THE LAST TIME GLOUCESTER RUGBY PLAYED NORTHAMPTON SAINTS WAS BACK IN DECEMBER OF 2019, MEANING THAT IT'S BEEN OVER A YEAR SINCE THE TWO SIDES HAVE PLAYED EACH OTHER. THE CHERRY AND WHITES WERE DUE TO PLAY THE SAINTS IN THE FINAL ROUND OF THE 2019/20 SEASON BUT THE FIXTURE WAS CANCELLED DUE TO A NUMBER OF POSITIVE TESTS FROM THE NORTHAMPTON SIDE.







Last time the two sides faced each other Louis-Rees Zammit scored a brilliant hattrick but Gloucester Rugby fell just short at Northampton Saints, who edged a 59-point thriller at Franklin's Gardens.

Cobus Reinach scored twice for the Saints, while hooker Mikey Haywood also crossed over the line, as the hosts secured a fifth win of the Gallagher Premiership Rugby 2019/20 season.

Gloucester Rugby made a quick start, with Zammit crossing within seven minutes for the opening try and it took the Saints until the 33rdminute to move ahead.

Hayward finished off a rolling maul and that changed the course of the game, with Reinach adding two tries in the second half.

Zammit added two more, while Chris Harris grabbed one of his own, but the Cherry & Whites fell just short due to the accurate goal kicking from Saints.

EUROPEAN CHALLENGE CUP 2016-17 THREE GAMES AGAINST LA ROCHELLE

8 DECEMBER 2016: GLOUCESTER 35 LA ROCHELLE 14

In the first of the group games, La Rochelle drew first blood when Kevin Gourdon scored an early try, which was converted by Zac Holmes. Gloucester swiftly struck back when Henry Purdy set up a try for Mark Atkinson. Greg Laidlaw converted. Laidlaw was starting to dictate proceedings, and he added a penalty. He then broke down the blind-side; Henry Purdy carried the move on for Josh Hohneck to score his first try for the club. Purdy featured again with a break, Billy Burns chipped through for Ollie Thorley to gather and score. Laidlaw converted, so at half-time Gloucester were leading 22-7.

La Rochelle had a huge pack, and early in the second period put the home side under heavy pressure. In the end David Raikuna scored for Holmes to convert. Laidlaw settled any Gloucester nerves with two penalties, and gradually the Cherry and Whites pack turned the tables. Matt Scott powered over with two minutes to go to seal a fine win.

17 DECEMBER 2016: LA ROCHELLE 42 GLOUCESTER 13

The massive French pack was soon well on top. Somehow Gloucester struck first with a Billy Burns penalty. However, two scrum penalty awards resulted in six points to La Rochelle through Brock James. The Gloucester defence was then stretched to the limit before Gabriel Lacroix scored a try in the corner. La Rochelle scored two more tries by half-time, to a single Burns penalty.

In the second half Gloucester fought back bravely, and Matt Scott and Richard Hibbard almost scored. Eventually persistence was rewarded when Mark Atkinson broke through and John Afoa scored, for Burns to convert. Unfortunately, any revival was thwarted when Scott was yellow-carded. La Rochelle proceeded to score three further tries, one of which was a penalty try.

The quarter-final saw Gloucester see off Cardiff Blues 46-26, so the stage was set for another meeting with La Rochelle in the semi-final.

22 APRIL 2017: LA ROCHELLE 14 GLOUCESTER 16

By this point in the season La Rochelle were top of the French Top 14 League, and unbeaten at home. However, Gloucester had obviously done their home-work. They had to counter the huge French pack. This they achieved by taking quick line-outs, swift scrum heals, and throwing the ball around at every opportunity, to wear out the La Rochelle forwards. The plan worked. La Rochelle became frustrated and Qovu was yellow carded for foul play, Burns kicked the penalty, and added another before half-time. By this time James had also kicked two for La Rochelle.



After the break La Rochelle threw the kitchen sink at Gloucester, but brave defence kept them out, and Burns even had the luxury of kicking a penalty. Back came La Rochelle, and with a clear overlap, James looped a pass which Burns plucked out of the air, and set sail from his own 22, went all the way for the try, which he converted himself. James kicked another penalty, and it was all La Rochelle; Damien Lagrange managed a try, but Gloucester clung on for one of the best wins in the club's history.

