

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CLUB NOTES

It is always a great pleasure to welcome the Gloucester club to Sardis Road, and todays encounter will be particularly enthralling, since Gloucester have lost their first two Saturday games, and therefore will be anxious to record a success today. Of course, they are the joint holders (together with Moseley) of the John Player K.O. Cup, and certainly, since the inception of this competition, they have tended to dominate the Cup scene. Whenever we visit their beautiful ground at Gloucester, we are always met with the most sincere of welcomes, so it is particularly pleasant to have the opportunity to repay a little of the kindness we have always received at their hands.

Gloucester have a habit of turning out one great player after another, and as soon as one famous name leaves the scene, another seems to pop up to take his place. Of course, they hold the central position in an area of very intense rugby activity, and Gloucester have long since made it plain that they are the natural recipients of all outstanding local talent. We ourselves are rapidly learning the same lesson, and when we consider all the rugby talent that is developed in the Rhondda Valley, just to take one instance, it is obviously in our interests to take a leaf out of Gloucester's book and make Sardis Road the natural bedding-down place of all good players who are looking for first-class rugby.

Obviously, we shall have to be at our very best to defeat todays visitors, and Wednesday night's win at the Ground of Glamorgan Wanderers will do us no harm at all. Many of our supporters thought we did not play particularly well, yet we came away with a win - by 13 points to 12 - against opponents who, after all, beat Cardiff on their own ground in the first game of the season.

Our selectors are showing a very bold approach, and this season they have not hesitated to include youngsters of obvious talent in the first team. We all applaud this, yet at the same time we must realise that we cannot both have our cake and eat it. We cannot expect to blood young players in the first team, and at the same time expect them to romp away with games against the level of opposition such as we encounter. It takes at least a few games for newcomers - however talented - to get the feel of what is a new experience for them. As other Clubs have constantly found out, if we want continued success, we must plan far ahead, and show patience and understanding in the meantime.

In this early season period, when the new Coaches are evaluating everyone who is available to the Club, it is a pleasure to record how well the Athletic XV are doing. Admittedly fielding very strong teams, they are so far unbeaten after five games, scoring 151 points against 36. They have beaten Barry (25-7), Llantrisant (35-7), Taffs Well (18-0), Ebbw Vale (38-15), and Porthcawl (35-9), and one is not surprised that Athletic Secretary Jeff Jones is very proud of them. By contrast the Youth XV - normally accepting victory as a matter of course - have sustained losses in each of their three games, but Coaches Roger Jennings and Gwyn Williams are confident that they have the nucleus of a very good side, and that the side will shortly start winning their usual ration of games.

The fact that Gloucester have lost their two Saturday matches to date - against Swansea and Coventry - must be bad news for us. From Gloucester to Pontypridd is, I suspect, a mere stone's throw compared with the distance our recent visitors Toronto Welsh had to travel to play us. I am delighted to be able to assure you that they enjoyed their visit to Pontypridd - and indeed the entire tour - even more than they anticipated they would. Their greatest thrill was quite simply the fact that they were in Wales - 'the heart of rugby', as they maintained. They took a particular delight in examining the Club's voluminous pictorial record of its history, from the modern, glossy, coloured team photographs to the ancient artistically-posed groups frowning severely at them from yellowing parchment. To them, they were a potted history of the Club, a testament to the 100-plus years of rugby played continuously in this particular corner of Wales. They were not too disappointed at their playing record of three rather heavy defeats, especially

after everyone had pointed out to them that a tour itinerary which saw games against Neath, Maesteg, and Pontypridd within ten days would be asking a bit much of any team. Courteous and friendly to a man - and woman, for their tour was graced by the presence of quite a few ladies - they conveyed to us the impression that they were the perfect ambassadors for their great country. Their visit means we can add Canada to the list of countries that have sent teams to play us here at Sardis Road, a list which now encompasses just about all the rugby-playing world, excepting South Africa. I can't remember a team from the United States, but the Japanese tourists trained here, though they did not actually play a game. Speaking of the United States, we have, of courses, enjoyed the sight of an American Football match at Sardis Road, when the Cup Final of the American Forces in Europe was played here during our Centenary year. We have not, of course, had a French side here, and I hope I am not letting any cats out of Graham Gittins bag when I mention that we may just possibly see Beziers, the French crack side, playing here in the near future. A full house that day, I fancy!
