

AN OVERVIEW OF THE

CHERRY AND WHITES' SEASON TO DATE



If you had muttered to a Gloucester supporter in any pub, snug or smoking area around the uniquely atmospheric delights of Kingsholm at the end of September that Dean Ryan's side would be joint top of the Guinness Premiership five days before Christmas, they may well have just carted you off to the funny farm.

Defeats against Leicester and Sale Sharks had left one of the most fancied sides in the country staring up from the uncomfortable position of seventh place, struggling to adapt to the new Experimental Law Variations (ELV's) and generally fumbling around for cohesion and reliability.

But since that Charlie Hodgson-inspired defeat at Edgeley Park, Gloucester have lost just once since in all competitions — away to Cardiff in the Heineken Cup — and have rediscovered the movement game that made them such a threat last season.

Saturday's 48-5 victory over Calvisano was their seventh in a row in all competitions and means they come into today's red-hot collision with leaders London Irish in good form and good heart.

The close season was not so much about what happened at Gloucester as what didn't happen. Despite finishing top of the Guinness Premiership pile again at the end of the regular 2007-8 season, Gloucester again failed to transfer their obvious potential into a dividend during the play-offs — it was a familiar, unfulfilled ending to what threatened to be a triumphant season.

By that time, head coach Dean Ryan had done the majority of his recruiting – a policy that included nabbing one of Bath's diamonds in Olly Barkley – Llanelli centre Matthew Watkins – and former Gloucester second row Adam Eustace – also from Stradey Park.

When he completed negotiations to bring Canterbury prop Greg Somerville to Kingsholm, the general thought was that Gloucester's squad was stronger than last season's and well capable of challenging again this season.

Barkley has been brought in to provide a tactical nous and big-game understanding that so often seemed to evaporate and as a left-footed kicking option, will vie with Ryan Lamb and Anthony Allen for the 10 and 12 positions respectively – but it is the inside centre position he covets and he kicked Gloucester to an opening round Heineken Cup win over Biarritz and then piloted them to success over Northampton a fortnight ago.

Somerville is the most capped prop in All Black history and alongside Dave Young – the young and aggressive tight forward from Leicester – Gloucester kept their summer additions to a minimum.

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With the likes of the emerging and increasingly gifted Luke Narraway, the robust Anthony Allen and the safe as houses Olly Morgan a year older and a year wiser, Gloucester's squad is up there with anything in the Premiership.

Gloucester completed their preparations with a 30-8 victory over Glasgow under the new ELV's but their Premiership campaign got off to the worst possible start with a home defeat to those Tigers – their third successive victory at Kingsholm in eight months.

Tries from Geordan Murphy and Toby Flood sealed a 20-8 victory – Gloucester's only try coming from the outstanding Morgan in the first-half.

But they responded by winning for the first time ever at the Rec in league rugby in a spot of West Country tribalism unique to the people involved. They backed that up with a tense victory over Harlequins, the Premiership pace-setters, with tries from Morgan and Alasdair Strokosch before Hodgson subjected them to a withering kicking assault at Edgeley Park as they struggled to come to terms with the ELV's. They have won games but have not been convincing so far this season – as the Falcons will testify.

That defeat, at the end of September, has been their last in any competition since then. They re-grouped with a 39-23 win over Newcastle at Kingsholm that included a bonus point and then built on that success with a 24-19 victory over Wasps in the EDF Energy Cup with tries from Willie Walker and Lesley

James Simpson-Daniel's 18th Heineken Cup try established the platform for their opening European win of the season – 22-10 over Biarritz. However, they lost a high-scoring contest in Cardiff before two tries from Lesley Vainikolo and a brilliant performance from Iain Balshaw set-up a 25-20 win over the Dragons and then Apo Satala's score ensured a semi-final place against the Osprey's next year.

Victories over Saracens and then back-to-back bonus point successes over Bristol and Northampton means Gloucester make their most important trek of the season to Irish today in extremely good heart.

HEAD 2 HEAD IRISH V GLOUCESTER

Table topping London Irish have won their last nine matches in all competitions since their 5-22 defeat at Worcester in the EDF Energy Cup on 5 October. This sequence equals the Exiles best run since season 1998/99. Irish have not lost at Madejski Stadium since the visit of Bath in the Guinness Premiership on 20 September.

Gloucester Rugby have won seven in a row since their 24-37 reversal at Cardiff in the European Cup on 19 October. Gloucester's only defeat in the Guinness Premiership in their last seven outings was 9-23 at Sale on 26 September.

London Irish have won just one of their last five meetings with Gloucester in all competitions: 15-10 in this equivalent fixture last season.

the Italian international is looking forward to this afternoon's contest



Marco Bortolami knows a thing or two about Italian rugby

– their ultra-physicality, set-piece competitiveness and willingness
for a battle, all of which has been just as well over the last
fortnight - but he will have his sights set on the Guinness
Premiership this afternoon.



After two, routine six-try victories over Calvisano in the Heineken Cup, the Italian second row will pit his wits against arguably the best line-out operation on all points of the domestic compass this afternoon, relishing the battle ahead against leaders London Irish.

The top two will come face to face at the Madejski Stadium today and nothing stirs Bortolami more than increasing Gloucester's unbeaten run at the home of the current

After crossing for his first European try in the less than exotic Centro Sportivo San Michele a fortnight ago, Bortolami should be back between the shafts this afternoon against Bob Casey and Nick Kennedy – two of the best in the business

"I think the performances against Calvisano were OK but nothing more — we didn't do one thing in the away game that was at the level we really wanted," Bortolami said. "In some respects we made it hard for ourselves with some mistakes and that kept the difference between the teams far closer that it should have been.

"Calvisano made it as difficult as possible for us last Saturday because they are a proud team and played better than they had done in Italy but we realised that if we sat in the game and kept doing all the things we talk about, that eventually they would tire and that is what happened.

"The important thing from our point of view is that we have re-found the movement game that was such a success over the last two years," Bortolami added. "We experimented at the start of the season in certain aspects of our approach and performance and that was important for the development of the side this season.

"But we are a phase-based team who move the ball and when we do that to the best of our ability we are a good team. In Europe, the most important thing is not to make too many mistakes because the level demands that you are always competitive. If we can do that then I am positive we can cause any side problems.

"For me, London Irish are a very, very good team. They like to move the ball like us but they pay a great amount of respect to the basics of the game – the scrum, line-out and physicality – which means you have to play very well to beat them.

"Both teams are on a roll and playing some good rugby so it could be a great game. I have a lot of respect for what they [Irish] have done this season – it's up to us to match them and build on the good points in our game over the last few weeks."
