## **BIGGEST ATTENDANCE AT SANDY PARK** AGAINST GLOUCESTER 12,760



Whilst he may be surplus to requirements for England Head Coach Eddie Jones, Danny Cipriani remains very much the 'main man' for Gloucester as they look to push forward on all fronts this season.

Brought in during the summer from rivals Wasps, it's certainly been a headline-making start to life for the 31-year-old playmaker at Kingsholm.

Seen as the key cog in the new-look Cherry and Whites machine, Cipriani has produced man of the match performances and was the Gallagher Premiership Player of the Month in September, all of which following him being arrested during a pre-season tour to Jersey and being axed by Jones for national service this autumn.

Throw into the mix a controversial red card for a high tackle in the Heineken Champions Cup game at Munster last month - and it all makes for some interesting reading for those who follow the game closely.

Suspension served, Cipriani wasted little time in getting back into the groove last Friday, producing a stellar showing as Gloucester brushed aside the attentions of Leicester Tigers 36-13 to keep themselves firmly in the picture behind Exeter Chiefs and Saracens at the top of the Premiership.

With Jones seemingly content to continue to operate with Owen Farrell and George Ford moving into next year's Rugby World Cup, Cipriani insists his sole focus remains that of producing each week for his club.

"I think it's consistency, just doing what you're doing," he said. "I've prided myself on that and all I can do is put my best foot forward for Gloucester. As a player I'm just doing everything I can to drive this team forward and take the responsibility I have here very seriously and show as much respect for the boys as I can by preparing right, that's all I can do.

"That's my excitement, that's what gets me up, that's what I love right now so I've just got to keep doing that."

Certainly, Cipriani has played a significant part in Gloucester's impressive start to the new season, but equally the renewed vigour and drive around the club is evident and the arrival of Matt Banahan from Bath, coupled with the recruitment of some serious South African beef in the pack, has made today's visitors a powerful pool of talent.

All of this has come under the gaze of Head Coach Johan Ackermann, who has clearly made his mark on the club since his arrival last year. However, the former Springbok is quick to acknowledge there is still plenty to do.

"Credit to the guys they've stepped up, but we've not won anything yet," he said. "We can't get carried away at this stage because there is a lot of hard work ahead of us.

That hard work begins this afternoon for Gloucester in the first of three meetings between them and the Chiefs in the next month. The two clubs are poised for back-to-back clashes in the Heineken Champions Cup, but today's encounter will offer the perfect opportunity to lay down a significant marker.
