VICTORY RALLY IN SECOND HALF

GLOUCESTER TOO GOOD FOR TORQUAY

Torquay Athletic were the visitors at Kingsholm to-day, and opening play was not very bright until Dibden, an "experiment" on the Gloucester left wing, made a good run.

Gloucester had a good chance to open the scoring with a penalty, but Boughton missed with the kick.

Torquay got a footing in the Gloucester half as the result of clever kicking by Marshall, and Edmonds was unlucky to step into touch when going well.

The standard of play was very poor and mistakes were frequent, and the many infringements served to spoil the game.

Hopkins, the Gloucester winger, was injured in tackling Bond, and the City were badly rattled.

Marshall had hard luck with a long distance penalty.

Gloucester came back with the best movement of the match, which ended after the ball had travelled from 25 to 25, offside losing the position after Dibden had cross-kicked.

Then Dibden cross-kicked, and A'BEAR following up, got a try, Boughton hitting the upright with the kick.
