REFLECTIONS

The eagerly awaited clash with Cardiff, the leading Welsh side, had a disappointing outcome. After the great performances against Newport and Harlequins, and our best win over Cheltenham for some years, the Red and Whites had great expectations of repeating their successes of 1951-52 and 1952-53, but they displayed little of their previous form. Cardiff won a major share of the scrums and line-outs, and though it was a disappointment to many that Cliff Morgan and Lloyd Williams were absent, they had two very capable deputies in Colin Hewitt and B. Mark, the former making some of the best runs in the match. In contrast, the Gloucester backs lacked cohesion and resorted far too often to the kick ahead, which invariably gave the Cardiff full-back, A. Priday, the chance to prove what a fine player he is.