The Cherry and Whites had a penalty and Lloyd Evans fired the ball to touch. It was a great set piece with the forwards creating a maul at the lineout and then the backs piled in to help it over. It was Jonny May who dotted down, his first score for Gloucester Rugby since re-joining the club.

Just before half time, Gloucester Rugby put in a solid stint in defence to stop a Newcastle try leaving the score 12-7 at the break.

Gloucester Rugby came out with a point to prove and got on the scoreboard through a Evans penalty but in the end, it wasn't enough.

Cannon slotted a penalty and then George McGuigan scored at the death giving the hosts a 22-10 victory.

A VASTLY EXPERIENCED OPERATOR, JAMIE GIBSON HAS BEEN A VALUABLE ASSET TO THE GLOUCESTER RUGBY SQUAD THIS SEASON.

Having previously played for Leicester Tigers and Northampton Saints, clocking up over 180 Premiership appearances, the backrower knows the tricks of the trade and has been enjoying putting on the Cherry and White shirt and adding his wisdom to the playing group.

Having joined the club ahead of the 2020/21 campaign, Gibson was delighted to have been welcomed with open arms by the fans, city and playing squad.

"That's one of the biggest things about rugby in general," he said."Playing in a rugby city, as soon as you join that squad and pull on the shirt you are part of that team and the history. Gloucester Rugby is an old club and a successful club who have a long history from a long way back and it's a great club to play for and I'm excited to play a bit more.

"It's a big rugby club. There's a handful of boys through the club who are Gloucester through and

Having previously played at a packed-out Kingsholm with a full crowd before joining the Cherry and Whites, it was always a landmark fixture on the calendar but it's an experience he is yet to have in the Cherry and White shirt due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"It's a funny one because I've played away at a packed-out Kingsholm several times with a big noisy crowd and the games I've played at Kingsholm for Gloucester have at most only had a couple of thousand people in. So that's obviously been different!





"Even so, you still feed off the people around and those boys who are Gloucester through and through, you can't help but feel the history of the club and how big rugby is in Gloucester and how important Gloucester Rugby is to the city."

Results haven't been going the Cherry and Whites' way so far this season but a two-week break from playing has provided the perfect opportunity to make those necessary changes ahead of this next block of games.

"We had a few days off after our last game and then cracked on with training and using the time to tidy up the little things that we need to improve on over the next few weeks and make sure that we get better at the things that we're good at.

"Our set piece has obviously been a plus. We've had good success there and we've kept working on that and in terms of our shape and all the things that Dom (Waldouck) and Kingy (Alex King) have put in place. They've been able to tweak little things that they've felt weren't necessarily working as well as they could be. Attack wise, we've added a few things to our armoury and in defence we're going to keep pushing what we did well against Newcastle."

Despite the results so far this season, there have been plenty of positives from each game that Gloucester Rugby has played. The challenge now is to make sure that these bursts of performance can be sustained for the full 80 minutes.

"The squad is in a very good place. The Newcastle

game was probably the best example of us putting an 80-minute performance together. Ulster as well, those are the only two games really where we've managed to actually do what we wanted to do for a full 80 minutes. In other games, there have been really good elements of our game plan that has gone well but a couple of elements that have dropped off.

"If we can get it all right on game day then we can really build on that. That's what we've got to do and make sure that we don't let things slip as other areas start to get better."

Having worn the green, yellow and black stripes of the Northampton shirt for five seasons, Gibson is in a good position to offer some inside information on Gloucester Rugby's opponents for Round 7 of the Gallagher Premiership this weekend.

"It's an odd one in that we've had two weeks off and they've had five so everyone's going to be a bit rustier than normal so it should be fun! Especially if it snows! I think that's the forecast for Saturday so that could be an added element!

"They're a dangerous side. Analysis wise, it's difficult because they haven't played in a while so that makes things a bit more complicated. They've got some good, dangerous players. If they get front foot ball and momentum at the set piece and the breakdown then they've got some very good players who can expose you out wide. We know we've got to fight fire with fire physically and if we can take control of that then we've got every chance of getting the result."
