Next Tuesday, September 16th, the famous Wolfhounds visit Kingsholm. This is an "all-pay" game, kick-off 7 p.m., and to save queuing, tickets have been printed for the match. The premier side's next Saturday home match is the stern tussle with our County rivals, Bristol, on September 27th, again with a 3.15 p.m. kick-off.
