloucester face a derby duel of huge significance at both ends of the table and next week the small matter of Munster in the Heineken Cup - an occasion for which Hazell was made.

"There has been no let-up in the intensity since the new year - massive games against some of the best teams in Europe have come one after the other and there will be no dropping in the demands today," he

"We know all about Worcester - their strengths and their competitiveness - and we will have to match them today. Games between the two teams are always some of the biggest of the season - it's a huge occasion for us."

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"It is tough being on the sidelines but I have been there before - injuries are part and parcel of the game and although difficult, I just had to get on with it," he

"We have created a squad that can cope with guys being out injured. I obviously want to play all the time but it gave me the chance to get absolutely right and have come back into a team at the top of the Premiership and into the last eight in the Heineken Cup.

"In some ways my return couldn't have been more timely given the schedule we have coming up - we have made a great start in these competitions and now we must try and kick on and take it further - there is

### LOOKING BACK WITH PAUL WESTMACOTT



Rugby make only their fourth visit to Sixways Stadium for a local derby that has the potential to be compelling and create a very special atmosphere with two sets of vocal supporters getting behind their teams.

The first game was on October 16, 2004 with Warriors going down 18-13 in a pulsating clash. In similar surroundings to today, the sold out notice went up weeks before and a 8,400 capacity crowd saw Gloucester fly-half Duncan McRae open the scoring with a drop goal after two minutes. Referee Roy Maybank sent Warriors lock Tim Collier to the sin bin, however, in a cauldron of noise the home side came roaring back when prop Tony Windo picked up a loose ball sixteen metres from the line and unopposed dived over. The look on the former Gloucester players face said it all - if you buy him a pint he will tell you all about it! James Brown added the extra points and Henry Paul kicked a penalty for Gloucester as the Warriors lead at half-time. Two quick tries from Paul and Jon Goodridge put the visitors in the driving seat and although

Warriors camped in the visitors 22 for long periods they just could not find the line. Brown added two more penalties.

It was the opening game of the 2005/06 season when Gloucester next came to Sixways and in front of a partisan full house of 9,728 it ended in a 15-15l draw. With both packs of forwards dominating the game it became a shootout from both fly-halfs. James Brown kicked five from five and Ludovic Mercier kicked four and a long range drop goal. Gloucester head coach Dean Ryan admitted after the game that 'at times in the second-half we were lucky to get away with the draw'.

Last season Gloucester went back down the M5 with a 33-24 win. Shane Drahm brought a record crowd of 10,197 to its feet as he jinked his way over the line within a minute of the start. Jack Adams touched down for the visitors before Dale Rasmussen restored the Warriors lead with a well worked team try. Ryan Lamb then added four penalties and an Anthony Allen try rocked the Warriors. A fast and furious last guarter saw Thomas Lombard dive over to get the home side back within two points but a poor pass let in the Gloucester full-back Ian Balshaw to score the vital try. In the end it was the penalty count conceded by the Warriors that separated the team from a deserved win.


