

A POWERFUL ATTACK



That is the luck of the game, but it is particularly unfortunate inasmuch as the Midland side is going great guns this season. So strong has the attack proved that in seven games they have lost but once and they have piled up 145 to 59. They have a heavy pack which St. Mary's Hospital found to their cost a week ago, and H. F. Greasley has run into the peak of form on the wing.

Gloucester may have to field five reserves, but we remember the stirring fight the side put up against Richmond a fortnight ago with nine reserves playing. We hope to see an open game, whatever the result, and look forward to the return fixture in December with a full side at Coventry.

THAT PENALTY KICK

PACE compelled us in the last programme to break off in Mr. Frank Blackwell's explanation of the new Laws relating to the Penalty Kick. He was emphasising the point that the ball need only travel five yards (instead of ten) as long as it is forward of the place of infringment, and adds

The kicker need not wait until all the opponents have retired the ten yards, but of course, all his own team must be behind him when he kicks.

If a man has not retired, that man cannot tackle the man with the ball—nor interfere in any way with the game.

For an infringement by the kicker's team—a scrum at the place where the ball was kicked—or if in "in goal" a five yards scrum from the goal line.

For an infringement by the opposing team, the kicker can have the option of another kick—but not necessarily the same kind of kick.

ABERAVON NEXT

HIS is the First XV's last home game until November 20th, when Aberavon—a high scoring side to date—renew fixtures with the City. There is the County game with Somerset on November 13th, and the United fixtures are: October 30th Worcester and November 6th Leicester A, both at Kingsholm. In view of the fact that so far this season 29 players have played in the First XV, the value of the United side is shown, so it is hoped they will get a full measure of support at these games. In order to increase the facilities available to supporters at United matches, the Car Park is open and so are the rear entrances to the main Stand.
