A TRY BY ELIOTA FUIMAONO-SAPOLU IN THE DYING SECONDS SECURED GLOUCESTER A RECORD-BREAKING 41-41 DRAW AT WELFORD ROAD.

Olly Morgan grabbed an early try for the visitors which was swiftly cancelled out by Scott Hamilton.


Fuimaono-Sapolu gave Gloucester the interval lead but a 17-minute hat-trick from Alesana Tuilagi had appeared to put Leicester in charge.

The visitors hit back through Andy Hazell and Tim Molenaar with Billy Twelvetrees going over for the hosts.

Leicester stay top of the table after the highest-scoring draw since the Premiership began. It was also the most points the Tigers have conceded in a home league game.

London Irish kept up their bid for a top-four place with a hardfought 34-20 win against Sale at the Reebok Stadium.

Irish took the lead when Topsy Ojo intercepted Charlie Hodgson's pass. Hooker David Paice scored his third try in as many games and a marvellous

GLOUCESTER ARE ARGUABLY THE UNLUCKIEST TEAM TO NEVER WIN THE PREMIERSHIP TROPHY. IN THE 2001-02 SEASON, THE FORMAT OF THE PREMIERSHIP DICTATED THAT THERE WOULD BE A SERIES OF PLAY-OFFS, BUT THE TEAM THAT FINISHED TOP OF LEAGUE AT THE END OF THE REGULAR SEASON WOULD STILL BE CROWNED CHAMPIONS.

In that year, Gloucester won the playoffs but didn't get the trophy. The following season brought about a change in formula where the winner of the play-offs would take the trophy. That year Gloucester finished at the top of the table and lost in the play-off, again losing out on the trophy.

They had back-to-back seasons of misfortune in the 2006-07 and 2007-08 campaigns. In the 2006-07 season they topped the table again but ended up losing to Leicester in the final at Twickenham after defeating Sarries in the semi-final.

Then, the following year after again finishing the league portion of the competition on top, they lost in heartbreaking fashion to Leicester thanks to a last-gasp drop goal from Andy Goode to become the first side in the Premiership to lose a home semi-final since they were introduced to the competition.

After two seasons where they didn't quite manage their usual form, this year Gloucester have bounced back and they now sit firmly in the top four after suffering a poor start to the season before turning it around to claim the scalps of Bath at the Rec and Northampton at Franklin's Gardens. In particular their form on home turf has been impressive - they have not lost

any of the nine Premiership games at Kingsholm this season.

Gloucester have already secured silverware this season. After losing their first game of the LV= Cup to the Newport Gwent Dragons, they put their campaign back on track and ended up on top of their group. They swept aside the Dragons in the semi-final of the competition then found themselves in the final against Newcastle Falcons which they won 34-7. It was pure relief for Bryan Redpath's men who had lost the previous two finals of the competition against Cardiff in 2008-09 and Northampton in 2009-10.

DIRECTOR OF RUGBY BRYAN REDPATH



Boasting an international career that spanned 10 years and earning him 60 caps for his country which included two World Cups, Bryan Redpath is no stranger to rugby's big stage.

One of the initial members of Scotland's recent line of highly talented scrumhalves, Redpath played his final match for Scotland against Australia in the 2003 World Cup but kept playing for Sale Sharks up until his retirement from all forms of the game in 2005.

He had a two year break from the sport before joining Gloucester as their backline coach in 2007 and in his first season he helped the Cherry and Whites to the top of the Premiership. In 2009, Gloucester parted ways with then-coach Dean Ryan, and Redpath was handed the top job.

He led Gloucester to their first silverware in five years when his side won the 2010-11 LV= Cup at Franklins Gardens earlier this year.


CAPTAIN MIKE TINDALL

Born in Otley to father Phil who played for his hometown club, Mike Tindall's career for England began in 2000 when he made his debut in the opening game of that year's Championship against Ireland. England made a winning start to their victorious campaign and Tindall made an impressive start to his career with a try on debut.

Tindall's initial experience in the Premiership was with fellow West Country side Bath where he came through the club's academy and remained with them from 1997 until signing with Gloucester in 2005.


He played for England at Under 18 level alongside current England team mate Jonny Wilkinson and went on to link up with the Toulon fly-half in England's victorious 2003 World Cup campaign in Australia in which he starred in all but one of the games.

Having built a wealth of knowledge and experience both domestically and internationally, Tindall was handed the captaincy of Gloucester at the beginning of the current season and Martin Johnson turned to him to lead England when regular captain Lewis Moody was ruled out of the 2011 6 Nations. Tindall led the side to their first Championship win since 2003.

OLLY MORGAN




Olly Morgan's first taste of international rugby came when he represented England at Under 16 and then Under 18 levels before being selected for the Under 21 side in 2005, culminating in the IRB Junior World Championships in Argentina. The following year he was a member of the Grand Slam winning squad at the Under 21 Six Nations.

But Morgan has struggled to stamp his mark on the England senior side, having been selected only twice for duty in the 2007 6 Nations.

Having made his Gloucester debut on the wing against Saracens in 2005, Morgan is a pedigree fullback whose ability under the high ball has earned him many accolades in rugby circles and in the 2008-09 season, he was named at fullback in the Sky Sports Dream Team. A highly talented athlete, Morgan took part in the pentathlon in English Schools Athletics Championships as well as playing hockey for England Under 16s.

UKE NARRAWAY




Luke Narraway was born in Worcester where his initial playing days took place, ending with a stint for Kings School before signing for Gloucester in 2003. He made his debut for the club against Leeds in May 2003 and has now amassed 139 caps with the Cherry and Whites.

He moved through the England ranks by playing for the national Under 18 side before representing the Under 21 side in the 2004 Junior 6 Nations - a Grand Slam winning competition for the young English team. He moved on to play for the England 7s side before being selected for the England Saxons squad.

He played in the 2006, 2009 and 2010 Churchill Cups and in the 2010 showpiece he put in a Man of the Match performance to help England to victory in the final against Canada. To date he has represented England seven times under Martin Johnson's regime, making his first start in the 2008 6 Nations against Wales.

FREDDIE BURNS



Still only 20 years old, Freddie Burns' introduction to senior rugby has been notably impressive. In 2008 he switched academies to Gloucester from their west country rivals Bath and the following year he moved into the senior squad which led to him being selected for the Gloucester side that took on Australia in November 2009, with Burns scoring his team's only try in that game.

Having already earned 31 caps for the Cherry and Whites, Burns has tasted plenty of top flight rugby for such a young player. He has already played in the Premiership, the Amlin Challenge Cup and the Heineken Cup as well as being a part of Gloucester's trophy win in this season's LV= Cup. Burns has turned heads with his natural ability to perform in high pressure situations and many are already tipping him for full England honours.


















