OUR VISITORS

This afternoon we accord a very warm welcome to our Midland friends, Moseley, who have rapidly become one of the most popular visitors to Kingsholm.

KINGSHOLM KACKLE

Moseley's last visit was on Saturday, September 17th, 1966, and it provided one of the most exciting games seen at Kingsholm last season, with 42 points being scored.

Gary White, many will recall, took a conversion in the final minutes and, had it been successful, it would have made the score 21–20 in Gloucester's favour. In the dying seconds, hooker Don Lane, the Moseley skipper, took the defence utterly by surprise and dashed away for an unconverted try which gave the Midlanders victory by 23 points to 19 and the honour of being the first team to win at Kingsholm last season. Dick Smith, Gary White and Ron Pitt scored Gloucester's tries, White converting two and adding two penalty goals.

What a memorable occasion it was last Monday evening, with the Bosuns as our guests to celebrate the "christening" of our new flood-lights! If we may use a hackneyed simile, the game certainly matched the lights in spectacle and brilliance, with the lads giving a great display.

Those who have seen the floodlighting on other grounds will no doubt agree that they do not compare with ours at Kingsholm. They are indeed a credit to the club who, in turn, wish to express their thanks to the staff of L. C. Mitchell & Co., who readily made themselves available on Monday evening in case there were any lighting failures.

Incidentally, a national newspaper rugger correspondent here for the Bosuns' game was equally enthusiastic over the floodlights and said that they were the best he had seen!

The opening floodlight game with the Bosuns was also a memorable one for Mr. Bert While of 60 Calton Road, Gloucester, for he held the lucky programme, No. 209, and was the richer by £5.

The possibility of the Gloucestershire v. Devon county match, post-poned last Saturday week because of the condition of the Memorial Ground, Bristol, being played at Kingsholm on Saturday, Dec. 9th, is not so remote after all. However, there may be more news about that this week-end.

Meanwhile, best wishes go to the Gloucester lads playing for their County against Somerset this afternoon. May they help to bring victory for Gloucestershire, as on current form the winners of this game would appear to be favourites to carry off the group championship. A.R.
