Gloucester beat Cheltenham at Kingsholm last season by 17 points to 6. The match – on April 18th – was played in atrocious conditions but provided some unexpectedly attractive rugger. Charlie Hannaford, Gary White and Mike Nicholls scored Gloucester's tries, Dave Ainge converting one and kicking two penalty goals. Richard Harris landed two penalty goals for Cheltenham.

The "big games" will soon be upon us and members who desire tickets for the Western Counties' match with the Australians at Bristol, or for any of the International matches at Twickenham are advised to make application as soon as possible.

In any event, applications – with remittances – must be made to the Gloucester R.F.C. Secretary, Mr. T. R. Tandy, 17 Ogbourne Close, Longlevens, Gloucester, not later than Saturday, October 29th. No guarantee can be given at this stage on the number of tickets that will be available, for it depends on the allocations made to the Club.

So roll up and make your applications soon, chaps; its in your own interests. Please don't toddle along and ask if there's a ticket going on the evening before the match!

The dates are: January 14th – Western Counties v. Australians. Internationals – January 7th – England v. Australians; February 25th – England v. France; March 18th – England v. Scotland.

Tickets for the Western Counties' match are: Main Stand £1; Temporary Stand 15/-; Ringside 10/-; Enclosure 7/6; Ground 5/-Scholars 2/6.

Prices for all International matches (inclusive of booking fee) are; Stand 31/-; Ringside 10/6; Enclosure 6/6; Ground 5/-.

The matches at Twickenham are the only ones for which the Club Secretary can obtain tickets, which are solely for the use of Gloucester R.F.C. members. There is no allocation of tickets for the away matches against Ireland and Wales.

The Secretary will not accept enquiries regarding tickets, etc. at his place of business.
