Thas been Gloucester's misfortune this season to have two games against Service sides—the Army and the Royal Navy—cancelled because of weather conditions. To-day we greet the third side taking part in the Services' Tournament, the Royal Air Force and we give them the heartiest of welcomes.

The Services' Tournament this season is in a very interesting position. The R.A.F. found a nippy Navy pack very difficult to subdue in the first game but eventually won by 12 points to 6. In the second match, the Army went under to the Navy by 8 points to 6. Now the R.A.F. have to meet the Army on March 27th, and the latter side may prove a different side if their two star centres are fit by that date.

#### CHANCE FOR RESERVES.

So the R.A.F. to-day, with but one game left between now and the vital fixture with the Army will be all out to perfect both their attack and defence. The pack, led by R. V. Stirling, includes that bright star P. G. Yarranton, while the side also has two dangerous outsides in J. Boothman and G. Rowlands.

The calls of the County Championship Semi-Final at Twickenham has weakened both sides, for the Innsworth Centre, A. Barter will be playing for Gloucestershire. The fact that five Gloucester men are also on duty will give our reserves a great opportunity, but the pack will have to work hard to make up for the absence of the usual back row trio. We may, however, be certain that it will be a game with the ball given plenty of "air."

EXT week the City travel to London to play Guys Hospital, but here at Kingsholm you will have the chance of witnessing two matches. It is sincerely to be hoped that there will be a very big crowd here at 2-30 p.m. (please remember the time) to give the under 15 Schoolboys a great cheer in their Final Trial before the English team for the Jubilee Match at Twickenham against Wales is selected.
