west Country, but times have changed, "the Cherry and Whites" have now ripened and are beginning to

look a very tasty proposition. Club captain Phil Vickery has played a pivotal role in his team's resurgence but still feels there is room for improvement...

"...We've been inconsistent this season. We've lost games here and there which we shouldn't and that has left us trailing far behind the Tigers. That's the great trait of Leicester, they win tight games when they are perhaps not

playing so well. That's something we've got to look at and learn from."

Whilst Gloucester have a strong squad, it has been disrupted by the arrival of a plethora of new players over the course of the last two seasons. The England prop believes that the key to success lies in both nurturing home grown talent and bringing in outstanding foreign players that will

enable the team to progress to a new

"...There's a nucleus of West Country players at Gloucester who appreciate

the club and what goes on there. At the same time, I think you need a bit of an outside influence and I think Leicester have done really well thanks to Rod Kafer and Josh Kronfeld. There are a lot of young lads at Gloucester and hopefully Nigel [Melville] will be able to bring them through the ranks."

Nigel Melville, the club's new director of coaching, has certainly made a good start to his time at

Kingsholm with a comprehensive victory over Sale Sharks last week. At the moment however, the former Wasps man is still taking a back seat.

"Nigel is still meeting all the players and the coaches at the present – trying to learn a bit about the club," says Phil.

Whilst Melville's arrival and another vear's experience will make Gloucester

a force to be reckoned with next season, the former Redruth player believes it will be tough to wrestle the title away from Leicester this year...

"As well as Leicester, we've got to play Leeds away, Northampton away, and Bristol away, so it is going to be very tough for us. Having said that, I'm confident that if we play to our potential we can come away with some good results at the end of the season."

Gloucester do, however, come into the game brimming with confidence - having won their last four premiership matches - and Vickery doesn't feel that a victory at fortress Welford Road is out of the question.

"It's going to be very, very difficult to get a result today, Leicester are a fantastic team and their home record speaks for itself but if we train and prepare properly and hope that half a dozen Tigers players have an off day, there could be a chance we could do something! I'm certainly not going out today resigned to the fact we're going to lose!"

GLOUCESTER MILESTONES

- 1873 The Gloucester Journal on 15 September reported that "at a meeting at the Spread Eagle Hotel for the purpose of enrolling members of a Football Club for the City about 45 gentlemen joined", thus began one of the most famous clubs in English rugby. Initially playing its home games at The Spa Ground (where Gloucestershire played 56 first-class cricket matches between 1882 and 1923) the club then moved to the Old College Field on the Castle Grim Estate.
- 1891 Ground renamed, and on the 10 October, some eleven months before Leicester moved to Welford Road, Kingsholm was opened with Gloucester celebrating an 19-0 victory over Burton-upon-Trent. Walter Jackson becomes the first British Lion, and three years later is the first player capped directly from Gloucester, when he played for England v Scotland in Edinburgh.
- 1900 Kingsholm was used for the England-Wales test match on 16 January, and then had to wait 91 years for its second international, when New Zealand beat the United States Eagles 46-6 in the 2nd World Cup.
- 1906 Arthur Hudson becomes the only Gloucester player to score a test hat-trick when he crosses for four tries for England against France at the Parc des Princes
- 1926 Tom Voyce plays in his 27th and final England match and is still Gloucester's most capped player; Phil Vickery is now just two caps behind Voyce's record total.
- 1932 During the staging of a circus in the car park, a serious fire broke out which gutted the grandstand. The supporters rallied and funded the building of a replacement.
- 1953 Number 8 John Gwilliam becomes the first Gloucester player to skipper a test side when he leads Wales against England in Cardiff.
- 1972 Become the inaugural winners of the English Knockout
 Cup by beating Moseley in the final at Twickenham 17-6
- 1978 Won the John Player Cup beating Leicester in the final 6-3 at Twickenham
- 1982 Uniquely shared the Cup when the final at Twickenham against Moseley is drawn 12-all after extra time

- 1984 An entire club front row is picked to start an England test match for the only time, when Gloucester's Malcolm Preedy, Steve Mills and Phil Blakeway play against South Africa in Port Flizabeth.
- 1988 Flowers Ales become the first club shirt sponsor
- 1989 Achieve best League finish to date, ending up second in Courage League division one behind champions Wasps
- 1990 Repeat their best league finish with a second successive 2nd place, this time behind champions Bath
- 1996 Richard Hill takes over as director of rugby and started signing overseas players for the first time
- 1997 On 29 April Tom Walkinshaw is unveiled as the club's new investor
- 1999 Philippe Saint Andre replaces Richard Hill as director of rugby
- 2001 Phil Vickery becomes the tenth Gloucester player to tour with the British Lions. Nigel Melville assumes the role of director of rugby after Philippe Saint Andre tendered his resignation
