
V GLOUCESTER RUGBY GUINNESS PREMIERSHIP ADAMS PARK KICK-OFF 3.00PM




London Wasps have won back to back matches against Newcastle and Bristol and have won their last nine home games in all competitions, since a Sale victory by 13-12 at Adams Park in the Guinness Premiership on 23rd November.

Gloucester have now slipped to three straight defeats following their loss to Worcester on Tuesday night, and have lost their last six away games in all competitions since their 29-10 win at Bristol in the Premiership on 27th December.

Gloucester have won their last four encounters with Wasps in all tournaments and were victorious 25-17 in this equivalent fixture at Adams Park last season.

Gloucester travel here to Adams Park today looking to finish the season on a high after a few wobbles in recent weeks have threatened to derail the quest for silverware.

At the time of writing, the result of Tuesday night's fixture against Worcester Warriors is unknown so Gloucester could be entering this game placed anywhere between third and sixth place in the table. It really is that tight.

So, Tuesday evening's game will prove crucial in determining Gloucester's next two weeks. A bonus point win over the Warriors would leave Gloucester in third place and everything to play for with even a home playoff semi-final up for grabs.

Defeat would mean that even victory may not be enough and results elsewhere would have to work in Gloucester's favour.

That Gloucester should be scrapping to force their way into the Guinness Premiership places would have been considered unthinkable a few weeks ago but away defeats to Worcester and Northampton, allied to their play-off rivals finding some form, has seen Dean Ryan's men slide down the table.

Going into those two afore mentioned away games, all looked set fair. The 24-22 victory over Wasps at Kingsholm in mid March saw Gloucester sitting pretty at the top of the Guinness Premiership table enjoying a four point lead over second placed Leicester although the Tigers did have a game in hand.

It's an unfamiliar end to the season for Gloucester followers. Consistency in the Guinness Premiership has never been Gloucester's problem. Indeed, they have finished top of the pile for the last two seasons. What they have not been able to do is transmit

that ability into play-off success. But inconsistency over the past couple of months, largely down to a crippling injury list which has forced Ryan to chop and change with his team selections. has now left Gloucester needing to find a bit of form to make the knockout stages.

Those two away defeats and the thumping inflicted by the Cardiff Blues at Twickenham last weekend has caused the Kingsholm faithful to start chewing on their finger nails.

But Gloucester certainly have the personnel. The likes of Gareth Delve and Greg Somerville have been outstanding in recent weeks. Delve's return from a long-term knee injury has given Gloucester a carrier in heavy traffic as well as valuable leadership, while Somerville's mountain of knowledge and all-round expertise have been a galvanising influence.

Throw in new arrival Carlos Spencer and his box of tricks, the game-breaking qualities of James Simpson-Daniel, the running abilities of lain Balshaw and the marksmanship of Olly Barkley and it is easy to appreciate that Gloucester have the ammunition.

Striking advances have been made by players already in situ. The increasingly influential Luke Narraway is maturing into a leader, while the safe as houses Olly Morgan is a year older and a year wiser and attracting the attentions of the England selectors.

Despite the bitter Heineken and EDF Energy Cup disappointment inflicted by the Blues, Gloucester continue to thrive in the Guinness Premiership and, with so little between the top sides, they know that winning is their only option going into today's game.





HEAD COACH DEAN RYAN

As a player, Ryan played for Saracens, Wasps, Newcastle and Bristol. He won the league twice during his career, once with Wasps and once with Newcastle and also won six England caps.

He kicked off his coaching career while at Bristol, steering the club to the Zurich Championship Final in 2002 where they lost, ironically, to Gloucester. several succepts several succepts his continuous premium that the season in both 2002 where they lost, ironically, to Gloucester.

He then moved to Gloucester as Assistant Head Coach under Nigel Melville. Following Melville's departure from Gloucester Rugby in 2004, Ryan was appointed to the Head Coach role which he has held since.

During his time at Gloucester Rugby, Ryan has assembled a team featuring a number of highly talented young English players.

Under his leadership Gloucester Rugby have enjoyed several successful Guinness Premiership seasons leading the table after the regular season in both 2006/2007 and 2007/2008.

The final GP title has remained elusive but he did lead Gloucester to European Challenge Cup success in 2005/2006.

CAPTAIN GARETH DELVE

The Wales number eight returned to playing action at the end of January after a lengthy absence recovering from a ruptured ACL playing for Wales against South Africa in the summer.

In his appearances since his return, Delve's physicality levels, endurance and energy have been key to Gloucester's forward momentum.

During his debut season at Kingsholm, Delve had shown the glimpses of brilliance and talent that made Dean Ryan sign him from rivals Bath. The hugely built Welsh back rower also regained his place in the Welsh squad for the Six Nations Championship and the summer tour to South Africa, after a superb maiden campaign at Gloucester.

Desperate to make up for lost time this season, Delve's return could have come at just the right time for Gloucester as they search for a play-off place with his leadership skills just as vital as his playing abilities.

GREG SOMERVILLE

Despite suffering a detached retina in his left eye on his first Guinness Premiership appearance against London Irish in December, the most capped prop in All Black history returned to action after only eight weeks and has already stamped his quality on Gloucester's forward effort.

The former Canterbury star is renowned for his excellent scrummaging, outstanding organisational skills and experience. A key asset in Gloucester's charge towards the end of the season.



CARLOS SPENCER

Carlos Spencer joined Gloucester back in February from Northampton Saints on a 17-month contract.

He made his debut against Sale and immediately showed his quality and has since gone on to make seven Guinness Premiership starts.

He won 33 caps for the All Blacks and his footballing qualities, awareness and subtleties could be exactly what Gloucester need towards the run in.



OLLY MORGAN

The talented full-back, a former pupil at Millfield, signed his first professional contract with Gloucester in 2004 and has been in fine form in recent weeks including a Man of the Match performance against the Ospreys in the EDF Energy Cup semi-final win.

Morgan has represented England at Under 19 level and during the 2007 Six Nations Championship made his debut against Scotland at full-back and later made a second appearance against Ireland, before being forced off with a shoulder injury.

Named by the Kingsholm supporters as Young Player of the Season this week, his ability under the high ball and his game line breaking are two of his very best attributes.
