

ast season's runners-up, Gloucester will be aiming to go one better after losing out to Stade Français in the decider at BT Murrayfield last May.

route to ultimate glory in the final, accounting for Pat Lam's side on a 14-7 scoreline at the quarter-final stage.

Gloucester hosted Connacht again just weeks later, with the home side edging a thrilling Champions Cup play-off 40-32 after extra-time at Kingsholm in May 2015.

Currently sixth in the Aviva Premiership under the stewardship of former Ireland and

Ulster out-half David Humphreys, who has been in situ as Director of Rugby since 2014, the Cherry and Whites qualified for the knockout stages of this season's Challenge Cup after finishing as runners-up in Pool 3. They were pipped to first spot by French Top14 side Pau, who defeated Gloucester both home and away but those losses represented their only

blips to date, with Gloucester recording victory in each of their remaining four fixtures against Zebre and

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
During Humphreys' tenure, the Cherry and Whites have finished 9th, 8th and 9th again last season in the Aviva Premiership but have their eyes on a playoff place this year and have certainly improved under South African Johan Ackermann, who took over as Head Coach at the start of the campaign.

Of course, they were Challenge Cup winners in Humphreys' first season with the club when they defeated Edinburgh Rugby 19-13 in the 2015 decider. That victory made them two-time champions in this competition, having first lifted the trophy in 2006.

Absence

A lot has changed for Gloucester since then but they remain well served up front with some big names in the front row including former All Black and Ulster prop John Afoa and Welsh and British & Irish Lions hooker Richard Hibbard. The Welshman's fellow Lion No 8 Ross Moriarty is fit again having not yet appeared for Gloucester this season and will be pushing hard for a place after three appearances for the Welsh during the recent Six Nations.

In his absence Jake Polledri, Lewis Ludlow, Ruan Ackermann and Freddie Clarke have emerged as top performers for Gloucester in the back

row, with no room for England international Ben Morgan in recent games.

Behind the scrum they are led by former Crusaders scrumhalf Willi Heinz, with the captain having returned to full fitness after suffering injury last month. Elsewhere former England centre Billy Twelvetrees is a key man, with his experience and unerring boot proving vital to the Cherry and Whites' cause this season, while Henry Trinder is enjoying one of his best seasons in a decade

with Gloucester and has been their chief tryscoring threat this term.

Gloucester remain very much in the hunt for a place in the Premiership play-offs after last weekend's defeat of London Irish but at the same time they will be eager to go one better than last season in this competition.

With a fine pedigree in the Challenge Cup, few would be surprised if the two-time champions added a third title, providing of course they can overcome Connacht first tonight.
