EDF ENERGY CUP SEMI-FINAL 1 KICK OFF: 2.30 PM



First, apologies to those faithful Gloucester fans, but can we get the obvious and a hard fact out of the way. This semi-final can easily be described as the underachievers versus the champions.

The uncharitable will describe the Cherry and Whites as 'chokers' but some of us want to eat our pre-match brunch in the Mango Café, opposite Kingsholm, undisturbed next time we are in the city.

Even the most hardened Gloucester supporter must acknowledge that their men have something to prove after a number of near misses in major games. Remember Leicester in last season's Guinness Premiership semi final? And we will make just one reference to Cardiff Blues and two decisive European Cup pool games this season.

Kingsholm regulars can look to the results in this season's EDF Energy Cup for comfort. Tight victories over Gwent Dragons (25-20), Wasps (24-19) and Newcastle (11-10) show that their men are able to grind out the results. But now it is time for another big game.

Ospreys do not lack for motivation either. They are seeking back-to-back titles, following last season's win in the final against Leicester Tigers at Twickenham.

A second success would further the growing reputation of Welsh regional rugby. Ospreys have stated their ambition to be the best in Europe


and their players have the ability to win well.

Just remember the way Saracens were swept aside in last season's semi-final at the Millennium Stadium. It was a majestic performance, delivered only a week after the Grand Slam triumph. Shane Williams scored two tries and there was one each for Gavin Henson and Filo Tiatia. Will today's game be a similar outcome?


If a neutral can have a say among fiercely-proud supporters then the form 'horse' is Gloucester. They have had an unbroken stint of rigorous action in the Guinness Premiership. Games against Sale, Harlequins, Bath, Leicester, Wasps and Worcester should make for a battle-hardened team strengthened by their internationals from the RBS Six Nations Championship, led by England's Mike Tindall.


The Ospreys have had far less rugby (only two games in the Magners League since mid-February) and will be reliant on their gang of Welsh players to quickly find the form that undid Saracens last March. The likes of Williams and Henson are used to making the jump from international to domestic rugby and will not be too concerned about the lack of regular league action.



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ROAD TO THE RICOH

Gloucester progressed to the semifinals of the EDF Energy Cup for the first time this season with a clean sweep of victories in the pool stages.

They got off to the best possible start with potentially their hardest game of the group stages. Willie Walker scored a try, kicked three penalties and a conversion as Gloucester eased past Wasps 24-19 at Kingsholm. Lesley Vainikolo was also on the score-sheet with a typical poachers try.

Gloucester's win was secured by a Ryan Lamb drop-goal. The second game in the group, against Paul Turner's Dragons, proved far closer than it might have done. The Welsh side were durable and competitive for long periods and Gloucester needed two more scores from the powerful Vainikolo to set them up for a 25-20 victory.

Also on the score sheet were lain Balshaw and scrum-half Rory Lawson as Gloucester made their Kingsholm advantage count with a second successive victory.












THREE TO WATCH



GARETH DELVE

The number eight has been a revelation since his return from another cruciate ligament injury in February. Delve sustained the injury on Test duty with Wales last summer but his return has coincided with Gloucester's challenge at the top of the Guinness Premiership.

His ability at close quarters, carning qualities and ultra physicality is key in Gloucester's forward armoury. Delve moved to Kingsholm from Bath almost two seasons ago and although his number of appearances have been limited, his value, eadership credentials and sheer hunger to make up for lost time mean he is one of the most valued members of the Gloucester squad.



GREG SOMERVILLE

The most capped prop in All Blacks history, Somerville's record needs no explaining. He joined Gloucester from Canterbury in November after winning 68 caps for the All Blacks.

A tight-head specialist, Somerville made his debut against London Irish five days before Christmas but suffered a detached retina in his left eve.

However, he recovered ahead of schedule and has been a key element in Gloucester's forward pack. Outstanding at the setpiece, his scrummaging qualities, destructive defending and mountains of experience means he has been one of the most under-stated but most valuable signings of the season.



OLLY MORGAN

There is probably no better full-back in the country under the high ball. Morgan has been in the form of his life this season – not only as Gloucester's dependable last line of defence but he has also added an additional attacking threat to his game.


He has been at the forefront of Gloucester's Guinness Premiership try-scoring charts all season and his ability to return possession from deep, alongside lain Balshaw and James Simpson-Daniel, has been instrumental for Gloucester. A member of Martin Johnson's Elite Player Squad, Morgan has been close to England recognition this season.

That's an easy one for me - my grandfather, Bill McLaren. He's the best there has been.




WHICH 2 OF YOUR TEAM MATES WOULD YOU WANT WITH YOU ON A QUIZ TEAM?

WHAT'S THE MOST COMMON MISTAKE YOU SEE PEOPLE MAKING IN YOUR SPORT?


I'm going to sound like an old man here, but for the youngsters it's worrying about getting physically big enough to play the game before their natural time to do so.
