We can of course still qualify for the Heineken Cup by winning the

European Challenge Cup. Next week sees the visit of Connacht to the Gardens in the quarter finals. If we can win this we have a home semi-final and a victory there would take us to the final. Who knows, we could qualify for next year's Heineken Cup twice!

I do have to ask for one big favour. All year you have been brilliant. Today will be no different. However there are still plenty of spaces left for the Connacht game. We really need all our supporters to shout the team on during these last few games. The players will be there, giving one hundred percent as usual. Don't let them down. Finally, you are probably aware that our friends at the Rugby Football Union are not looking kindly on the clubs' desire to play more games in the Guinness Premiership. But playing only 11 home games doesn't give most clubs enough income to survive.

I would estimate that at least one club will lose close to £3million this year. Ten years ago England played four internationals in the Five Nations. Next season they want to play 12 internationals to raise more funds. It appears that what is good for the goose is not good for the gander.

The future of the England team depends on strong league rugby. The Nigels and Ruperts who run the RFU don't seem to appreciate that. They just want the amateurs to retain the power to control the professional game.



#### **Head Coach**

## **DEAN RYAN**

As a former army officer Dean Ryan is accustomed to leading from the front and that has been very much his style since taking over the head coach role at Gloucester after Nigel Melville's departure in 2004.

Ryan's on-field career saw him play for Saracens, Wasps, Newcastle and Bristol and he was also capped six times for England. An abrasive number 8 by trade Ryan was regarded as one of the most competitive and robust forwards of his generation.

As Gloucester head coach Ryan tasted success with a Powergen Cup win in his first season but since then silverware has fell just out of reach. That is something he will be hoping to rectify this season with his side flying high in the Guinness Premiership and after securing a place at Twickenham for the EDF Energy Cup final with last week's 17-0 win over the Ospreys.

# **CLOUCESTER**

Gloucester travel to Franklin's Gardens today on the back of an EDF Energy Cup semi-final victory against the Ospreys, which isn't bad going for a team that was written off following back-to-back Heineken Cup defeats back in January. Gloucester are also strong contenders for the Guinness Premiership title, their 12 wins from a possible 19 seeing them in the top four for much of the season.

The style of play seen from the Cherry and Whites under Dean Ryan is a far cry from the Gloucester of old. Roared on at Kingsholm by the Shedheads – some of the most passionate supporters in the country – Gloucester's pack, with familiar names like Mike Teague bolstered by some impressive home grown talent, would steamroller one side after another.

Now Gloucester are as famed for their back play. Anthony Allen, James Simpson-Daniel, Olly Morgan and Ryan Lamb are now household names, and like their illustrious forebears in the forwards, have come through the Kingsholm academy system.

Consistency in recent years has never been Gloucester's problem. Indeed, they have finished top of the pile for the last two seasons. What they have not been able to do is take that form into play-off success. Indeed full honours have been few and far between; the 2003 Powergen Cup being the only time silverware has been lifted by a Gloucester captain at Twickenham since the early-1980s.

But this might be the year that momentum shifts again at Kingsholm.

Victories over London Irish and London Wasps showed that Gloucester could win those tight league games. And then with last Saturday's 17-0 win over the Ospreys the Cherry and Whites showed that they could translate this resolve, attitude and belief into knock out games as well. Belief is certainly flying high among Ryan's side at present

However, early season defeats against Leicester and Sale Sharks had left one of the most fancied sides in the country staring up from the uncomfortable position of seventh place, struggling to adapt to the new Experimental Law Variations (ELV's) and generally fumbling around for cohesion and reliability at the start of the campaign. That was despite a first ever league win at the Recreation Ground and battling successes over Harlequins and Newcastle.

# CLUB PROFILE



#### G L O U C E S T E R R U G B Y

The close season was not so much about what happened at Gloucester as what didn't happen. Despite finishing top of the Guinness Premiership pile again at the end of the regular 2007/08 season, Gloucester again failed to transfer their obvious potential into a dividend during the play-offs – it was a familiar, unfulfilled ending to what threatened to be a triumphant season.

By that time, head coach Ryan had done the majority of his recruiting – a policy that included nabbing one of Bath's diamonds in Olly Barkley, Llanelli centre Matthew Watkins and former Gloucester second row Adam Eustace – also from Stradey Park.

When he completed negotiations to bring Canterbury prop Greg Somerville to Kingsholm, the general thought was that Gloucester's squad was stronger than last season's and well capable of challenging again this season.

But the most striking advances have been made by players already in situ. The increasingly influential Luke Narraway is maturing into a leader, while the safe as houses Olly Morgan is a year older, a year wiser and attracting the attentions of the England selectors.

There are signs that the likes of Gareth Delve and Somerville may match their vaunted reputations given performances so far. Delve's return from a long-term knee injury has given Gloucester a carrier in heavy traffic, while Somerville's mountain of knowledge and all-round expertise have been a galvanising influence.

Throw in new arrival Carlos Spencer and his box of tricks, the game-breaking qualities of James Simpson-Daniel, the running abilities of Iain Balshaw and the marksmanship of Olly Barkley and it is easy to appreciate that Gloucester are feeling pretty good about themselves.

Despite bitter Heineken Cup disappointment, Gloucester have an EDF Energy Cup final against Cardiff Blues to look forward to in a fortnight's time. They also continue to thrive in Guinness Premiership and with four points between the top four clubs they know that winning is their only option going into their last three Guinness Premiership matches.


#### Captain

## **GARETH DELVE**

The number eight has been a revelation since his return from a cruciate ligament injury in February. Delve sustained the injury on Test duty with Wales last summer but his return has coincided with Gloucester's challenge at the top of the Guinness Premiership.

Delve was a pupil at Rumney High School in Cardiff and accepted a Rugby scholarship from Colston's Collegiate School in Bristol before signing a professional contract with Bath in 2001. He was named in the Welsh squad for the 2006 Six Nations Championship, and earned two caps during the tournament, making his debut against Scotland, and moved to Kingsholm two seasons ago.

His ability at close quarters, carrying qualities and ultra physicality is key in Gloucester's forward armoury. Although Delve's number of appearances have been limited, his value, leadership credentials and sheer hunger to make up for lost time mean he is one of the most valued members of the Gloucester squad.

### Charlie Sharples

Charlie Sharples is another product of the Kingsholm backline production facility. And despite only being 19 he is already established as one of the brightest wing prospects in English rugby. Dual-registered with Moseley, he is certainly benefiting from his time in National League One.

This season the England Under-20 international has continued that scoring form, crossing in six successive NL1 matches. In 2009 has seen Sharples become a regular in Gloucester's first team, and he scored his first Premiership try against Bath in February.

#### Greg Somerville

The most capped prop in All Blacks history, Somerville's record needs no explaining. He joined Gloucester from Canterbury in November after winning 68 caps for the Blacks. A tight-head specialist, Somerville made his debut against London Irish five days before Christmas but suffered a detached retina in his left eye.

However, he recovered ahead of schedule and has been a key element in Gloucester's forward pack. Outstanding at the set-piece, his scrummaging qualities, destructive defending and mountains of experience means he has been one of the most under-stated but most valuable signings of the season.

#### Olly Morgan

There is probably no better full-back in the country under the high ball. Morgan has been in the form of his life this season – not only as Gloucester's dependable last line of defence but he has also added an additional attacking threat to his game.

He has been at the forefront of Gloucester's Guinness Premiership try-scoring charts all season and his ability to return possession from deep alongside lain Balshaw and James Simpson-Daniel have been instrumental for Gloucester. A member of Martin Johnson's Elite Player Squad, Morgan has been close to England recognition this season.
