<p>A B&amp;W photograph dated 1891-92 shows a wide range of jersey with 3 shades of stripe, including one or two where the lightest shade (which we assume to be the yellow) is significantly narrower than the others.</p> <p>The <i>Gloucester Journal</i> reported that a new jersey was to be adopted for 1892-93, with a slight alteration in the colours. "Before, the stripes were equal-sized; now the red and black predominate considerably over the yellow, which makes the jersey appear less gaudy."</p> <p>Modelled by: Forward, G.
